BLACKRIDGE STATION

The Community Council had hoped to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the opening of Blackridge station but Covid kyboshed that. They now plan an event in January with the added bonus of a model railway mock-up of the original station.

The first suggestion of a railway line through the village came as early as 1830 when the Edinburgh firm of surveyors and civil engineers, Grainger and Miller published a very detailed prospectus for an inter-city railway line passing South Ridge, Torrance, Bogend, crossing the Edinburgh and Glasgow road near Bedlormie. There were other expressions of interest, but once railway lines reached Cowdenhead from the east (with a connection to Woodend) and from the west to around Clarkston. There was a clear interest in the Monkland Company “closing the gap” of ten miles or so and an Act of Parliament in 1857 authorised this and the work began by 1861.

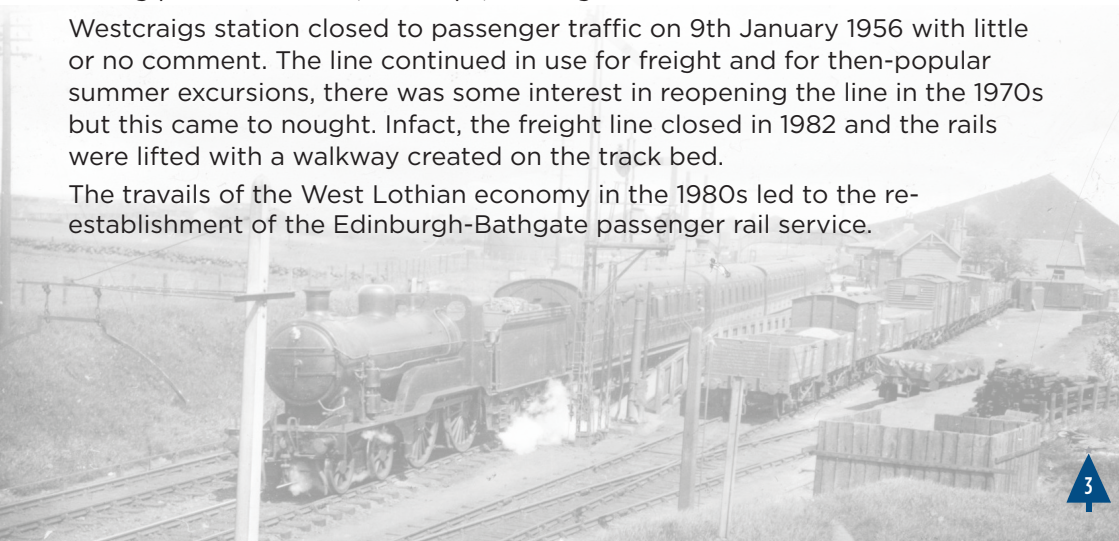
Whilst building the line, large numbers of Irish and Highland navvies were accommodated at Entryfoot and in tents near Harthill. The line opened to mineral traffic on 10th May 1862. A branch line to Shotts ironworks (now a footpath) opened three years later.

Passenger services began in 1871 with a two-platform stations erected with waiting rooms and other facilities, including a stationmaster’s house (still standing). Peter Mackay, the owner of the Craig Inn preferred the name Westcraigs rather than Blackridge, in fact, its full name was Westcraigs for Harthill and this service offered four passenger trains a day.

The line was double-tracked in 1904 (prompting the construction of the “model” lodging house in Armadale to accommodate the workforce). Villagers then petitioned Lanark County Council, resulting in a replacement bridge over burn at Clattering Mill (not the iron bridge which was later), together with a linking path to station (“the Stip”) costing £755.

Westcraigs station closed to passenger traffic on 9th January 1956 with little or no comment. The line continued in use for freight and for then-popular summer excursions, there was some interest in reopening the line in the 1970s but this came to nought. Infact, the freight line closed in 1982 and the rails were lifted with a walkway created on the track bed.

The travails of the West Lothian economy in the 1980s led to the re-establishment of the Edinburgh-Bathgate passenger rail service.



That once more invited consideration of closing the gap between Bathgate and Drumgelloch. In truth, the policy driver was to try to get traffic off the M8 and the idea became Scottish Government policy by 2003. Legislation was promoted to spend £300m with new stations at Armadale and Caldercruix as well as the relocation of that at Bathgate.

The Scottish Government, West Lothian Council and Network Rail were opposed to a station at Blackridge. A five-year campaign by villagers - named Platform Blackridge - and a formal objection to the Bill debated in parliament eventually saw the village defeat those organisations.

