Looking Back.....

The WCNS first luncheon event during the time of Covid was an enjoyable and interesting diversion. A bright, mild day on The Club's Gazebo was the perfect setting for the intimate group of attendees. The Club graciously arranged several extra table settings so guests could socially distance to their individual comfort level. Everyone enjoyed a delicious and generous salad bowl of turkey, Brussels sprouts, cranberries, sweet potatoes and greens, with cornbread muffin and pumpkin cheesecake for dessert, along with pleasant conversation.

Following lunch a drawing was held for a gift card to Fisherman's View and each table centerpiece. The event program, In The Wake Of The Mayflower, was held in The Club Ballroom with individual chairs placed spaciously from one another. Artist Karen Rinaldo, whose works have been featured in textbooks, television and NE magazines, spoke in depth about her preparation for completing the "First Thanksgiving - 1621" which has hung at Plymouth Plantation for 20 years and can currently be seen at the Museums on the Green in Falmouth, through 2021. Karen considers herself a historical artist, as her thorough research and personal interviews allow her to visualize and accurately represent the 1621 historic scene. Her detail as to particular people in her paintings, their placement and facial expressions, was fascinating to hear, made all the more interesting by the slides and prints demonstrations.

Kevin Doyle, writer and lecturer, explained the path, people, and history of the Mayflower from its beginning in England to what we call Provincetown. He focused on the first 50 years that he believes were the most peaceful and hopeful decades of colonization. His interesting lecture generated many questions and comments from the audience that was scattered with several Mayflower descendants. Karen and Kevin wrote the book In The Wake Of The Mayflower as we celebrate the 400th anniversary of the arrival of the Mayflower to America's shores. It presents an overview of the Pilgrims first encounter with the Nauset Tribe of the Wampanoag Nation and a history of the 15 towns that make up Cape Cod. It is available at Market Street Bookstore for \$20.




