Introduction: Fasting is a discipline of the Christian life where we must let the Spirit lead us and search our hearts. There are no specific rules for fasting, except it is linked with prayer, going without eating food, and voluntary. Fasting is the opposite of gluttony. This series focuses on personal, private, and small group fasting for humiliation, direction, illumination, intercession, and sorrow. As we encourage one another to seek and find God's high calling for our lives and each other's lives, we grow in Christ.

Testimony: "If the solemnities of our fasting, though frequent, long, and severe, do not serve to put an edge upon devout affections, to quicken prayer, to increase Godly sorrow, and to alter the temper of our minds, and the course of our lives, for the better, they do not at all answer the intention, and God will not accept them as performed to Him." Matthew Henry

Text: Matthew 4:1-4, John 6:35-40 (Rightly Dividing Bible, KJVish compared w/Greek & Hebrew)

Matthew 4:1-4 **Temptation 1 – Lust of the Flesh** (hungry – manna/bread) Deut 8:3

¹ Then Jesus was led up of the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted of the devil. ² And when He had fasted forty days and forty nights, He was afterward hungry. ³ And when the tempter came to Him, He said, "If You be the Son of God, command that these stones become bread." ⁴ But He answered and said, "It is written, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God."

Note: Food is always the first of three categories of all temptation and resulting sin; see Genesis 3:6, Luke 4:1-13, & 1 John 2:16. The 40-day fast by Moses, Elijah, and Jesus is unique. This 40-day fast by Jesus in the wilderness is similar to the 40 years by Israel, 1 Corinthians 10:1-14, except Jesus was victorious in every temptation; therefore never sinned.

John 6:35-40 (context of 6:1-71)

³⁵ And Jesus said unto them, **I am the bread of life**: he that comes to Me shall never hunger; and he that believes on Me shall never thirst. ³⁶ But I said unto you, That ye also have seen Me, and believe not. ³⁷ All that the Father gives Me shall come to Me; and him that comes to Me I will in no wise cast out. ³⁸ For I came down from heaven, not to do My own will, but the will of Him that sent Me. ³⁹ And this is the Father's will which has sent Me, that of all which He has given Me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day. ⁴⁰ And this is the will of Him that sent Me, that everyone which sees the Son, and believes on Him, may have everlasting life: and I will raise him up at the last day.

Testimony: J. C. RYLE (Evangelical bishop of Liverpool who lived from 1816 to 1900)

Let us learn from our Lord's instruction about fasting, the great importance of cheerfulness in our religion. Those words, "anoint thy head, and wash thy face," are full of deep meaning. They should teach us to aim at letting men see that we find Christianity makes us happy. Never let us forget that there is not religion in looking melancholy and gloomy. Are we dissatisfied with Christ's wages, and Christ's service? Surely not! Then let us not look as if we were.

Text: Matthew 6:16-18, Luke 5:33-39 (Rightly Dividing Bible)

Matthew 6:16-18 Fast Publicly before Men versus Privately before our Father in Heaven

¹⁶ Moreover when ye fast, be not, as the hypocrites, of a sad countenance: for they disfigure their faces, that they may appear to men to fast. Verily I say to you, They have **their reward.** ¹⁷ But you, when you fast, anoint your head, and wash your face; ¹⁸ That you appear not to men to fast, but to your Father which is in secret: and **your Father, which sees in secret, shall reward you openly**.

Note: Fasting follows prayer in 6:5-15. See 1 Corinthians 7:5, Matthew 17:21. Pray always, fast often, or as desired.

Luke 5:33-39 The Disciples of John the Baptist ask Jesus about Fasting

³³ And they said unto Him, Why do the disciples of John fast often, and make prayers, and likewise [the disciples] of the Pharisees; but yours eat and drink? ³⁴ And He said unto them, Can ye make the **children of the bride chamber fast**, while the Bridegroom is with them? ³⁵ But the days will come, when the Bridegroom shall be taken away from them, and then they will fast in those days.

Parable to Contrast the New and the Old (cloth, bottles and wine) Testaments

³⁶ And He spoke also a parable unto them; No man puts a piece of a new garment upon an old; if otherwise, then both the new makes a tare, and the piece that was [taken] out of the new agrees not with the old. ³⁷ And no man puts **new wine** into **old bottles**; else the **new wine** will **burst the bottles**, and be spilled, and the bottles shall perish. ³⁸ But **new wine** must be put into **new bottles**; and both are preserved. ³⁹ No man also having drunk **old** [wine] straightway desires **new**: for he says, The **old** is better.

