So this fall and into the coming year, a theme of our worship, my preaching and all our ministry together will be living joyfully. In 2021-2022 we will celebrate a year of living JOY!fully before the Lord.

One way we are doing this is by adding a time of sharing Milestones in worship. These are simply the big or small happening in your family, work and life. This might be as small as a loose tooth, a birthday or a tomato harvest, or as big as the passing of a loved one and anything in between. Those in the sanctuary are invited to come forward to share their milestone and place a stone into the glass container. After each sharing we will celebrate together, saving "milestone." When we are done, we will give thanks and praise to God by singing the doxology.

It is my hope that this lighthearted way of sharing will help us know each other better and share our joy. In the coming year, let's find more and more ways to live JOY!fully before the Lord.

meet in Ward Hall and have fellowship and coffee without masks.



On September 2, 100 sacks of hot meals were prepared in the WPC kitchen for **CFUM**. Thanks again to the loyal volunteers who do the preparation and cooking. These sacks were then taken to Trinity United Methodist Church for distribution to those who live in the neighborhood. There was some miscommunication, as there was also a youth group wanting food sacks. Fortunately, there was some other food provided from another organization so all were fed. On October 7, CFUM meals will be prepared and this time we will prepare 125 sacks.



In September, **local mission donations** of \$250 were made to both the lowa Homeless Youth Center and the Beacon for Life. Both of these nonprofit organizations provide a valuable service to persons needing a place to stay until they can find a new safe home.

Michelle Book, President and CEO of the Food Bank, says that 10% of the people in the Des Moines metro area experience food insecurity. Many of these people are children. In addition, the eviction moratorium has ended and some residents will need to find a way to pay back rent or move. These are reasons to continue our support of the **DMARC Food Pantry**. WPC has generously donated to the Food Pantry for a long time. In July, \$760 was donated and in August, \$765. We were behind in our expected giving, but these two months have moved us up close to our budget. Since the Food Pantry buys food wholesale, hundreds of people in our community are being fed thanks to our donations. Thank you to all on behalf of the customers of the Food Pantry.

August was a positive month for Windsor Presbyterian Church financially! Both contributions and operating income exceeded monthly expectations, by \$4,902.67 and \$668.33 respectively.

Although general contributions are lagging behind for the year, greater income combined with lower operating expenses has reduced our deficit to \$1,305.78 through August.

Do You Know These Girls?

Since almost the beginning of time, we humans—you know, the ones made in God's image—have felt the need to mess with God's plan. It is hard to understand this. You wouldn't think that we would constantly question the one who created everything. However, that's exactly what we do.

Abram left his homeland at the age of seventy-five. That's another thing. You would think at that age there would be some wisdom. Apparently not so. God was leading them to a new land. He had promised a beautiful land with food o' plenty, and there would be made of Abram a great nation.

As Abram and Sarai traveled, a famine began to be in the land. They went to Egypt for help. "You are beautiful, Sarai," Abram said to his wife, "and because of this, the men there will want to kill me so they can have you. Therefore, you must tell them you are my sister." I would like to think she refused because who, as someone's wife, would want to be called their sister? But I have to remember this was another time and another place.

It all happened as Abram said it would, and soon Sarai was in Pharaoh's house. God saw this and was not pleased, so he inflicted plagues on the king until Pharoah realized that Abram had fooled him into thinking the woman was his sister. The Pharaoh released Sarai to Abram, chastised him for tempting him with his wife, gave him some animals, and Abram left better off than he had been.

How did God feel about this? I would suggest that God wasn't altogether pleased. He had a plan. I am not sure he wanted Abram to take things into his hands, doing what he thought was right, rather than awaiting God's resolution to the problem.

It isn't hard to understand this reaction by Abram. It is one of all of our weaknesses. We always think we know best, and we go about hatching plans and scheming schemes as if we knew more than God. One of the things we need to pray for, I think, is humility, and another is the ability to be patient and wait on the Lord. This can be one of our prayers.



Loving God, as we travel through our week, help us see the ways in which we stray from you because we believe we are right. Guide us back onto the right path and help us to listen, to be patient, and to know that You are the Lord our God. We pray this without ceasing in the name of Jesus the Christ.
















This month Ann McGowan shares one of her favorite hymns with us.

Be Still, My Soul

As I said last year when I wrote for this column, as a musician I cannot narrow down to only one favorite hymn; I have so many that are my "favorites." But the

music to one hymn I have loved since I was in high school is **Be Still, My Soul**.

The music to this hymn is from the tone poem *Finlandia*, by Jean Sibelius. We played this when I was in high school band. I liked it so much that I bought an LP album with the music on it. My band director was very good at exposing us to well-known classical music. I already had known since I was in sixth grade that I wanted to be an elementary music teacher, but it was in high school band that I became a lover of classical music.

The words are meaningful to me because of the scripture in Psalm 46:10, "Be still and know that I am God." I must admit that I just don't take enough time to be quiet. I turn on the TV as soon as I get home. I have a couple of small plaques with that scripture in my home. These help me remember that sometimes I just need to chill out and calm down.

Finlandia is a tone poem by the Finnish composer Jean Sibelius. It was written in 1899 and revised in 1900. The piece was composed for the Press Celebrations of 1899, a covert protest against increasing censorship from the Russian Empire, and was the last of seven pieces performed as an accompaniment to a tableau depicting episodes from Finnish history. The premiere was on July 2, 1900, in Helsinki.

In order to avoid Russian censorship, *Finlandia* had to be performed under alternative names at various musical concerts. Titles under which the piece masqueraded were numerous and often confusing. Famous examples include Happy Feelings at the awakening of Finnish Spring and A Scandinavian Choral March.

Little is known about the author of this hymn. Katharina Amalia Dorothea von Schlegel was born in 1697. The date of her death is unknown. As her name suggests, she may have come from an aristocratic family. Other than that she was connected with a small court at Köthen, north of Halle, in Germany, little is known of her life. Some hymnologists suggest that she may have become a Lutheran nun.


