A message from the Regional Landcare Coordinator

Hi everyone,

The Chat is a bit late this month as I have just returned from a week and a half in beautiful Tasmania. We spent the first few days hiking in the Walls of Jerusalem National Park. We were meant to be doing the Overland Track, but due to the still-going bushfire in the area our walk was cancelled. I visited the Walls of Jerusalem two years ago, and how different it was back then. There was water and mud everywhere last time, whereas this year many of the areas were dry. The fires next door and further west of the state were testament to this dry season. It's been a dry 12 months up here in Victoria as well, and it's timely to check ground cover in paddocks and water levels in dams. Leaving stock in paddocks too long can lead to soil erosion and the loss of all-important organic matter. Check out the article in the News section on managing ground cover if you have stock. Agriculture Victoria also has some great resources on fire and emergency preparedness which are worth looking at.

We also visited Maria Island while in Tassie, a place of interesting European history and amazing wildlife. We were extremely lucky to have a Tasmanian devil saunter past us on our first night there. There is a population of devils that were taken to the Island as insurance from the facial tumour disease that has had a terrible impact on devils on the Tasmanian mainland. The island has been used as a refuge for other species too, including Cape Barren geese. Highly recommend a visit.

February in the north central region has been busy, starting with a Landcare Facilitator meeting at Kolora in Newham (near Woodend). We toured the property to see the work the owners, Karl and Brigitte Kny, have done over more than 20 years. This includes various trials in exclusion plots, planting various species at different densities, and setting up a soft release site for wombats. It's always great to connect in person with the Facilitator team, and fantastic to see Landcare in action.

Maintain ground cover to protect soils

Isolated dust storms recently are a reminder of how fragile some of our soils are.

They are also a good reminder there is still time to prevent this damage by de-stocking more vulnerable areas of the farm. While dust storms contain mostly mineral materials, they also contain significant quantities of organic matter, one of the most valuable components of our soils.

Leaving stock in a paddock for an extra couple of weeks to make use of remaining water supplies can be all it takes to expose the paddock to the risk of wind erosion.

Dust storms or wind erosion occur when the speed of the wind at the soil surface exceeds the forces holding soil particles in place. Typically, soil particles exist as a small pea sized peds or aggregates.

As these peds or aggregates break down the soil becomes more vulnerable to erosion.

Once the process of wind erosion starts it can be nearly impossible to stop as the larger sand grains bounce and roll across the soil surface stripping remaining vegetation and smashing (or sand blasting) the soil in front of them.

The most vulnerable areas are those with lightly textured soils, little groundcover and shelter belts and topography that exposes them to high wind speeds. Lighter textured soils are those containing a high proportion of sand with little or no clay.

Wind erosion can start anywhere the soil has been disturbed, such as in gateways, along tracks and around water troughs.

Victorian cat management strategy

Animal Welfare Victoria

The Victorian Government has developed a state-wide cat management strategy (the strategy) to guide cat management in Victoria over the next decade. Effective cat management is important, as it addresses significant challenges related to both cats and their impact on the environment.

The strategy seeks to ensure the wellbeing of both cats and wildlife while establishing a coordinated and integrated approach to managing cats across all land types. It has been developed through extensive research, expert insights, and consultation with a wide range of stakeholders involved in cat management including councils, animal welfare organisations, land managers, conservation groups, veterinary professionals and cat owners.

The strategy's objectives are to:

- Promote cat welfare and responsible ownership,
- Protect native wildlife, the environment and community from the negative impacts of cats
- Improve processes, cooperation and knowledge sharing in cat management.

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Looking back and making plans

This will allow us to continue the good work and continuity of learning.

Schools continue to seek our environmental education program to learn about waterways.

Almost 100 schools and youth groups have signed up to participate during 2025 across the program’s five delivery areas; North Central CMA, Wimmera CMA, North East CMA and Corangamite CMA regions, along with the Melbourne Water area.

Schools see the program as the perfect vehicle to embed concepts of sustainability, culture, and community while gathering meaningful data to learn about the waterways and catchments in their local area.

In the North Central CMA region, we’ll be supporting thirty-five enthusiastic groups; primary schools, secondary schools, youth groups, and home-schooling groups.

Congratulations to the schools listed below who have made a commitment to learning about waterways and catchments. They will engage in citizen science investigations at their adopted waterway; water quality testing, macroinvertebrate sampling and habitat surveys.

Our program adopts a train-the-trainer model. Workshops will be rolled out during March to upskill educators and increase their confidence to implement the program, whilst understanding the raft of support that we offer throughout the year.

Sustainable Ag snippet

Are you interested in learning more about carbon and carbon emissions on your farm?

The North Central CMA and Agriculture Victoria are partnering to deliver a new project called Carbon Outreach. The project will deliver training workshops to increase farmer knowledge on carbon farming and carbon farming activities. The training workshops can be structured to suit the participants, including half day, full day, or through webinars.

The intention of the training workshops is to provide farmers with information that will help them start their carbon farming journey and point them to useful information and resources and support their learning.

The training workshops deliver sessions on topics, including

- Introducing carbon farming.
- What carbon farming means for farmers and land managers.
- Your greenhouse gas account.
- Planning carbon farming activities.
- The Australian Carbon Credit Unit Scheme.

These topics contain several sessions that go into more detail about each topic. The training sessions can be tailored to suit the participants. Farmers can choose to learn about the whole package, which would take a couple of days or tailor the sessions to parts that are suitable for their business.

This could include sessions on:

- Greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and carbon sinks relevant to agriculture.
- Understand carbon farming activities and technologies.

- Knowing the co-benefits and risks of carbon farming.
- Understand calculators and the data required.
- Calculating GHG emissions and carbon storage for your property.
- Knowing the ACCU Scheme and what ACCUs are.
- Understanding the most appropriate carbon farming activities or practices for your operation.

Holistic Management – a foundation for regeneration