The station - now named Blackridge - was relocated 600m further east as a long straight stretch was needed. Blackrigg No.3 bing was removed to provide the bottoming for the access road which was named Westrigg Way as the name had otherwise almost disappeared from formal records.

The new station opened on 12 December 2010 with a half-hour service in each direction on the Helensburgh-Waverley line. Despite the negativity of the Council and Network Rail, annual boardings at Blackridge station had reached 60,000 before Covid interrupted.

It's not just up to us though. We need people to make use of us. The clue is in the title: Blackridge PARISH Church! The church is there to serve the community in both spiritual and practical ways.

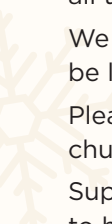

AN ENERGISING OVERVIEW OF BLAWHORN MOSS

What an exciting year for the Blawhorn Moss National Nature Reserve team! It's a year since the new stretch of boardwalk began construction. The opening of the boardwalk in March was long-anticipated, as we were finally able to offer more circular walks for visitors to the reserve. You can now walk across much more of the peat bog, taking in the wildness of the moss and the views over to the wind farm.

There's even a little stopping point halfway, encouraging you to pause and take a pew. The installation of this bench was a bit tricky – a heavy, green oak bench plus wet bog makes for an awkward and squelchy working day. But it was totally worth it to sit down afterwards and look towards the wetland area by the little patch of pine trees. It's worth keeping an eye out for wildlife here, as it is a popular hang-out spot for Grey Herons, Kestrels and Buzzards.

SRUC Oatridge students were a massive help in finishing the boardwalk, enduring the wintry weather and adding hundreds of grip-strips to the new walkway. A fresh group of Oatridge students returned at the beginning of November to assist with replacing the boundary fence near the Blawhorn Moss car park. As they dug 1m-deep holes for the larger straining posts, they came across some small lumps of coal!

This find reminded me of the history of the reserve and of the surrounding area's industrial heritage. West Lothian used to have 25 collieries (coal mines and associated buildings) in the area and, in fact, Blawhorn Moss was bought from the National Coal Board in 1979 before becoming a National Nature Reserve in 1980. This reminder of past coal-mining history is a stark contrast to the nearby wind turbines producing the much cleaner energy of today.

The resulting clearer air has been filling the lungs of our youth of today. Blackridge Primary 6 pupils have been enjoying visits to Blawhorn Moss to learn about its natural and cultural history. Their first taster of bog life was a bit of a soggy venture onto the moss where we told stories, made 'Green Man' faces in the trees, and measured the depth of the peat through the relentless drizzle. Thankfully, their 2nd visit saw drier weather as they built a lovely wildlife hibernaculum, or 'bug hotel', ready for creatures to curl up into for the winter. Whilst I know we may be huddling by the heaters this hibernation season, we hope to still see you coming to our beautiful reserve to get some fresh air, admire the views and blow the cobwebs away.

BLACKRIDGE PRIMARY LOCAL AUTHORITY REVIEW MAY 2022

In May 2022 we had review of the school by the Local Authority. This looked at different aspects as well as the next steps we should be making to further improve our school.

Evaluative Analysis of School's Current position

- The leadership team and staff create a welcoming, calm and nurturing environment for learners and families. There is a purposeful, positive ethos and the school's values are evident in the supportive interactions witnessed across the school. Learners state that they feel safe, respected and listened to and they speak positively about relationships with staff.
- The refreshed vision, values and positive relationships policy have been co-created with the school community. There is a clear emphasis on high expectations and standards which is motivating all and is supporting improvement.
- Almost all children demonstrate enthusiasm for their learning and engage positively with learning experiences. Staff give clear instructions and explanations and learning environments are well-organised and purposeful. There is improved use of the outdoor space and local woodlands to enhance learning.
- Most learners make good progress from prior levels of attainment and increasingly they can reflect on their progress, strengths and next steps.
- Children in Primary 1 benefit from a rich, play pedagogy environment which is significantly enhancing their learning and engagement.
- Approaches to assessment and monitoring and tracking have been refreshed and there is increased ownership for staff.
- Most learners achieve expected levels of attainment in literacy and numeracy and attainment is either ahead or in line with schools of a similar demographic

Let us help you to make plans to go forward - there is always support on hand.

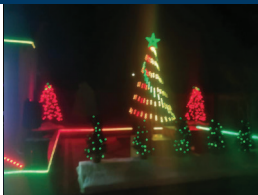
