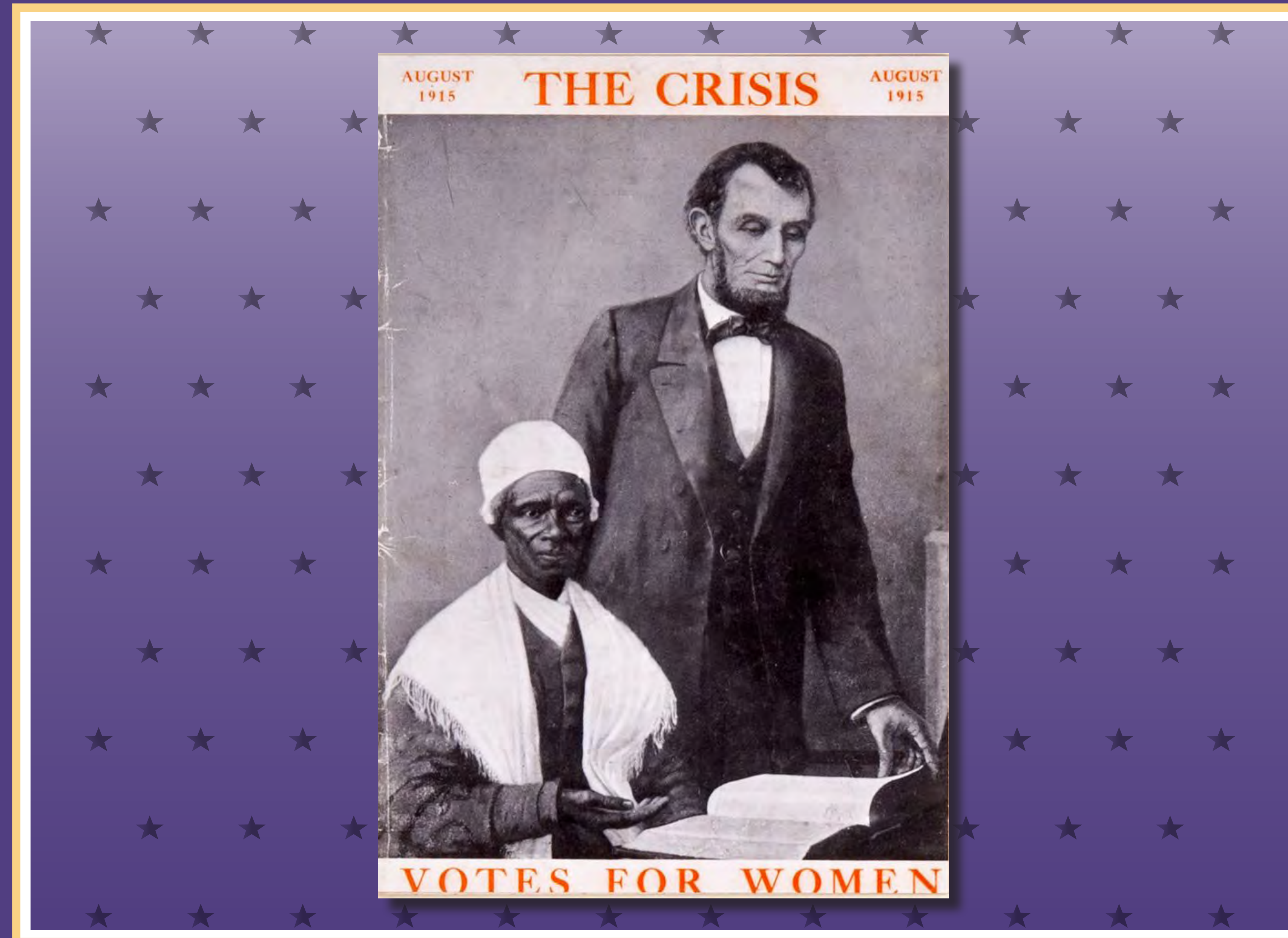

 Each one answering the call of her own wise heart.

