


HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND FORCED MARRIAGES




WHY IS THE EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN KEY TO A SAFER AND MORE PROSPEROUS WORLD?

Gender discrimination is often seen from a human rights perspective; it is a violation of women's basic human rights, as embedded in the Universal Declaration, the UN Charter, and other such founding documents. Moreover, there is overwhelming evidence that restrictions and various forms of discrimination against women are also bad economics. They undermine the talent pool available to the private sector, distort power relationships within the family, and lead to inefficiencies in the use of resources. They contribute to creating an environment in which women, de facto, are second-class citizens, with fewer options than men, lower quality jobs, and lower pay, who are often the victims of various forms of violence, literally from the cradle to the grave. They are also not fully politically empowered and have a scant presence in the corridors of power, whether as finance ministers, central bank governors, prime ministers, or on the boards of leading corporations.

Why is gender inequality so pervasive? Where does it come from? Does it have cultural and religious roots? And what are the sorts of policies and values that will deliver a world in which being born a boy or a girl is no longer a measure of the likelihood of developing one's human potential? We will look at some of these and other such difficult questions.

Calvin challenges the privileged to abandon fragile pedestals of inconsiderate obliviousness, while he encourages the oppressed to remember their power developed from surviving historical unfairness. He invites all to abandon identity superstitions and materialistic traditions, so humanity can meet and collaborate on a healing field of justice waiting for cultivation.

For his dedication to human rights, Calvin has been awarded with honors from faith, educational, civic, and activist organizations, as well as government institutions, including the city of Phoenix year 2000 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. "Living the Dream" Award.

The demand for his services prompted organizations such as Harpo Inc., Oprah Winfrey's production company to contract Calvin to train executive producers, coach various members of the production team, and assist in their transition to the "O" network. He was also honored to be a contributing consultant in designing the Muhammed Ali Center in Louisville, Kentucky. Most recently, the Obama Foundation sought Calvin's collaboration with regard to community empowerment.

CONTESTING PATRIARCHY: NEW UNDERSTANDINGS OF MASCULINITY HONORING WOMEN'S EQUALITY

In a humble posture of collaborative learning, I will ask you to consider these questions: How does the doctrine of male supremacy continue to dominate our processes to build communities of peace and equity? How do sexism and misogyny, in alliance with whiteness and racism thwart this work? How are men harmed by the fallacious doctrine of male superiority? What new understandings of masculinity are required to transform men away from an infatuated embrace of the male dominator culture and to foster a new culture of peace and oneness that honors women as equal partners? How can we use what we've learned combating white domination and anti-Blackness to combat male dominance?

I work to design, direct, and accompany arts-based photographic/dialogue projects seeking authenticity, oneness, and justice in alignment with the teachings of Baha'u'llah. My work designing PhotoSophia* helped address two major barriers to community building and oneness, the false ideologies of patriarchy and whiteness. I am an educator/photographer in the Peace & Conflict Studies (PACS) discipline, trained as a visual artist, in conflict transformation and healing racism. I have a Bachelor of Fine Arts and an MA and Ph.D. in PACS. I lecture at UNC Greensboro.


BLACK WOMEN'S MATERNAL HEALTH: WHY ARE BLACK MOTHERS DYING IN RECORD NUMBERS?

She has extensive clinical experience working in operating rooms, medical-surgical, psychiatric inpatient, geriatric, home care, hospice nursing environments, and health policy. Fatmata's work focuses on serving marginalized and underserved populations. Fatmata had a challenging birthing experience in 2005 and also lost her sister in 2008, thirty days after she gave birth to her daughter.

Fatmata's passion for improving maternal health services delivery and outcomes was borne out of her lived experience. Fatmata is also committed to identifying and addressing disparities, racial inequities, and social injustice for the people she serves. Fatmata is pursuing an advanced nursing degree to practice at the top of her license and develop the necessary skills to effect safe and efficient health care services and delivery policies. Fatmata's talk will highlight the disparities in maternal health outcomes and discuss various initiatives launched to close disparity gaps and improve maternal health outcomes. Fatmata will also inspire people at all levels to play their part and contribute to solving the maternal mortality crisis, especially for Black women disproportionately impacted.

