To the Flock . . .

In the church we are in the season of Easter—a season of hope, new ways of thinking and transformed ways of living. Life has overcome death; love has overcome hate; light has overcome darkness; winter is done and spring has sprung.

We know we are not done fighting this ever-mutating virus and working for the common good. Yet, as local vaccination rates increase and infection, positivity, hospitalization and death rates decrease, we feel hopeful. That hopefulness may be mixed with some hesitancy. It is hard to feel hope when we see the devastation in India and hear the heart-wrenching stories of overrun hospitals and families searching vainly for care and supplies. Many of our brothers and sisters in many places are struggling mightily. Our hearts are still full of grief; and yet, we hope. We look to the future in sure and certain hope that God goes with us.

Right now, we have a **COVID Safety Team** making recommendations for our congregation's return to in-person events. It is an exciting time as we begin to transition into the next phase of our life together. We have lots of exciting things in the works for the upcoming weeks.

Always a highlight of the year, we will have the **Annual Talent Show** May 12 (see p.2). One of the great things about Zoom is we are able to take advantage of using audio and video in ways that are difficult in our sanctuary or fellowship hall. This month, we will also have a **Pentecost Festival** (May 23) at Colby Park (see p.4). I am so excited that we will be FINALLY taking our **confirmation class** into membership that day! The worship team is planning a great day of fellowship, crafts, and activities to celebrate the Spirit's presence in our congregation and our world! During the season of Pentecost, we will be reading a book together, **The Sailboat Church** by Joan Gray (see p.2). Please let the office know by May 12 if you would like a copy. This is an inspiring book about how the Holy Spirit can be at work in and among and through us. 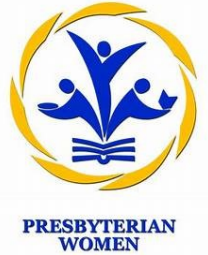

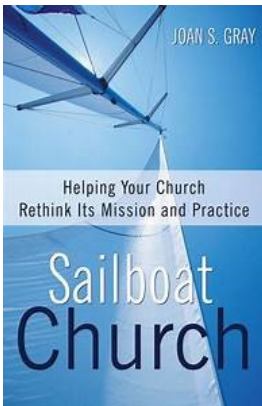
Christian Formation - Angie King

Good News!! Windsor Presbyterian's donations to the **One Great Hour of Sharing** total \$1580 as of April 19. This special offering of the Presbyterian Church USA assists people in the USA and around the globe. Once again, WPC members and friends have generously donated to this offering. Thank you.

On April 1, WPC volunteers prepared 100 meals for the **CFUM** mission. In addition, cases of bottled water were purchased to go with the meals. The food and water were transported and then distributed to persons living in the Trinity United Methodist area, 8th and College, Des Moines. The next date for preparing CFUM meals is May 6. Contact Jim or Linda Newsom if you would like to donate food or cash or help prepare the meals.



WPC is a member of the Des Moines Area Religious Council, which works to meet basic human needs and foster interfaith dialogue in the community. They manage a network of food pantries in the metro area. The **DMARC Food Pantry** provides a three-day emergency food supply to Des Moines Metro residents who run out of grocery money. Recipients must meet financial criteria and make their request monthly. The Food Pantry has 14 locations, including one in Urbandale and one in Clive. Besides the physical sites, there is a mobile truck that stops at various locations in the metro area. Recently, the federal government announced that the Farmers to Families Food Box program will end in May. This program was started during the pandemic. Without this program and with school age children being home during the summer, there likely will be a demand for more Food Pantry assistance. Please include Food Pantry donations in your regular offerings to WPC.

This month **Local Mission** contributions from our WPC General Fund will be directed to pay our DMARC dues and to the Calvin Good Samaritan Fund. This Good Samaritan Fund helps residents of Calvin Community who need financial assistance.

Personnel & Finance - Ron Grohe

March is a month we have been waiting for. Some of our members came through with a little bit extra and we ended up with Net Income of \$8,200 in excess of budget.

