country's rich unique heritage and celebrates the diversity of thought, religion, and philosophies that have come to define the United States.


Community Service

increase awareness of child abuse and how it can be prevented. Such projects are implemented through Exchange Clubs and Exchange Club Centers for the Prevention of Child Abuse across the country. Through the scholarly-reviewed Exchange Parent Aide home visitation model, child abuse prevention experts work directly with at-risk families.

Through the efforts of the NEC Foundation
and its benefactors, more than 1.8 million
children and more than 770,000 families
have escaped the cycle of child abuse.
