#### In the Bleak Midwinter

Christina Rossetti, born in 1830 to Italian poet and political exile Gabriele Rossetti and Frances Polidori, was the youngest in a family of writers and artists. Even before learning to write, she was creating stories, dedicating her first to her mother.

She is remembered for numerous stories and poems, including two that became beloved Christmas hymns, "In the Bleak Midwinter," published in 1872, and "Love Came Down at Christmas," published in 1885.

Love came down at Christmas,
Love all lovely, Love Divine,
Love was born at Christmas,
Star and Angels gave the sign.
Worship we the Godhead,
Love Incarnate, Love Divine,
Worship we our Jesus,
But wherewith for sacred sign?
Love shall be our token,
Love be yours and love be mine,
Love to God and all men,
Love for plea and gift and sign.

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#### Time for Fall Cleanup


All summer the Holy Mowers have kept our campus beautiful. Now the Righteous Rakers to take over.

## Food for Thought

The Rev. Richard Rohr is a Franciscan friar, founder of the Center for Action and Contemplation in Albuquerque, New Mexico. His teachings emphasize "the paramount centrality of relationship with God, and neighbor." Rather than be bound by dogma and exclusivity, he says, we must "fall in love with the divine presence, under whatever name." Rohr sees his work as prophetic, calling attention to the need for change in a "church that he sees as failing to transform people, and thus increasingly irrelevant." It is strange that it took us almost all of our two-thousand-year history to get back to the "ecumenical" attitude Jesus had at the very beginning! He goes out of his way to make non-Jews the heroes of many of his stories and teachings. He is quick to point out the failures and fallacies of his own religion, Judaism, while still remaining faithful to it. Jesus held a very critical stance toward his own religion, but for some reason few of us think we can do the same.

On the other hand, sadly, many people think that if they no longer believe in the absolute primacy of their own religion, then it has no absolute call on them and they often give up on it entirely. But I am convinced that the biblical tradition is saying that the only absolute available to us is the faithful love of God, and not any concept or structure—even our religious traditions themselves. God's love itself is the center and the still point of the turning world. But if we have never actually experienced this love, we will most assuredly look for absolutes in other ways.

What is unique about Jesus is his inclusivity itself! He is so grounded in the absoluteness of the Divine relationship that he is quite free to relativize the Law, simplify the Prophets, and find God outside of his own tradition. He is constantly and consistently inclusive—without denying his Jewish foundation and faith. I believe we can only be inclusive when we have a deeply held and shared experience that we can include people "into." We have to have a "home" to bring people home to.
