



DECEMBER 26

THE FIRST DAY OF KWANZAA SIGNIFIES TOGETHERNESS IN THE FAMILY, COMMUNITY, NATION, AND RACE.



"The well-being of mankind," He declares, "its peace and security are unattainable unless and until its unity is firmly established." "So powerful is the light of unity," is His further testimony, "that it can illuminate the whole earth. The one true God, He Who knoweth all things, Himself testifieth to the truth of these words... This goal excelleth every other goal, and this aspiration is the monarch of all aspirations."

DECEMBER 27

THE SECOND DAY OF KWANZAA SIGNIFIES THAT WE SHOULD DEFINE OURSELVES, NAME OURSELVES, CREATE FOR OURSELVES, AND SPEAK FOR OURSELVES, RATHER THAN BEING DEFINED, NAMED, CREATED FOR OR SPOKEN FOR BY OTHERS.

DECEMBER 29

Strive, therefore, to create love in the hearts in order that they may become glowing and radiant. When that love is shining, it will permeate other hearts even as this electric light illumines its surroundings. When the love of God is established, everything else will be realized. This is the true foundation of all economics. Reflect upon it. Endeavor to become the cause of the attraction of souls rather than to enforce minds. Manifest true economics to the people. Show what love is, what kindness is, what true severance is and generosity. This is the important thing for you to do. Act in accordance with the teachings of Bahá'u'lláh. .. Economic questions will not attract hearts. The love of God alone will attract them. Economic questions are most interesting; but the power which moves, controls and attracts the hearts of men is the love of God.

KWANZAA IS AN AFRICAN-AMERICAN CULTURAL HOLIDAY -

CELEBRATED PRIMARILY IN THE UNITED STATES, EUROPE, AND THE CARIBBEAN – BASED ON THE AFRICAN TRADITION OF CELEBRATING THE FIRST FRUITS OF THE HARVEST. IT WAS CONCEIVED AND DEVELOPED BY DR. MAULANA RON KARENGA IN 1966 TO CELEBRATE THE BOND BETWEEN THE ANCIENT ROOTS OF AFRICAN PEOPLE AND HER DESCENDANTS THROUGHOUT THE WORLD.

OBSERVED DECEMBER 26TH THROUGH AND INCLUDING JANUARY 1ST, IT IS A TIME SET ASIDE FOR BLACK PEOPLE OF THE DIASPORA OR 'CHILDREN OF AFRICA,' TO HONOR THEIR PAST, EVALUATE THEIR PRESENT, AND COMMIT THEMSELVES TO A MORE PRODUCTIVE FUTURE

EACH OF THE SEVEN DAYS IS DEVOTED TO ONE OF THE SEVEN PRINCIPLES OF THE NGUZO SABA, WHICH IS DRAWN FROM THE BASIC VALUE SYSTEM OF AFRICAN PEOPLE. SINCE ITS BEGINNINGS IN THE PAN-AFRICANIST MOVEMENT OF THE 1960S, KWANZAA HAS GROWN TO INCLUDE AFRICAN-AMERICANS, AFRICANS, AND THOSE FROM MULTIPLE CULTURAL AND RELIGIOUS TRADITIONS WHO JOIN IN THE CELEBRATION.
