God's Gifts Are Wrapped in Love, Not Paper

As for you, people of Israel, this is what the Sovereign Lord says: "Go and serve your idols, every one of you! But afterward you will surely listen to me and no longer profane my holy name with your gifts and idols." Ezekiel 20:39 NIV

I was raised in a moderate income family and my mom taught me to make do with what we had. But in the 1980's, I joined the ranks of the "Yuppie" generation who's mantra was: "Possessions determine a person's worth and making do with what you

have isn't enough. "I was making a good salary as a manager with a communications electronics firm and didn't lack anything, but I always seemed to be looking for something else—something more. Nothing I already had was enough. My insatiable thirst for *more* couldn't be quenched, so I always felt empty. Materialism's whispers soon became shouts that penetrated the hearts of many during that era—*what you have isn't enough!* But reality hit the Yuppies in 1987—the stock market crashed followed by a hard recession in the early 90's. Time to suck it up buttercup!

In his powerful message last September, Pastor Allen spoke about the time when Jesus gave a sermon to a large group of people and proclaimed His identity, which wasn't well received. "*From this time many of his disciples turned back and no longer followed him.*" So Jesus asked the Twelve, "*You do not want to leave too, do you?*" Pastor Allen asked us, "When did you leave and walk away?" I answered silently—"I left the church and walked away in 1985 after my fiancé Jolene Wanatosky called off our engagement due to a disagreement." We worked for the same company and lived in the same town, so I got a new job, moved to Virginia, and decided to focus only on my career.

I moved to Baltimore in 1995 and felt a spiritual nudge—I'd been away from the church for 10 years and my faith had faded, so I needed to put Jesus back into my life. I was baptized and raised in the Greek Orthodox Church, but the Orthodox traditions no longer appealed to me, so I was led to an inner-city Methodist church with outreach ministries that gave me opportunities to serve. Once I put Jesus back into my life and focused on *what I could give* instead of *what I could get*, and *what I could share* instead of *what I could hold*, I was back on track going towards the light and leaving the darkness of the material world behind me. My life immediately changed for the better.

Wants come in many different forms and has many faces but speaks of only one thing—<u>more!</u> Today's society reeks of "*want*" and we see evidence of that in every TV commercial, magazine ad, and billboard—more is better! We can all easily be distracted by the incessant consumer marketing message: "Whatever you have isn't enough; there's something bigger, better, and shinier available that will make you happier and it's on sale!" This is the root of the debt epidemic in our country and contributes to the prejudice, hatred, and violence that's plaguing our society.

As we journey through the season of Advent, we are reminded how Christmas is manipulated and distorted by the clever and persistent marketing strategies that draw us away from the "*real reason for the season*". So, let's keep our faith in perspective as we make this Advent journey together and remember to keep the light of God in our hearts as we put up the holiday lights in our homes. We all like to give and receive gifts at Christmastime, but we must be careful how much value we put on them. God's greatest gift to the world was Jesus, and the gifts He gives us now aren't the ones wrapped in colorful paper with bows stacked under the Christmas tree, they're the family and friends gathered around the tree *wrapped in love*.

EMMANUEL-GOD WITH US +

Lord, as we begin a New Year, help us to see the trappings of the "more is better" ideology and give us wisdom to avoid them. Keep us mindful of the blessings we have and help us accept them as being enough. Inspire us to remember and help those around us with less. Amen



THE FAMILY OF GOD

If you are a disciple of Jesus, you have two families. The first one, the family of origin, is the one you were born into. You had no control or choice in this matter. Your family of origin may have been very nurturing, or it may have had disfunction. Either way – your family of origin is fixed and cannot be changed. However, when you are born again through Jesus Christ you inherit a new family – the family of God.

God's church is supposed to be a group of people in relationship who do life together. Relationships are fundamental because the gospel gets lived out within those relationships. Real life can be lived out when we are abiding in relationships with each other. This is where we learn to use and put into practice the Fruit of the Spirit that God has placed within us.

God calls His Church the family of God. The early church met together in the temple courts, but also met together in homes where they were devoted to deep abiding relationships. They became spiritual family. In Acts 2:42 and following we see them exhibiting many of the characteristics of a family. They ate together, shared their possessions, and even sold their possessions if needed to take care of each other. They focused on the Word of God and the teachings of the apostles.

These actions not only depict the attitudes and actions of a family, but this is also the kind of bond and relationships that develop in a small group. A small group is a place where people can be relationally discipled as part of a spiritual family.

Satan has taken the word family and distorted its meaning. No one has grown up with a perfect family. We are all broken in ways that affect the family of origin negatively. Some fathers abuse or abandon their wives and children. Some wives leave their homes or are emotionally abusive. Some siblings are cruel to one another. Some children are disobedient to parents. That is all sin at work.

