2016 was a year of many changes for SEA, beginning with the re-location of our office. Each change brought with it adjustments, new insights and lessons that will stay with us. When we moved from our office of over 20 years, we learned what a caring community we have from the many individuals and churches who offered help so that we could continue serving our clients. They offered their buildings; they connected us to resources; and they showed their support for this agency.

During the initial weeks of living out of boxes and being without computers and telephones, we were able to relate to the experiences of our clients when they have no place to call home. As the year continued, our clients found the new office and we found our new normal. We learned that although it can be frustrating, these struggles can help a group grow closer and more resilient.

By the end of the year, University Baptist Church had given us a house that will eventually become the new SEA office. We were grateful for the gift of a permanent office, with opportunities for providing new services, such as job training programs and nutrition classes for parents. It had been a long year, but things were now much brighter.

Looking back over the past year, we realize that our greatest accomplishment was that despite all the challenges, we never closed our doors and stopped serving clients. Our commitment to serving people in Shelby County and helping them become self-sufficient members of our community remained intact. We are proud of that and excited for what the future holds for SEA.

SOCIAL SERVICES

SEA's social services are provided by licensed social workers who complete assessments, develop service plans, and provide assistance to stabilize the crisis situation. The social workers are knowledgeable of local resources and often collaborate with other agencies to better serve individuals and families in our community.

Food donations are received from churches, businesses, schools, and individuals.

During summer months, produce is provided by the University of Montevallo Organic Garden, local Farmers Markets, and individuals.

EDUCATION SERVICES

In 2016 there were 689 individuals who received services from the Education Department. One of the services provided is budget management. The client attends a budget session and information is given to help the individual meet expenses and become more self-sufficient.

Services include:

- 218 Budgeting Assistance
- 99 Job and resume search services provided
- 10 Pharmaceutical Assistance Applications
- 9 Homes received Smoke Alarm installation

S.T.E.P. SERVICES

Shelby Teens for Effective Parenting, STEP, is available to pregnant or parenting teens (ages 12-19) who are residents of Shelby County. STEP meets on a weekly basis at Shelby County Schools and the classes are designed to directly impact the physical and emotional well being of teen parents. Lessons include prenatal and parenting topics. The goal is to promote healthy babies and moms, educate parenting teens to care for their children;

support healthy lifestyle choices while encouraging school attendance and graduation.

In 2016:

- 45 teens participated in STEP
- 98% of the teens maintained school enrollment
- Of 18 births to teens, all were healthy babies
 with birth weights (5 lbs, 8 oz+)

The SEA Thrift Store provides assistance to our clients who are in need of clothing, household items, furniture and appliances.

In 2016:

- SEA Thrift Store assisted 81 individuals with needed items.
- 7 families were assisted who were homeless or victims of house fires.
- 29 children received clothing assistance.
- Items provided to clients were valued at \$1,859.