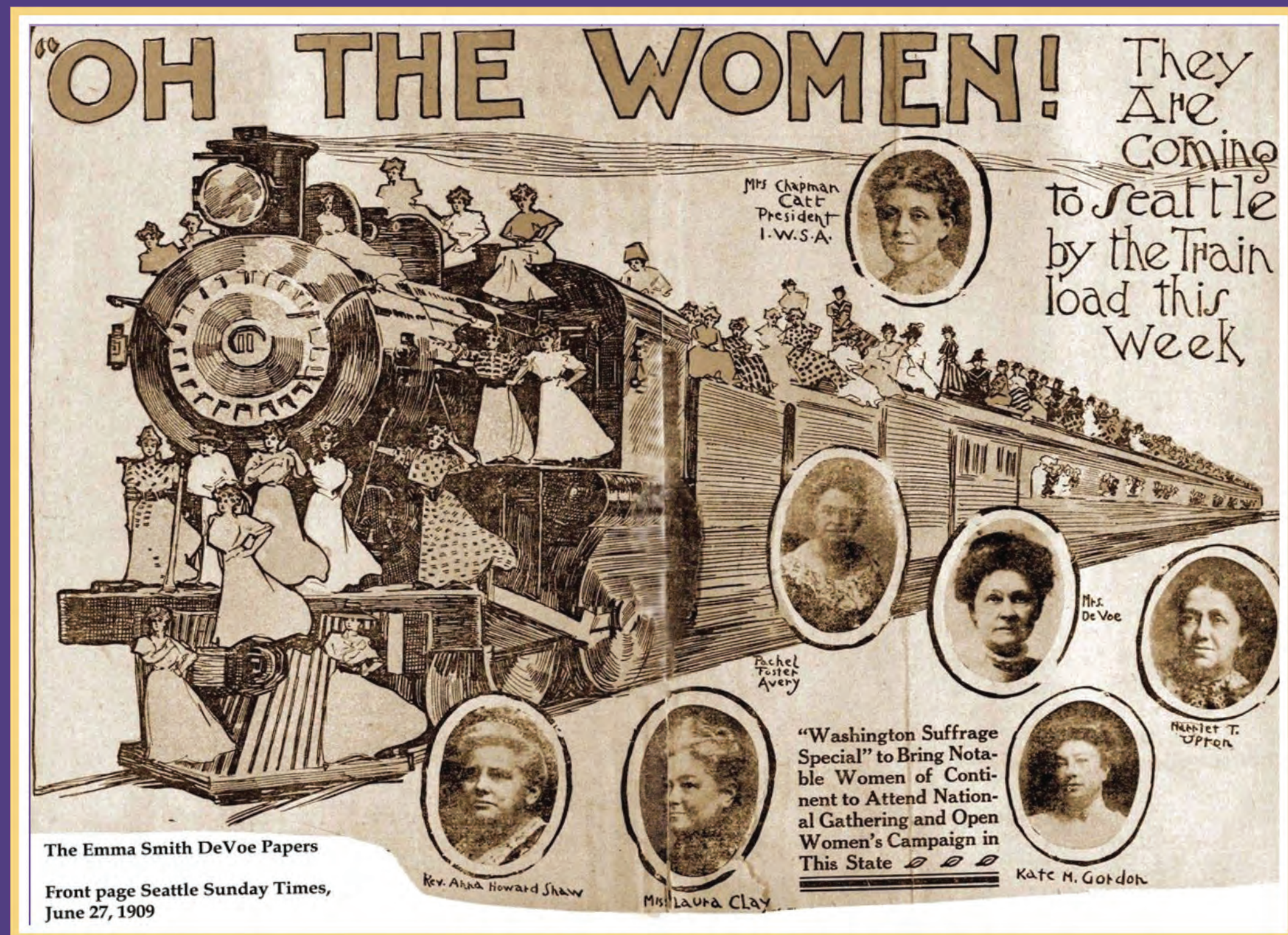
They came from