TEACHING CHILDREN HOW TO GROW "FROM SEED TO PLATE," WHICH INCLUDES THE PRESERVATION OF FOOD AND THE HARVESTING OF SEEDS

JoAn's life has been devoted to the protection and empowerment of children. For the past 10 years, she has been retired and on sabbatical, pursuing community service projects. Her public health work in the prevention of childhood lead poisoning prevention has protected over 250 million children. She is a medical Intuitive, solving health issues that defy traditional medicine, in partnership with God. She reverses aging and chronic illness with natural, food-based supplements, lifestyle changes, and dietary choices. She is an intuitive coach to people and wants to help 1 million people in her lifetime. She is getting ready to leave her retirement/sabbatical to step into her innate gifted talents and abilities.

Her current focus, under the umbrella of her nonprofit "Worldwide Children's Nonprofit Education Fund", is supporting ZIP code 37208 in Nashville, TN to teach children how to grow "From Seed to Plate," which includes the preservation of food and the harvesting of seeds for the next crops. The long-term goal is crop growth 9 months of the year, with a winter crop, followed by a restoration of the soil with minerals (Zeolite) and respect for Mother Earth. The intention is to get medicinal vegetables into the community gardens that address poor nutrition health issues, which include cancer, diabetes, and hypertension.

(She has studied at Vanderbilt, Tennessee State University, Harvard, Tufts, Tulane, and the University of Alabama in Huntsville.)

FOOD SECURITY AND PERMACULTURE


Judith Bakirya is a Ugandan permaculture farmer. She was named one of the BBC's 100 Women for 2019. She was also honored as Uganda's 2nd national "Best Farmer"2014 and holds a Masters degree in Health and development from Birmingham University in the UK. She is also a certified herbalist. She was born in the Bugosa District of Uganda and was raised on a farm, though she did not initially intend to be a farmer. As a child, in addition to working on her family's farm, Bakirya and her sisters attended school, thanks to the assistance of her father, a chief. Her success at her primary school qualified her for a scholarship to the prestigious secondary school, Mt. St. Mary's College Namagunga, something no other student at her school had accomplished. From there, she qualified for a government scholarship to attend university and earned a Master's in health and development from Birmingham University in the UK.

Busaino Fruits & Herbs, is an agro-ecological fruits farm on 1064 acres, of which 1002 acres focus on Avocado and jackfruit growing. Judith promotes the growing of Avocado and Jackfruit Plants for food, herbal medicine, cosmetics, essential oils, fire wood, restoring natural strengths of the soil, learning and tourism. Some positive indigenous knowledge in land conservation, forestry, value addition, water harvesting, integrated farming is being enriched and shared among over 25,000 rural families. Rural women particularly are the sources of the vast knowledge in resilient seeds, herbs, shrubs, help insects & animals. This rich knowledge is in turn shared within school communities.



THREE WOMEN: HEROINES FOR SCHOOL EQUALITY

Born and raised in South Carolina, June Manning Thomas left SC to attend college at Michigan State University (MSU). She chose urban planning as a field in part because of her memories of finding relief from Jim Crow accommodations in big cities such as Miami and Atlanta. She has taught at MSU, Cleveland State University, and the University of Michigan (UM), and was eventually named the Mary Frances Berry Distinguished University Professor Emerita of Urban Planning, at UM.

Her books and articles have studied spirituality and planning, racial inequities in urban planning, planning history, and the civil rights movement. Titles include Planning Progress: Lessons from Shoghi Effendi; the co-edited Urban Planning and the African American Community; Redevelopment and Race: Planning a Finer City in Postwar Detroit; and the co-edited The City after Abandonment (2013). The latest is Struggling to Learn: An Intimate History of School Desegregation in South Carolina (University of South Carolina Press, 2022).
