THE OPPORTUNITY *to shop, save, and give*

The SEA Thrift Store provides assistance to our clients who are in need of clothing, household items, furniture and appliances..

In 2013:

- SEA Thrift Store assisted **195** individuals with needed items.
- **11** families were assisted who were homeless or victims of house fires.
- **89** children received clothing assistance.
- Items provided to clients was valued at **\$4,070.40**.

SOCIAL SERVICES

SEA's social services are provided by licensed social workers who complete assessments, develop service plans, and provide assistance to stabilize the crisis situation. The social workers are knowledgeable of local resources and often collaborate with other agencies to better serve individuals and families in our community.



Food donations are received from churches, businesses, schools, and individuals.

During summer months, produce is provided by the local Farmers Markets, University of Montevallo Organic Garden, and individuals.

VOLUNTEERS *helping others*

Since its beginning, Shelby Emergency Assistance has depended on volunteers to provide a variety of services.



In 2013:

- **95** Volunteers provided office/clerical services, assisted with the food pantry, worked in the thrift store, delivered supplies, and provided direct assistance to clients.
- Volunteers provided over **3,070** hours of service.

INDIVIDUALS ASSISTED THROUGH OUR SOCIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

698 Social work assessments

Food assistance provided for **1,217** individuals

Housing assistance provided for **134** individuals

Purchase of **190** prescriptions

Financial assistance for **125** doctor and dentist visits

Power assistance for **471** individuals to prevent disconnection

Water bill assistance to **97** individuals to prevent disconnection

Gas heating bill assistance for **54** individuals

EDUCATION SERVICES

In 2013 there were **848** individuals that received services from the Education Department. One of the services provided is budget management. The client attends a budget session and information is given to help the individual meet expenses and become more self-sufficient. There were **229** budgeting sessions provided during the year.



Services include:

- **32** GED and tutoring sessions
- **61** job search services provided
- **14** resume preparation
- **20** Pharmaceutical Assistance Applications

Other services include:

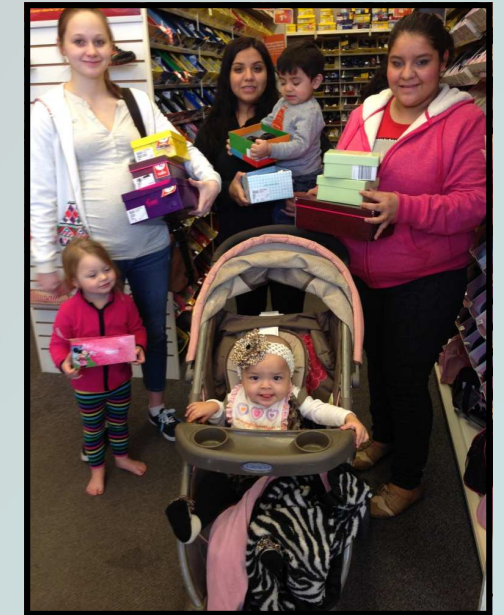
- School supplies for **134** children

In 2013:

- **65** teens participated in STEP
