

DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

In looking back on 2023, it was a year of continued growth, fundraising success, accolades, and new beginnings.

With retirements in early 2023, we lost more than 80 years of experience from three valued staff members in Sally Ortgies, Dave Sadler, and Melanie Perry. Marco Alvarez was promoted to Superintendent of Parks from Park Planner in January. I began my tenure as Parks and Recreation Director on April 3, the same day that two new staff members began their career with West Des Moines. Laura Murphy, Superintendent of Recreation, and Eric Doll, Park Planner. On May 30, Naturalist, Jess Lancial, started in her new role and in November, Cory Warner, RecPlex Facility Specialist, was promoted to a full-time position. As Director, I could not be more excited about these promotions and new additions to our team and the impact that each of them will have on our community!

2023 was a banner year with wide-ranging programs offered, facility visitors, projects completed, and economic impacts. The MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex had one million visitors come through the doors and hosted 68 special events including AAU Junior Olympic Games in late July and early August. Playgrounds at Willow Springs Park, Peony Park, and Scenic Valley Park were renovated and reopened in early summer with a focus on inclusivity and a more welcoming environment for all. The \$1.9 million playground at Raccoon River Park also got a much-needed makeover and reopened to the public with a ribbon cutting on October 14.

The 52,000 square foot playground provides ample seating, landscape throughout the site, and amenities that encourages play of people of all ages and abilities. The Recreation division had more than 12,000 program registrations and more than 900 adult sports teams participate the past year. We are fortunate to have tremendous sports venues in Holiday Park Baseball, Holiday Park Girls Softball, Raccoon River Park Softball Complex and the MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex that are tremendous assets to our community as well. These sports complexes contributed to \$41.8 million economic impact this past year.

We provide our community everyday enjoyment through people, parks, and programs and I could not be prouder to lead this department and work alongside the talented, dedicated, and passionate staff that carry out our mission every single day. Our work is valued by City management, City Council, and our residents and for that, we could not be more grateful. More great things to come from Parks and Recreation in 2024!

In West Des Moines, we are fortunate to have similar venues in Holiday Park Baseball, Holiday Park Girls Softball, Raccoon River Park Softball Complex, and the MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex that host local, regional, and national events and tournaments that attract visitors from across the nation. Direct economic impact includes local spending at hotels, restaurant visits, attractions, transportation costs, and entry fees. The Parks division continues to strive to provide safe and inviting playgrounds in our community. To continue to provide this level of service, playgrounds are programed to be replaced generally on a twenty-year lifecycle.

Playgrounds replaced in 2023 were all designed with a focus on inclusive design. In addition to a more accessible safety surfacing, the new playgrounds included inclusive play features to allow for children of all abilities to play together. Playgrounds scheduled to be replaced in 2024 include Jaycee Park, Crossroads Park, and Kiwanis Park.







Renovated playgrounds that opened in 2023 included Peony Park, Willow Springs Park, Scenic Valley Park, and Raccoon River Park. These playgrounds were the first in our system to utilize a poured-in-place rubber safety surfacing which greatly enhances accessibility and reduces maintenance.

VALLEY VIEW PARK PICKLEBALL COMPLEX



The Complex was completed in late 2022 and programmed in 2023. The complex features eight, stand-alone, lighted courts on the western side of the park, off of 88th Street. Leagues, reservations, and an inaugural tournament made for a very successful first year! Future improvements for the complex include a parking lot and a shelter/restroom facility.

In 2023, the MidAmerican Energy Company RecPlex completed its second full year of operation featuring a full array of special events, accolades, and community engagement. 

PUBLIC ART

The <u>vision</u> of the West Des Moines Public Art Program is the creation of a diverse collection of public works of art of high aesthetic and intellectual quality and excellence along with a program that promotes cultural expression and artistic appreciation.

The <u>mission</u> of the West Des Moines Public Art Program is to create a city with enriching public spaces incorporating public works of art that offer moments of discovery and opportunities for reflection and growth--a city with public art woven into the fine grain detail of the public infrastructure.

RISING FROM THE PRAIRIE

Rising from the Prairie, the City's newest public art piece, was unveiled on December 7 at Railroad Park. This \$50,000 commissioned work by artist Daniel Perry represents the past, present, and future of West Des Moines and Valley Junction. Located at 425 Railroad Avenue, it features native prairie grasses, railroad elements, historic buildings, landmarks, and abstract versions of the city roadmap and Raccoon River.



FREE LITTLE ART MART

The first Free Little Art Mart (FLAM) was installed in April at Peony Park (1100 63rd Street), funded by the Public Art Advisory Commission. The FLAM allows anyone to take or leave free art. Simple rules encourage sharing creativity and self-expression: Take any artwork that inspires you, contribute suitable creations for all ages, and share your finds and contributions on the FLAM Facebook page by scanning the QR code on-site. Help fill its shelves by donating art and spread joy through artistic exchange.



LOOKING AHEAD

ATHENE PEDESTRIAN BRIDGE

The construction of the Athene Pedestrian Bridge began in 2023. At the end of the calendar year, one of the six spans over the Raccoon River is in place and the concrete river piers for the remaining five spans are nearly complete. Once the concrete is in place for the main river span, the focus will shift to the approach bridge spans on the south side of the river in Walnut Woods State Park. Once the bridge is complete, the trail segments will be paved. The entire project is anticipated to be completed by fall 2024.



RACCOON RIVER GREENWAY 1ST STREET RIVER ACCESS

An extensive six-month master planning process was completed in 2023 for a portion of the east Raccoon River Greenway. The master plan site is situated on 35-acres of city-owned land north of the Raccoon River, west of 1st Street, and south of Railroad Avenue. Proposed improvements identified include recreation opportunities such as fishing, paved trail connections, single-track trails, water access, low-impact camping, and ecological restoration. The first phase (1st Street River Access) has been identified as a proposed water trail access point in the Iowa Confluence Water Trails (ICON) master plan. This river access project is being completed in partnership with Polk County Conservation and will serve various types of watercrafts including boats, rafts, kayaks, and canoes. Other improvements include a paved access road, parking lot, watercraft loading zone, cast-in-place concrete launch, site lighting, native landscaping, and signage. The construction is planned for 2024 with completion in fall 2024.




RECPLEX EXPANSION

With the sustained success and increased demand for ice time, combined with the ever growing need for special event and multi use space, a plan for the expansion of the RecPlex has taken shape. The expansion would include a third sheet of ice, additional meeting room space, and expanded food and beverage offerings. Conversations with several stakeholders and potential partners are taking place to ensure both current and future needs are considered and accounted for. The fundraising and community engagement component is expected to rollout in 2024.