toil and want, from leisure and ease,

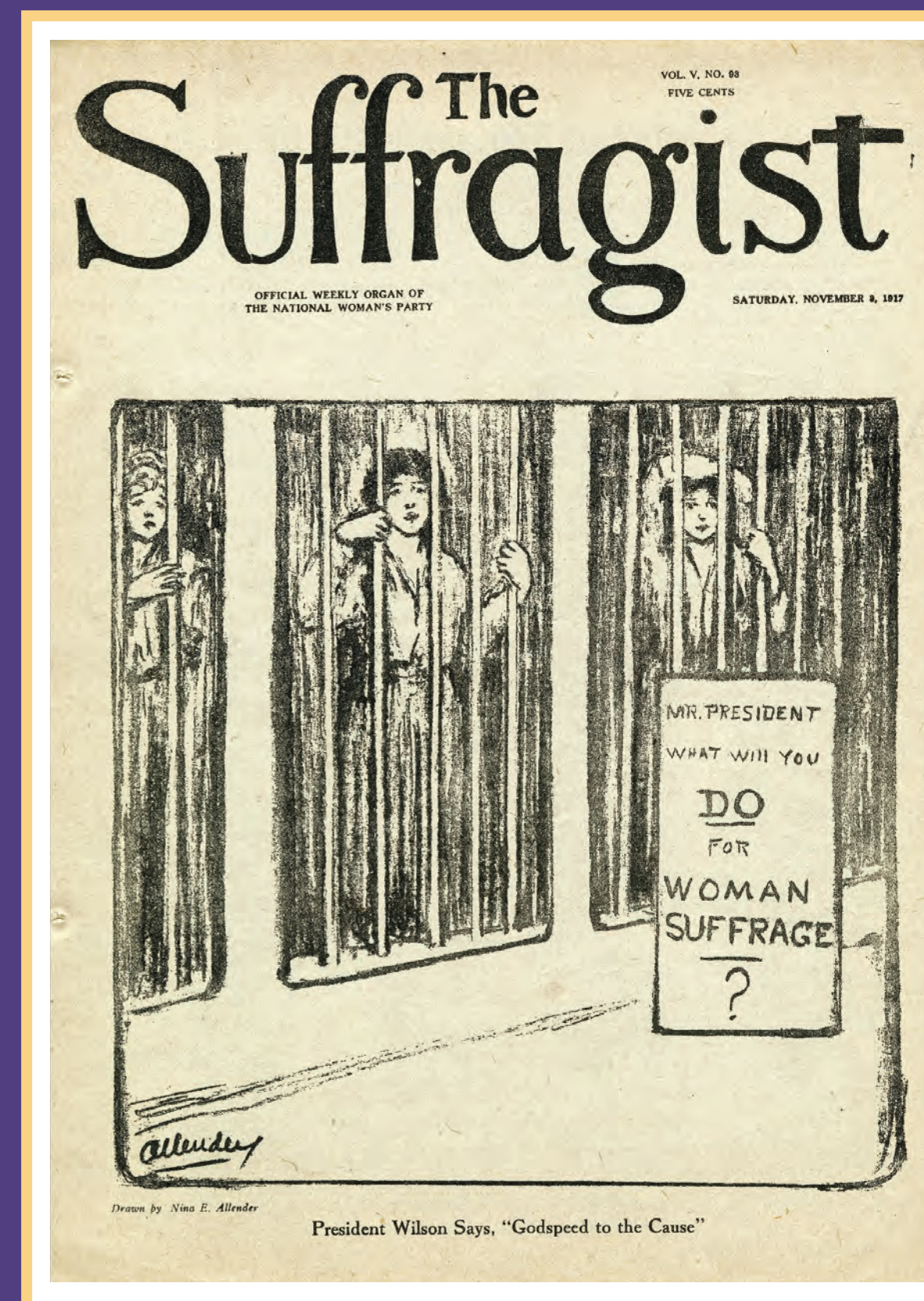

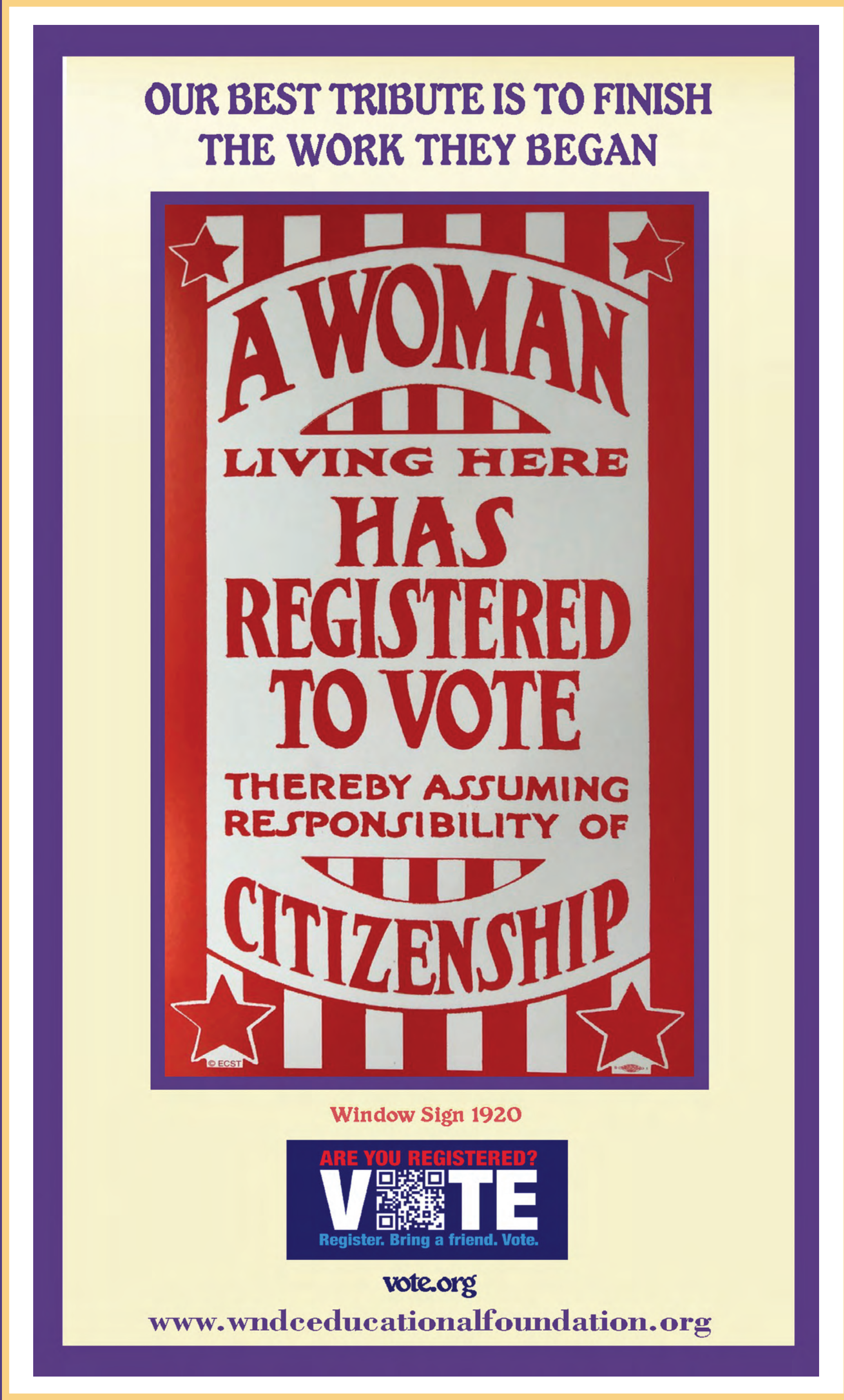