For the Operating Account, Total Income (\$20,690) was \$7,300 over budget as General Contributions exceeded budget by \$7,500, Mission Offerings were \$400 over budget while Miscellaneous Income was \$600 under budget. Total Expenses (12,460) were \$900 under budget with Personnel Expenses \$500 under budget, Worship Expenses \$200 below budget and Office Expenses \$200 less than budget. There was no activity in the Capital Account.

Unfortunately, our Memorial Funds have increased by over \$8,600 in the past few months as five of our stal-

wart members have passed away in that short length of time. Some of the Memorial money will be used to rejuvenate our sound and audio-visual systems in the near future.

As of Friday, April 16, 2021, we were notified by the buyer that they will be exercising their right to request a second 30-day extension of the closing date of the contract which will advance it to May 18, 2021. I might remind everyone that the buyer does have the right to request three, 30-day extensions to the original closing date which was March 19, 2021. The terms of the contract are being adhered to by both parties and we will continue to apprise you, the congregation, of new developments, as they occur.

COVID Safety Team - Dwight Tomes



We believe that the CDC guidelines, Iowa information including COVID dashboard positivity, and updates to Iowa vaccination adoption, are useful for Windsor's guidance. Groups smaller in size, such as session and deacon meetings, Drop-In (no food or drink), and committee meetings, would be acceptable with precautions such as facemask use and social distancing. Outside gatherings are also appropriate and safe. Larger groups and higher risk activities (choir practice) require more careful consideration.

At this time large groups, such as worship, are not recommended by CDC. The proportion of vaccinated individuals is relatively low (vaccination of people over 16 is just starting), and new variants, which are more transmissible, are present.

We believe it is prudent to wait until the CDC issues updated guidelines. Similarly, the opening strategy can be reevaluated based on the experience of other Presbyterian churches in our area.

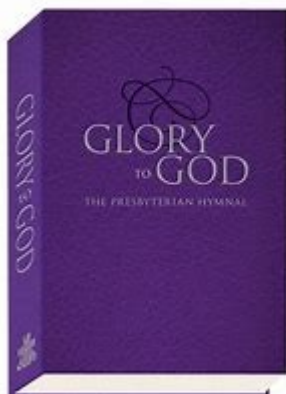
Kaitlin Mogle, daughter of Beth and Chris Mogle, was inducted into the National Honor Society at Urbandale H.S. on Sunday, April 11.

Breathe on Me, Breath of God

This is my favorite for this season just after Easter, because it speaks of the spirit (as in the Holy Spirit) and also of the wind, which is also seasonal.

In the coming weeks we will consider how Jesus made known his resurrection to his special friends—to the women who first discovered and proclaimed that “He is Risen.” The apostles, first Simon Peter and then the remaining ten, saw and were given understanding of the ministry of Jesus.

Lastly, this time prepares us for the coming of Pentecost and the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and followers of Jesus in Jerusalem. And we, too, can receive the Holy Spirit!

Composer: Robert Jackson

After receiving his musical training at the Royal Academy of Music, Robert Jackson (b. Oldham, Lancashire, England, 1840; d. Oldham, 1914) worked briefly as organist at St. Mark's Church, Grosvenor Square, in London. But he spent most of his life as organist at St. Peter's Church in Oldham (1868-1914), where his father had previously been organist for forty-eight years. A composer of hymn tunes, Jackson was also the conductor of the Oldham Music Society and Werneth Vocal Society.

Pentecost

On the Day of Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit descending in a mighty rush of wind and flame to inspire the church's proclamation of Christ's rising and to empower its mission and ministry to the world. (See Acts 2:1-13; see also Joel 2:28-32.)

The notion of Easter as a season of 50 days ending at Pentecost is patterned after the ancient Jewish festival of seven weeks that extended from the beginning of the barley harvest (on the second day after the beginning of Passover) to the end of the wheat harvest at the Festival of Weeks or *Shavuot* (see Deuteronomy 16:9-12). The Festival of Weeks later came to be called Pentecost (“50th day”) by Greek speaking Jews. In Jewish tradition, Shavuot also marks the giving of the law to Moses at Sinai; this liturgical link may inform Paul's discussions of the law and the Spirit. (See Romans 8, 2 Corinthians 3 and Galatians 3)
