How wonderful to know that He who redeems us is also able and willing to keep us until the day of redemption. *Ephesians 4:30*. Have a blessed season of Easter.




















ODYSSEA: A SPIRITUAL JOURNEY

This month's contagious space spotlight is **Ted Brown**.



PAY IT FORWARD

What does pay it forward mean?

Pay it forward is an expression for when the recipient of an act of kindness does something kind for someone else rather than simply accepting or repaying the original good deed.

Where does pay it forward come from?

The concept of pay it forward is ancient. We can find it explored in literature ranging from Ancient Greek comedies to Benjamin Franklin's letters. Ralph Waldo Emerson, for one, developed a theory of it in his 1841 essay "Compensation": "In the order of nature we cannot render benefits to those from whom we receive them, or only seldom. But the benefit we receive must be rendered again, line for line, deed for deed, cent for cent, to somebody."

The actual phrase *pay it forward* was coined in 1916 by author Lily Hardy Hammond in her novel *In the Garden of Delight*, where she wrote a bit of wordplay: "You don't pay love back; you *pay it forward*." Celebrated sci-fi author Robert Heinlein is credited with popularizing the term in his 1951 book *Between Planets*. Heinlein later started a humanitarian organization, the Heinlein Society, known for abiding by a *pay it forward* philosophy. It is dedicated to teaching it to others.

The phrase and concept inspired an award-winning 1999 novel by Catherine Ryan Hyde, which features a young protagonist who launches a *pay it forward* campaign. Hyde then established a foundation called "*Pay It Forward*" committed to spreading various acts of kindness around the globe. Her novel was adapted into a major motion film in 2000, further helping to make *pay it forward* a household phrase and inspiring *Pay It Forward* Day, April 28th, organized since 2007.

Does the pay it forward concept appear in the Bible?

Jesus taught in Matthew 18:21–35, that paying it forward is a requirement for those who have received God's forgiveness. He told a parable of a man who had been forgiven a huge debt by the king, because the debtor had begged for mercy. However, after being freed from the debt, he found a fellow who owed him a very small debt, by comparison. Although he had been shown a great mercy, he refused the same consideration to his fellow who had pled for more time to pay. When the king found this out, he was angry, and threw the original debtor into prison until he paid the entire debt. Jesus summarized the story by saying, "So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also unto you, if ye from your hearts forgive not every one his brother their trespasses."

What is the theory of pay it forward?

If you're new to the concept, then think of it as this: the receiver of a good deed repays it to others instead of to the original benefactor and asks their recipients to do the same. Meaning one good deed or act of kindness can have ripples felt far and wide beyond its starting point.

What are the three rules in pay it forward?

- #1 It has to be something that really helps people.
- #2 Something they can't do by themselves.
- #3 I do it for them, they do it for three other people.

This concept has been misinterpreted and misused by people who think doing good deeds for others is a way of "paying your way into heaven" which is wrong!

United States—Where Christianity Is Surging, Falling

The share of Americans who identify as Christian continues to fall across the U.S, with the exception of two states. However, the decline appears to be leveling out, as younger Americans buck the trend of being less religious than the generation above them, according to a Pew study. Its Religious Landscape 2023-24 study found 62% of American adults identified as Christian, down from 71% when it was last conducted in 2014.

Why It Matters

The U.S. has seen a steady decline in practiced Christianity across generations since the 1950s; however, while Christianity might not be practiced as much as it was a decade ago, younger generations may be returning to church. Christianity has declined since 2014, but other religions have also grown. In 2014, 0.9% Americans identified as Muslim, now 1.2% of Americans do. Hinduism has also grown from 0.7% of the population in 2014 to 0.9% today.

What To Know

Pew Research's Religious Landscape study surveyed more than 35,000 randomly selected adults from across the country in 2023 and 2024, ten years after its previous study on the subject. The state with the largest reduction in people calling themselves Christians was Oregon, down 18%, followed by Missouri and Iowa, both down 15%. The only two states where the share of the population identifying as Christian rose were Alaska, up 6 percent, and Delaware, up 1 percent. The survey found that each age group sees itself as less Christian than the last, with the exception of people born between 2000-2006—the youngest age group surveyed. That cohort were also less likely to view themselves as Christian, but bucked the trend by appearing no less religious than those in the second-youngest cohort, born in the 1990s.

In each group, 46% identified as Christian in the latest study—the first generation as likely to identify Christian as the previous. "Time will tell whether the recent stability in measures of religious commitment is the beginning of a lasting shift in America's religious trajectory," the study said. "But it is inevitable that older generations will decline in size as their members gradually die."

The most practiced form of Christianity in the U.S. is Evangelical Protestantism, with 23% of all Americans identifying as Evangelical. The second most practiced form of Christianity is Catholicism, at 19% of the population, followed by Mainline Protestant, with 11% of the population. The two most popular forms of Christianity for young people are Evangelical Protestantism and Catholicism, as 14% of all Evangelicals and 14 percent of all Catholics in the U.S. are between the ages of 18-29.

Additionally, although the survey found that rates of Christianity have declined, the vast majority of Americans share spiritual beliefs, as 86% of survey respondents believe they have a soul or spirit as well as a physical body, 83% believe in a God or a universal spirit, and 70% believe in an afterlife.

Hent de Vries, Professor of Religious Studies and Affiliated Professor of Philosophy at NYU, spoke with *Newsweek* about how data-driven studies of church membership or attendance may not capture the full picture of how religion shapes our lives. He said: "A reduction in active participation in forms of organizational religion may, paradoxically, very well go hand in hand with a deepened and broadened awareness of existential and political questions and concerns for which the so-called archives of historical religion continue to provide the most profound normative and imaginative resources." He added that digital media may play a role in diffusing older dogmas and teachings that in the past were less alluring to younger generations.

What Happens Next

Christianity, or some form of organized religion, appears to be appealing to young people in the U.S. again. It is unclear at this time if it is a trend, or if the number of Christians in the U.S. will level out, or even grow, in the next decade.

By The Numbers

70.6% of Americans are Christian—1.9% Jewish; <3% Hindy, Buddhist, or Muslin.

22.8% of Americans do not affiliate with a specific religion.

53% of Utah residents attend church at least once a week (highest rate in the US).

21% of Vermont residents attend church at least once a week (lowest rate in the US).

64% of people surveyed by Gallup in 2020 said that religion is "losing its influence" on American life, and 47% said they were part of a church or synagogue which is down from 51% in 2019.








Sky Olweiler