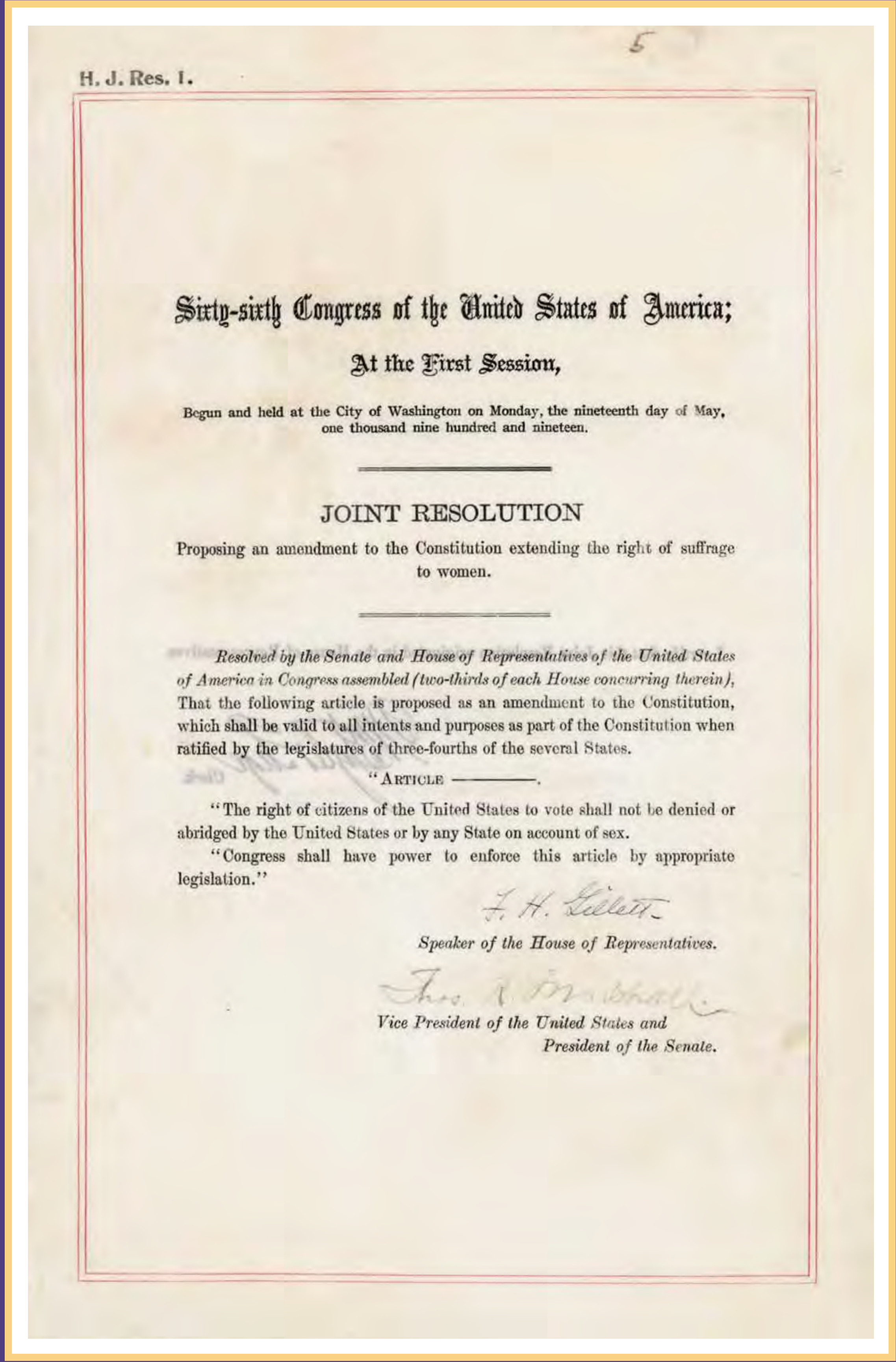
