In 2018 there were 768 individuals who received services from the Education Department. One of the services provided is budget management. The client attends a budget session and together a spending plan is developed. This may include ways to make better spending choices, tips for shopping more economically and debt reduction. The end result is a reasonable plan for the client to meet his/her household expenses.

STEP meets on a weekly basis at schools in Shelby County and the classes are designed to directly impact the physical and emotional well being of teen parents. Lessons include prenatal and parenting topics.


Our Goal

A Young Mother's Success Story

Maria was 14 and pregnant when she joined the STEP Program. After giving birth to a healthy little boy, she struggled to stay in school and often considered giving up. With the help of school counselors and the STEP coordinator over the next few years, she was finally able to obtain her GED. Afterward the STEP coordinator, began assisting with job search and practice interviewing.


