Property Update . . .

. . . Regarding the sale/ purchase of property south of University Avenue and west of 63rd St.

As you may recall, our church (seller) entered into a sales agreement for the land referred to above with a convenience store and gas station (buyer), a national, publicly-owned corporation, on September 14, 2020.

The Agreement was to close within six months of that date. It did not close on that date and, as per the agreement, the buyer requested, and received, a total of three one-month addendums (extensions) and a further three-month addendum (extension) which ended September 15, 2021, from the seller.

Our property task force, in conjunction with the approval of the Session, agreed that the agreement would expire, with no further addendum or extension. However, when the initial waiting period of six months was extended, and, for each extension period thereafter, there was added into each addendum, a nonrefundable amount due from the buyer for not closing as each expiration date was reached. That total at September 15,

2021, was \$35,000, which was paid by the buyer to the seller.

The property task force is currently looking for other possible buyers of the land. Since the now-expired sales agreement was entered into and was in effect, the COVID-19 virus was at its peak.



It is now felt that the current economic conditions might be more conducive to a sale than was previously the case. Members of the task force are anxious to proceed and are confident of making a successful sale.

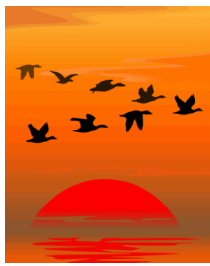

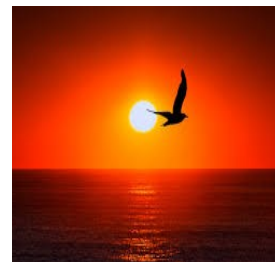
Session Highlights - Angie King

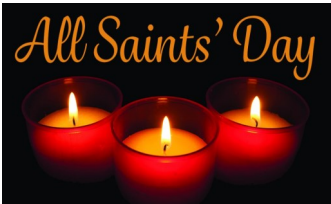


Worship & Media - Jody Cox

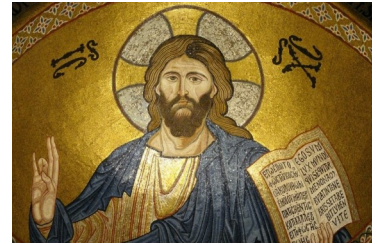
We have additional opportunities for sharing communion over the next couple months. It is special to be able to do this in person again and we hope to see many of you in the sanctuary for these extra special days.

Mission & Stewardship - Rich Teig

Our church and the Presbytery are helping to support the Arabic Outreach Center (AOC) and First Arabic Presbyterian Church. Ekram Kachu is the AOC Director. Due to the pandemic, the AOC had to cancel their August 28 fundraiser. They had hoped to raise \$5,000. Immigrants and refugees continue to arrive in Des Moines and need help getting settled. These people need assistance finding jobs, getting connected to local social services and making ends meet. If you are able, please include a designated portion of your offering to the Arabic Outreach Center.

Beth Schmitz, a member of our mission advisory team, has registered WPC for a Salvation Army Bell Ringing kettle. We are scheduled to ring from 10:00 to 12:00 on Saturday, December 4, at the north entrance to Scheels in the Jordan Creek Mall. We need two volunteers for each hour. If you are interested, please contact Rich Teig, at 515-285-0207.

The Counselor at Cowles Elementary says she would like to have a fund to purchase snow boots for students whose parents are unable to afford this expense. Some students arrive at school with wet feet. We are also checking with Windsor Elementary School to see if they have this need, too. Our WPC mission team would like to provide these funds. At this time, the details have not been worked out as to how we do this. We will let you know in church announcements if donations are needed, or if we use Local Mission dollars from budget.

On Thursday, October 7, volunteers once again prepared 130 meals for CFUM. Food was donated and hot food was prepared in our church kitchen. The next date for CFUM will be November 4. Please contact Jim or Linda Newsom if you are interested in donating food, dollars or preparation time to help feed people in the community near Trinity United Methodist Church at 9th and College.

Our donations to the DMARC Food Pantry were \$310 in September. We hope to have an average monthly donation of \$500. We will need to play catch-up if we are to reach this goal. Thanks for your generous support of the Food Pantry.



