### Local Victorian House Draws Supernatural Speculation

The historic Weaver house has become the center of unusual activity in recent days, prompting multiple calls to the Magnolia Ridge Sheriff's Department.

Sheriff Scott Johnson confirmed that his office has received numerous reports from concerned citizens regarding strange occurrences at the property, which has been vacant since the passing of longtime resident Josiah Weaver earlier this year.

"We've had calls about lights flickering at odd hours, unusual sounds, and what some residents describe as voices coming from the house," Sheriff Williams stated. "We take all citizen concerns seriously."

Several neighbors have reported witnessing the phenomena, though accounts vary. Local resident Chelsea Morrison noted that the activity has been particularly disruptive to families with young children in the area.

"It's been unsettling for the whole neighborhood," Morrison said. "We just want to understand what's happening."

The Sheriff's Department continues to investigate the reports. Anyone with information is encouraged to contact the office during regular business hours.

The property remains privately owned, and officials remind the public that trespassing is prohibited

mystery, Murder at the Squawking Chicken.



### Recipe of the month

Pre heat oven 450

Lay Apple slices into the crust lined pan. Mix
sugar and cinnamon and pour over apples. Top

the apples. Lay top crust on and seal the sides
and vent the top of the crust.

Bake 10 minutes and lower the oven temperature to 350 and bake 30 - 35 more minutes.