But God is in the business of redemption. Whatever your experience with family has been, I encourage you to press on towards the family that God describes in the Bible. Let your experiences and definitions be rooted in the Bible, and allow God to start a new thing in your generation, both in and through you. Jesus redefines for you what "family" truly means – the family that God helps you create.¹

THE REAL MAN IN RED

We're all familiar with the legend of "Santa Claus" who is said to live at the North Pole with a crew of elves, a team of flying reindeer, and a wife who keeps him plump and jolly. A visit to any mall or store during the fall season shows how successfully the retail industry has marketed this legend into a billion-dollar business on which the entire years' profitability is based. It was a popular belief that the modern day image of "Santa Claus" had been created by Coca-Cola, which isn't true, but their ad campaign that began in the 1920's was responsible for promoting that image around the world with the catch-phrase: "The pause that refreshes." Then, the music industry followed Coca-Cola's success: Elvis Presley released "Santa Bring My Baby Back (To Me)" in 1957 that started a flurry of modern Christmas music with "Santa Claus" in the lyrics for almost every genre.



However, the real man in red who inspired the legend was different altogether from the modern day figure and is known in the Christian community as St. Nicholas. Though St. Nicholas is one of the most popular saints in the Greek and Latin churches, there is little historical certainty about him. We do know that St. Nicholas was born around 245 AD in Asia Minor (now known as Turkey) and was the only child of a wealthy family. His parents died of the plague leaving him an orphan at a young age, so he spent his youth in a monastery with his uncle, the Bishop of Parra. The young Nicholas was extremely devout and felt he had no need for the money he inherited. Instead, he gave his wealth away to the poor and impoverished. Nicholas came to see that helping the less fortunate makes one's life richer than anything else.




When the Archbishop of Myra died, the church selected Nicholas (then 30 years old) as his successor. Bishop Nicholas wore the traditional red velvet robe trimmed in white ermine with a matching miter (hat) that resembles the hats worn by the three wise men who visited the newborn Jesus in the stable—sound familiar? The most widely accepted story of how Nicholas became so famous as being generous tells us he heard about a rich man who lost all his money when his business failed. The man had three daughters, all wishing to be married, but he had no money for a dowry. In desperation, the man decided to sell his oldest daughter into slavery so the rest of the family could survive. The night before the daughter was to be sold, Nicholas gave the family several gold pieces. It was the custom in that culture to leave shoes outside the home by the front door, so according to the legend, Nicholas left the gold in the girl's shoes.

Another popular account claims he threw the gold pieces down the chimney where, by chance, they landed inside the freshly washing stockings hung by the fireplace to dry overnight—sound familiar?

The legend of St. Nicholas spread throughout Europe and his followers increased. He became well known for his generosity but also for his unwavering support of Christianity—a difficult campaign during a period when Muslins were invading and the lure of Paganism threatened religion's foundation. Nicholas was said to have performed many miracles which, after his death on December 6, 345 or 352 AD, led to his elevation to sainthood. His remains are still preserved in the church of San Nicola in Bari. It is said that an oily substance flows from the resting place and to this day people claim it has medicinal powers.

During the Middle Ages, thousands of churches were built in his honor and December 6th was designated as the Feast of St. Nicholas—a day to "give gifts" to children and the needy. However, St. Nicholas was banished by most European countries during the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century when Martin Luther sought to eradicate the worship of saints. Additionally, the new Protestants would not tolerate St. Nicholas as their "gift giver" since he was too closely tied to the Catholic Church. The Dutch were able to keep the Feast of St. Nicholas alive and brought their traditions with them when they founded New Amsterdam in the early 1600's which later became New York. The Dutch custom of commemorating the Feast of St. Nicholas spread through the US and became known as "Santa Klass" due to the mispronunciation of the Dutch "Sinterklaas" and then later evolved into "Santa Claus".



Decades later, the Christian society found it more appropriate to bring the "Children's Festival" closer to that of Christmas—the celebration for the infant Jesus. From that time on, St. Nicholas started making his rounds delivering presents to the homes of Christian families around the world during the night of Christmas Eve. Clement C. Moore wrote the poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" in 1822 that later became the ever famous and popular "The Night Before Christmas". This poem gave us the modern image of Santa Claus—a portly man with a white beard dressed in a red suit trimmed in white fur with a matching pointed hat. But, you'll discover that Santa Claus wears many different costumes in various colors and styles depending upon the country and local culture where his legend is celebrated. And now you know about *the real man in red*!

The Feast of St. Nicholas marks the beginning of the Advent Season for some denominations. Years ago, my family would gather on December 6th to celebrate St. Nicholas Day with dinner and the exchange of personalized stockings filled with small gifts. That tradition reminded us to be thankful for the little joys God brings us that make our life so rich. It also provided us with a time of reflection of the year past and inspired humble preparation for celebrating the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, the real Christmas story and the true reason for the season.

We don't celebrate the Feast of St. Nicholas here at the Community Church of Oak Orchard, but as a family of faith we are reminded by his example that we are called to share our wealth with those less fortunate and in need of our help and love. We are blessed to be a blessing.

May your Christmas holiday be rich in experience and filled with love!

The Bible doesn't tell us when Jesus was born so we don't know his actual date of birth. Christmas was first celebrated on December 25 in 336 AD, while Emperor Constantine (the first Christian Roman Emperor) reigned and the date was later officially declared by Pope Julius I. We don't know why that date was selected and religious historians theorize because it's nine months after The Annunciation (March 25) and it supersedes the ancient Roman pagan midwinter festivals that took place in late December. But we do know that Bethlehem's climate 2,000 years ago

was semi-arid and similar to Phoenix, so the songs, stories, and legends about Jesus "shivering in the cold" aren't accurate. Jesus was likely born during the dry season when it's quite warm.