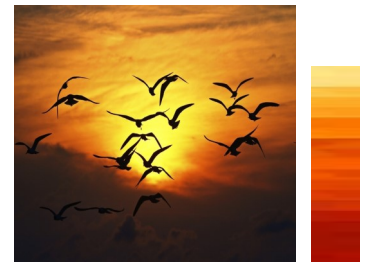
Presbytery Mission Trips

The presbyteries of North Central, Des Moines, and North Central Iowa are sponsoring two mission trips in the coming months:

- **U.S. - Mexico Border:** You are invited to join Presbyterians from across Iowa on December 4-10, 2021, on a mission delegation to the U.S.- Mexico border. This delegation is planned in partnership with Frontera de Cristo, one of five Presbyterian Border Region Ministries. We will worship with and be in mutual mission with brothers and sisters in the Presbyterian Church in Agua Prieta, and experience life and ministry along the US-Mexico border. The cost is \$750 per person plus airfare (approximately \$400). Scholarships are available. Lodging will be in dormitory rooms at Lirio de los Valles Presbyterian Church in Agua Prieta, Mexico. - **Israel-Palestine:** Join Presbyterians from across Iowa on March 3-16, 2022, as we visit biblical sites, meet local Christians and church leaders as well as representatives from the Jewish and Muslim communities and learn about the Israel-Palestine conflict and peacemaking and reconciliation efforts. \$2,750 for double occupancy include 11 nights of lodging, most meals, guides, tips, and on the ground transportation. September was a challenge as we've been slowly improving on the losses incurred during the first half of the year.

Contributions for September were \$1,524.41 below budget and Income was \$1,481.67 below budget.

Expenses were \$3,003.13 higher than expected, resulting in a loss for the month of \$6,009.21. Lower expenses overall have kept losses through September to \$7,359.99.

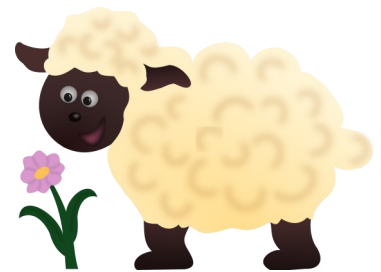

The exit from the church onto University Avenue continues to be closed due to street construction for at least through the end of October. Our parking lot on the south side of University is available to all, although you might see some of the street construction equipment parked at the far end of the lot on Sundays.

In the meantime, our church is open for service in the sanctuary, as well as classrooms and Ward Hall, with the necessary Covid-19 suggested mask-wearing and social distancing for all of us. Looking forward to seeing you in church.

To the Flock . . .

Getting ready for All Saints Sunday (p. 4) gives us occasion to remember those who no longer walk with us. We've experienced so much loss and haven't been able to gather in our normal ways as a community of faith to remember the lives of those we love and celebrate the resurrection. 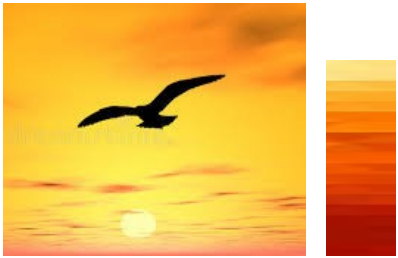

Zooming to God 2021 - Cindy Ray



In July, 2020, I wrote about how life works on Zoom for me. I confessed my crazy by talking about my people in the wall. By the way, they were little bitty people, just so you know.

Time has gone by since then—a lot of time. We have done things on Zoom we never imagined last year. Natalie Steenson has thought outside the box and created our Tone Up Choir. It was designed to help us keep our voices in shape, but along the way it has managed under the tutelage and imagination of Natalie, to create some beautiful music. She can create a choir out of six or seven of us. We have had some beautiful and meaningful services.

Since then I have learned how to imagine a head table at a banquet that was on Zoom. During this banquet I had to figure out what all of us were doing at the banquet. I had everyone say what they had had for the meal. It was fun to do. Then I announced my head table. It worked!

