
responsibility seriously and show his love everywhere we go and in Jesus' name! Amen? Love in Him, Pastor Ed



# **Scales of the Faithful**

# For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you. Matthew 7:2 NIV

He who believes in Jesus Christ shall not be judged—unbelief is a force that will condemn the unbeliever to eternal judgement, and he shall not enter the Kingdom of God. Ah, but scripture also tells the *believer* to be very careful not to judge others for fear that they will be judged with equal measure.

If we are totally honest with ourselves, we'd have to accept the fact that we tend to judge others far more often and too quickly than we would want to admit. How easy is it to do? Well, if we were able to end each day by reading a transcript of our thoughts and spoken words, we would be very surprised how frequently we say or think judgmental things. Sometimes it seems judgmental thoughts pop into our heads automatically no matter how hard we try to prevent them. Our "blink" kicks in and we tend to "sum-up" a person at first glance. Consider this: have you ever noticed someone walk into church on a Sunday dressed in a manner that you think is inappropriate for a worship service? "Look at how that person is dressed!" Isn't it more important that they were there to worship than how they are dressed? God won't care, so why should we?

In his book, <u>Blink</u>, Malcolm Gladwell<sup>1</sup> reveals his viewpoint of human judgement: "The reality is that we go through our daily life instinctively judging people within the first two seconds of contact no matter whether we know them or not." As the book title proclaims, Gladwell labels that process – when our mind makes a series of conclusions about a person based upon our instinct, sight, and experience in about two seconds – as "blink". Our mind quickly passes judgement, and then we react accordingly. Gladwell then justifies those instant conclusions by calling them powerful, important, rational, and often accurate. But when are those snap judgments good and when are they not? Could we be wrongfully misjudging people? According to Gladwell: "Less is more. The less we know about a person, the better our initial judgement will be." I disagree—from my own past experience, I formed a snap judgement about a person only to discover I was wrong after I got to know them.

As faithful members of the Community Church of Oak Orchard, we strive to maintain our outreach approach, connect with our community, and grow in our faith. Our annual Community Day held this month has augmented our church's outreach. What better way to share the love of God than to welcome our community to join us for food, fun, and fellowship. To love God is to love people. That is the message from our church and from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that if we ask anything according to his will he hears us. - 1John 5:14


Then you will call on me and come and pray to me, and I will listen to you. - Jeremiah 29:12

## **CONTAGIOUS FAITH**

This month's Contagious Faith spotlight is Millie Charnick. In this article Millie will share her journey as a child of the one true King.

I was born and raised in Oak Orchard and have been a member of the Community Church of Oak Orchard since childhood. Initially attending primarily during Easter and Christmas for gifts and candy, my mother stated if you don't go every Sunday, you cannot attend Christmas or Easter at the church, so we went every Sunday. As part of the church's youth group, we engaged in Bible study, enjoyed roller-skating with our youth counselors, and collectively fundraised for the church steeple installation, a project we took great pride in. A couple years ago we held a reunion with former youth group members and realized some have changed their beliefs.



Currently, I serve as the VP of Operations at the Boys and Girls Clubs of Delaware, overseeing clubs across Sussex and Kent County. My journey began as a program director at the Oak Orchard club, where we annually organized a Christmas play involving the children. I recall instances where some participants questioned the inclusion of Jesus in our play, which presented an opportunity to explain the true meaning of Christmas to them, a concept they had not previously understood. We maintained a collection of Bible stories in our club library, invited children to Sunday school and vacation Bible school, and witnessed touching moments such as a young girl's sadness that she did not know this friend some of the other girls were talking about named Jesus, prompting heartfelt discussions and explanations. Seeing the heartache children were going through every day at the club made me realize how blessed I had been growing up with a father and mother. Some of these children don't have food at home, some have been abused, a life I knew nothing about.

While my role now focuses less on daily club operations, my Christian faith remains integral to my identity, known and respected by colleagues. Under the leadership of Erica, our new director, we continue to foster a relationship with the church, welcoming preschoolers to learn songs and stories of Jesus. Additionally, our annual Christmas concert at the church attracts numerous families, further strengthening community bonds. This year, we facilitated the transfer of 11 children from the Boys and Girls Clubs to Vacation Bible School.

Personally, I cherish my family, including one son, three grandchildren, two stepchildren, three step-grandchildren, and one great-grandchild. Family is paramount to me; while not all share my faith, I pray daily for their salvation, hoping for an eternal reunion."

As the associate pastor, it has been my privilege to be responsible for the contagious faith person of each month. Millie is a great blessing to this church and a great blessing to the children of our community and nearby communities. Children have come to know Jesus because of her boldness in sharing the love of Christ. And just as Millie has shared, the contagious faith experience continues because there were youth leaders and parents before her that made it possible for her to become the contagious person she is! Amen!

At age 3, I'd sit at my grandmother's grand piano and play on the keys. After I turned 8, that piano was given to us so I could begin piano lessons. At age 12 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, I was referred to a former concert pianist and teacher, Helen Ryad Vinograd, who had escaped from Poland during the Nazi occupation. Even though my initial audition was weak, she agreed to be my teacher as long as I practiced 1 hour each day. She transformed my piano playing skills as I studied the works of the masters.

In my teens, I was exposed to some outstanding hymn music played in what was called the "evangelistic style, such as Rudy Atwood and Ted Smith. My heart yearned to be able to transform a written hymn into music, so I asked God in prayer to give me the gift to do that. So, one summer night I dreamt about the hymn, "Trust & Obey", and that dream started my journey to improvising the printed page.



I continued to learn and play the piano through high school, college, and beyond. I played the classics, church, and Broadway music. I accompanied soloists, choirs, and choruses and had the privilege of accompanying the vocalist, Dave Boyer, and the great opera bass singer, Simon Estes, a friend of our family. I preferred accompanying others because I feared playing solo, but the Lord helped me overcome that fear. I give God the glory for all my achievements in competitions and performances not only playing the piano, but also in my other endeavors in drama, and ballroom dancing. I play at our church because I know the Lord wants me to.

#### **Guitarist: Brent Parsons**

I've lived here in the area just east of Millsboro all of my life. I got my first guitar for Christmas when I was 12 years old, and I've been playing and collecting guitars ever since. This Christmas (2024) will mark 30 years since I first picked up a guitar. I first started playing in a church at Mary Mother of Peace in Oak Orchard when I was 16, and was a member of the music group there for many years. In 2014, my family and I made the move to the Community Church of Oak Orchard and in 2015 I asked Karen if I could join in and play guitar during the service. 
T'was the night before school, when all through the town, the parents were cheering - a robust sound!!
