SEA's past year was a 'building' year in many ways. We served more clients, improved interagency coordination, and increased our outreach and public relations efforts. We were fortunate to have a UM Marketing student intern work with us on expanding our social media presence and increasing the community's awareness of our services to individuals and families in crisis.

Also during 2017, renovation work began on the new SEA office. Our Board members spent many hours reviewing building plans, helping with landscaping, and keeping the project on track. SOCIAL SERVICES

SEA's social services are provided by licensed social service professionals who complete assessments, develop service plans, and provide assistance to stabilize the crisis situation. The case workers are knowledgeable of local resources and often collaborate with other agencies to better serve individuals and families in our community.



FOOD ASSISTANCE PROVIDED TO

1,435 INDIVIDUALS

Food donations are received from churches, businesses, schools, and individuals. During summer months, produce is provided by the University of Montevallo Organic Garden, local Farmers Markets, and individuals.

1,882 INDIVIDUALS ASSISTED THROUGH OUR SOCIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

SERVICES INCLUDE: 796 Social Work Assessments

- Housing assistance provided for 85 individuals
- Power assistance for 505 individuals to prevent disconnection
- Water bill assistance to 151 individuals to prevent disconnection
- Gas Heating bill assistance for 14 individuals
- \bullet Home visits to provide services to 26 individuals





- Purchase of 128 prescriptions
- Financial assistance for 122 doctor and dentist visits

EDUCATION SERVICES

In 2017 there were 731 individuals who received services from the Education Department. One of the services provided is budget management. The client attends a budget session and together a spending plan is developed. This may include ways to make better spending choices, tips for shopping more economically and debt reduction. The end result is a reasonable plan for the client to meet his/her household expenses.

Services include:

- 173 Budgeting Assistance
- 65 Job and resume search services provided
- 5 Pharmaceutical Assistance Applications
- 6 Homes received Smoke Alarm installation

S.T.E.P. SERVICES

Shelby Teens for Effective Parenting, STEP, is available to pregnant or parenting teens (ages 12-19) who are residents of Shelby County. STEP meets on a weekly basis at Shelby County Schools and the classes are designed to directly impact the physical and emotional well being of teen parents. Lessons include prenatal and parenting topics.

- 26 teens participated in STEP
- 94% of the teens maintained school enrollment
- Of 10 births to teens, all were healthy babies with birth weights (5 lbs, 8 oz+)
