1. The purpose of our school is to ensure all students learn at high levels.


2. Helping all students learn requires a collaborative and collective effort.

3. To assess our effectiveness in helping all students learn we must focus on results - evidence of student learning - and use results to inform and improve our professional practice and respond to students who need intervention or enrichment.

- Collaboration via Google Docs


FOCUS ON LEARNING

KEY STEPS TO A SUCCESSFUL PLC

- Create and adhere to group norms
- Set goals, and stick to them
- Be open and vulnerable
- Examine evidence to guide the PLC
- Stay grounded in the three big ideas
 - Every Student Can Learn
 - Collaboration is Key
 - Focus on Results
- Protect PLC time: create set times and stick to them



PLC MEETING SAMPLE STRUCTURE




- Focus what issue do we want to tackle?

- Reflection what evidence should we bring in?

 - Homework / Next Steps
- Unpack the results at the next PLC
