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### Archbishop Desmond Tutu has died.

He will be remembered as a champion of justice, and also of forgiveness and reconciliation.

Glen Frankel, in his obituary in the *Washington Post*, described him: "A small, effervescent man with a crooked nose and infectious toothy grin, Archbishop Tutu served as Black South Africa's informal ambassador to the world during the dark days of repression and as a crucial voice in the campaign for

racial equality that culminated with Nelson Mandela's election as the country's first Black president in 1994.

Throughout the struggle, he preached nonviolence even while denouncing apartheid as 'an evil system.'"

After the end of apartheid, President Nelson Mandela appointed him to lead the Truth and Reconciliation Commission which gave citizens on both sides an opportunity to meet and resolve differences, describe their pain and make apologies.



He wrote about that work in No Future Without Forgiveness.

Archbishop Tutu was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984 and the U.S. Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2009.

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It's not popular to talk about love, and some think it's naïve. We're afraid to say "I love you," and we almost never talk about love in Congress or in public forums. It's as if people think love is a sign of weakness, vulnerability, and emotionality. But love can be strong. It can be binding. Love is a force unlike any other. I hope we can get to a place where saying "I love you" is a badge of honor.

# Food for Thought

Rep. John Lewis was born in 1940, the son of a sharecropper. He thought he would become a minister. Instead, he became a leader in the sixties civil rights movement. Later he served seventeen terms in the U.S. House of Representatives where he was known and loved as the "Conscience of the House." John Lewis died in 2020. In a small book published posthumously, he reflected about advocating for change for the common good.

Growing up in Troy, Alabama, I would see signs that said "whites" and "colored." I'd ask my parents and grandparents about these signs, and they would tell me that's just the way it is. They told me, "Don't get in trouble. . . .

But then I heard about Rosa Parks. She got into "good trouble." She wouldn't move to the back of the bus, which led to the Montgomery Bus Boycott. . . .

And I've been getting into good trouble ever since. I have been arrested over forty times—forty-five if you include the arrests while in Congress. Those first arrests made me feel so liberated and free. . . .I knew that what I was doing was morally right, and that it was only a matter of time until this truth was more widely recognized and accepted. . . .

Good trouble is about dramatizing something that needs changing and correcting. My arrests help to raise awareness for the wrongs happening around the world. . . .

You have the right to protest for what is right. You know what I say: When you see something that is not right, not fair, not just, you have to say something, you have to do something. You have to push, and pull, and be prepared to make a little noise. When you see something that is not the way it should be, don't be afraid. Speak up, speak out, be courageous. It's a total commitment. . . .

One hundred years from now, I wold love to see that our Beloved Community, the place we call home—Americawill be more at peace with itself. Let us hope and believe that there will be less turmoil, less rancor, less violence. America should be place of respect and dignity, a beacon of light for all of our fellow human beings I know it is within our power to make such a world exist.



Grant us the gift of your Spirit, that we may know Christ and make him known; and through him, at all times and in all places, may give thanks to you in all things. Amen