Testimony: Abraham Lincoln 16th President of the United States, 1861 - 1865

Proclamation 97—Appointing a Day of National Humiliation, Fasting, and Prayer

Para 4-5. "It behooves us, then, to humble ourselves before the offended Power, to confess our national sins, and to pray for clemency and forgiveness.

Now, therefore, in compliance with the request, and fully concurring in the views of the Senate, I do by this my proclamation designate and set apart Thursday, the 30th day of April, 1863, as a day of national humiliation, fasting, and prayer. And I do hereby request all the people to abstain on that day from their ordinary secular pursuits, and to unite at their several places of public worship and their respective homes in keeping the day holy to the Lord and devoted to the humble discharge of the religious duties proper to that solemn occasion."

Text: Acts 10:30-31, 27:21, 33-36 (Rightly Dividing Bible)

Acts 10:30-31 (24-33) Peter and Cornelius Share their Visions at Caesarea

³⁰ And Cornelius said, Four days ago I was fasting until this hour; and at the ninth hour I prayed in my house, and, behold, a man stood before me in bright clothing, ³¹ And said, Cornelius, your prayer is heard, and your alms are had in remembrance in the sight of God.

Acts 27:21, 31, 33-36 (27:27-44) The Shipwreck after 14 Nights of a Tempest

- ²¹ But after long abstinence Paul stood forth in the midst of them, and said, "Sirs, ye should have listened to me, and not have loosed from Crete, and to have gained this harm and loss.
- ³¹ Paul said to the centurion and to the soldiers, "Except these abide in the ship, ye cannot be saved."
- vs 31, The soldiers were needed to help beach the ship safely. The unbelievers and believers are working together. Here we see divine providence and human responsibility come together.
- ³³ And while the day was coming on, Paul begged them all to take food, saying, "This day is the fourteenth day that ye have tarried and continued fasting, having taken nothing. ³⁴ Wherefore I pray you to take [some] food: for this is for your health: for there shall not a hair fall from the head of any of you." ³⁵ And when he had thus spoken, **he took bread, and gave thanks to God in presence of them all:** and when he had broken [it], he began to eat. ³⁶ Then were they all of good cheer, and they also took [some] food.

11:22-33 An Example of Taking up the Cross and Denial of Self (speaking of is foolish)

²² Are they Hebrews? so [am] I. Are they Israelites? so [am] I. Are they the seed of Abraham? so [am] I. ²³ Are they ministers of Christ? (I speak as a fool) I [am] more; in labors more abundant, in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequent, in deaths often. ²⁴ Of the Jews five times received I forty [stripes] save one. ²⁵ Thrice I was beaten with rods, once was I stoned, thrice I suffered shipwreck, a night and a day I have been in the deep; ²⁶ [In] journeyings often, [in] perils of waters, [in] perils of robbers, [in] perils by [my own] countrymen, [in] perils by the heathen, [in] perils in the city, [in] perils in the wilderness, [in] perils in the sea, [in] perils among false brethren;


Inward & Outward – in this life

Note that these traits in the Apostle Paul's life relate to victory in trials God allows and persecution from the world; not his defeat in temptation and sin.

In this body we may not suffer persecution, yet we voluntarily present our bodies a living sacrifice in our labor, watchings, and fastings (Romans 12:1-2).

Watchings come before fastings because as we are awake on watch, and not sleepy, we discern when to fast (Romans 13:11). The etymology of the Greek word translated into watchings and it's root watch are nouns and a duty of spiritual awakeness. Some translators use the weaker and narrower word "sleeplessness." Certainly a word for further study, along with Paul's example for us in 1 Corinthians 9:24-27, 11:1-34, 2 Corinthians 10:1-18, 12:1-21.