We are, however, in a new phase now. We are in the hybrid phase. We are having church in the sanctuary. Pastor Shamaine and Dwight, along with Natalie, have created a “zooming studio” to make it possible for us to have church. Over the months we have developed a beautiful congregation, some of whom couldn’t be with us unless we were on Zoom. Gradually, we have created church for all. Most of the time the people on Zoom are there worshipping right with us. They are still muted when they sing, but we have recordings and Natalie to make it as normal as possible. As time goes on, I think we will get better and better, creating new ideas that make the quality we are looking for, as well as the flexibility. We are truly zooming to God.

Now, however, there is a new problem. After church the people at the sanctuary are having snacks and fellowship. We are doing this outside mostly, but the time will come soon when we can’t do that anymore. The people on Zoom visit; we visit. A few of us visit with the people

on Zoom, but it is as if we are two churches. How can we fix this? How can the people on Zoom be an integral part of who we are? We want and need them. I am thinking of taking the iPad to church and joining Zoom right afterwards. We could encourage people to bring a snack, much as they do communion elements, and join with us for the fellowship time. We could include them throughout the fellowship time or for as long as they would like to stay.

This would be similar to when we can all be there together and people have to leave. This is an idea that isn’t fully thought out yet, but I feel certain that if we want to remain together, we need to zoom to God in a more united way, a way that can make us truly one Windsor.

Let’s find that way! Help me with ideas as I visit with you concerning this. We are finding new dimensions of zooming to God, and we can do this. Blessings as we zoom down this road together.

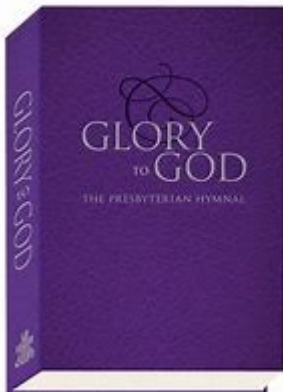


I praise you, Lord, for autumn:

My Favorite Hymn - Dwight Tomes



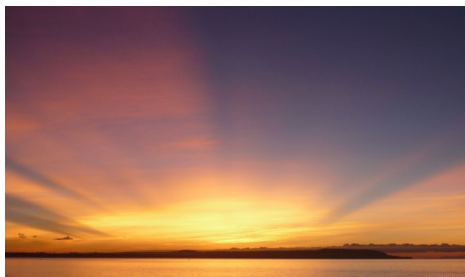
This month Dwight Tomes shares one of his favorite hymns with us.

For the Beauty of the Earth

I love this hymn because it's familiar and one which the congregation can sing along with gusto.

Verses one and two also connect so well with my well-known photography hobby. These describe the beauty and glory of the skies and God's love all around us. My thoughts mirror the wording in the second verse about the wonder of each hour in hill and vale, tree and flower, and the joy of ear and eye.

All among us can relate to the "mystic harmony" mentioned in the third verse—and wish to hear and see this gift every single day. Sing out with this one.



Words by Folllott Sandford Pierpoint

In the spring of 1863, Folllott S. Pierpoint (b. Bath, Somerset, England, 1835; d. Newport, Monmouthshire, England, 1917) sat on a hilltop outside his native city of Bath, England, admiring the country view and the winding Avon River. Inspired by the view to think about God's gifts in creation and in the church, Pierpoint wrote this text. Pierpoint was educated at Queen's College, Cambridge, England, and periodically taught classics at Somersetshire College. But because he had received an inheritance, he did not need a regular teaching position and could afford the leisure of personal study and writing. His three volumes of poetry were collected in 1878.

Tune by Conrad Kocker

An early form of the tune was composed by Conrad Kocher (b. Ditzingen, Wurttemberg, Germany, 1786; d. Stuttgart, Germany, 1872). Trained as a teacher, Kocher moved to St. Petersburg, Russia, to work as a tutor at the age of 17. But his love for the music of Haydn and Mozart impelled him to a career in music. He moved back to Germany in 1811, settled in Stuttgart, and remained there for most of his life. In 1821 Kocher founded the School for Sacred Song in Stuttgart, which popularized four-part singing in the churches of that region. He was organist and choir director at the Striftsckirche in Stuttgart from 1827 to 1865.