2 Corinthians 6:4-10



Testimony: "Prayer is reaching out to the unseen; fasting is letting go of all that is seen and temporal. Fasting helps express, deepen, confirm the resolution that we are ready to sacrifice anything, even ourselves, to attain what we seek for the kingdom of God." Andrew Murray

Text: Romans 14 1-13 (Rightly Dividing Bible)

Romans 14:1-13 (in the context of 14:1 to 15:7. 1 Corinthians 8 in a different church & perspective)

1 Receive one who is weak in the faith, [but] not to disputes over doubtful things. 2 For one believes that he may eat all things: another, who is weak, eats herbs. ³ Let not him who eats despise him that eats not; and let not him who does not eat not judge him who eats: for God has received him. 4 Who are you to judge another man's servant? To his own master he stands or falls. Yes, he shall be held up: for God is able to make him stand. ⁵ One man esteems one day above another: another esteems every day [alike]. Let each be fully persuaded in his own mind. ⁶ He that regards the day, regards [it] to the Lord; and he that regards not the day, to the Lord he does not regard [it]. He that eats, eats to the Lord, for he gives God thanks; and he that eats not, to the Lord he eats not, and gives God thanks. ⁷ For none of us lives to himself, and no man dies to himself. ⁸ For whether we live, we live to the Lord; and whether we die, we die to the Lord: whether we live therefore, or die, we are the Lord's. ⁹ For to this end Christ both died, and rose, and lived again, that He might be Lord both of the dead and living. ¹⁰ But why do you judge your brother? Or why do you show contempt for your brother? For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of Christ. 11 For it is written, [As] I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to Me, and every tongue shall confess to God //Isaiah 42:35//. 12 So then everyone of us shall give account of himself to God. 13 Therefore let us not judge one another anymore: but judge this rather, not to put a stumbling block or an occasion to fall in [our] brother's way.

Talk: 7 Biblical Fasting Principles You MUST Apply Next Time You Fast – Allen Parr (12 minutes)

Remember: Fasting is a discipline of the Christian life where we must let the Spirit lead us and search our hearts. There are no specific rules for fasting, except it is linked with prayer, going without eating food, and voluntary. Fasting is the opposite of gluttony. This series focuses on personal, private, and small group fasting for humiliation, direction, illumination, intercession, and sorrow. As we encourage one another to seek and find God's high calling for our lives and each other's lives, we grow in Christ.

This week's communications should focus on prayer and encouraging (exhorting) one another.

- 1. How does this passage relate to yourself and others regarding fasting? (14:1-13 or 14:1-15:7)
- 2. Share your fasting and prayer plan or desire for this week. Remember, New Testament fasting is descriptive, not prescriptive. Do not share outside the small group except with family who needs to know.

Testimony: One way to begin to see how vastly indulgent we usually are is to fast. It is a long day that is not broken by the usual three meals. One finds out what an astonishing amount of time is spent in the planning, purchasing, preparing, eating and cleaning up of meals. Elisabeth Elliot

Text: Philippians 3 (12-17, in the context of chapter 3) (Rightly Dividing Bible)

Philippians 3:12-17 *Paul's Need* (12-13a): *Forget* (13b), *Reach* (13c), *and Press* (14)

¹² Not as though I had already attained, either were already perfect: but I follow after, if that I may apprehend that for which also I am apprehended of Christ Jesus. ¹³ Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but [this] one thing [I do], forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, ¹⁴ I press toward the goal for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

Note: vs 12, Follow = persecute (Gk dioko) 3:6, 3:12, 3:14 Press.

vs 13, Count = reckon Ro 6:11, apprehend (arrest), prize 1 Cor 9:24. High = to the brim, on top.

Our Help (15), **Walk** (16), **and Ensample** (17)

¹⁵ Let us therefore, as many as be perfect, be thus minded: and if in anything ye be otherwise minded, God shall reveal even this unto you. ¹⁶ Nevertheless, whereto we have already attained, let us walk by the same rule, let us mind the same thing. ¹⁷ Brethren, be followers together of me, and note them which walk so as ye have us for an ensample.

Note: vs 15, Perfect = complete in Jesus at the moment of salvation (Colossians 2:10), then our spiritual growth until I put off this body allows Jesus to be formed and complete in me. In other contexts: finish, fulfill, fully ripe fruit.

vs 16, Walk (orderly as soldiers), Rule (canon).

vs 17, Walk (physical, observable), Ensample, an internal example you see, hear, and observe over time.

Talk:

- 1. Share your fasting and prayer experience since we met last week?
- 2. How does this study on fasting and prayer affect the rest of this year or the rest of your life in this body?

- 3. The peace of God, knowing He hears me and loves me, will be present
- 4. Present our bodies a living sacrifice, Romans 12:1-2
- 5. Let the Holy Spirit speak to me and others (do not take control in any form)
- 6. Jesus will uniquely meet each person where they are
- 7. Meet after the time of fasting to share experiences
- 8. Remember, New Testament fasting is descriptive, not prescriptive do fast, but do not be prideful
