It is with profound sadness we share in the grief and devastation at the sudden passing on Friday 24th May of Councillor, friend, and long-time resident of Blackridge, Stuart Borrowman.

This was a real shock to everyone who knew him and our deepest sympathies are with the Borrowman family at this very sad time. His passing was marked by a minute's silence by members of West Lothian Council's Executive committee.



While he will be fondly remembered by many people in our village and beyond, and there have been many tributes paid already, here are just a few people who knew Stuart and would like to say a few words in remembrance of his passing.

Debbie Kincaid-Hamilton, on behalf of the Galaday committee would like to say "Stuart was more than a Councillor and committee member to us. He was also a good friend; he was the heart of the Galaday committee and was always the voice of reason. Stuart put his all into Blackridge and was a big part of the village. He will be sadly missed by all. The parade will never be the same without Stuart proudly leading it down the village."

Local resident John Ramsay, friend and neighbour of Stuart, goes on to mention... "I've known Stuart all of his life and always found him to be a hardworking councillor on behalf of the people of Blackridge and Armadale. He always hand-delivered leaflets to every home in his constituency himself letting the people know what was going on regarding council business in his area. He will be sorely missed for all his hard work."

Blackridge Primary School headteacher Claire McGoldrick shares "Councillor Borrowman will be remembered as a huge supporter of Blackridge Primary and a champion of our young people. He always ensured that the children of Blackridge primary were proud of their roots and aware of the important heritage of the village. His dedication to the community will leave a lasting legacy."

Many others who knew Stuart were equally saddened to hear of his passing such as John Thomson (who delivered fresh fish to Stuart every week) mentioning "Stuart was a great customer and friend, he also loved my wee bit of banter every Wednesday. It will take an enormous pair of feet to fill his shoes" and local Community Police officer Sean Henderson says "Stuart had a great impact on the community and gave a lot of his time, and will be missed."

Finally, fellow ward Councillors Andrew McGuire and Lynda Kenna offer their perspective...



# ScotRail ADOPT A STATION

Since 2005, ScotRail has established an initiative that encourages volunteers to adopt and enhance their local railway stations. There are 360 stations on the ScotRail network, and so far, 209 of these have been adopted and are supported by 1040 volunteers. This initiative has benefits for both ScotRail and the local community.

The breaking news is that Blackridge Station has now been adopted by the Blackridge Community Council.

Safety is the number one priority, and ScotRail's mantra is "Everyone home safe every day."

We welcome additional volunteers; if you would like to join our team, then please make contact with the Community Council. A short induction is a Scot Rail requirement before undertaking any activity at the station to ensure safety is never compromised.

**Tutti Tots** pre-school music classes meet weekly in the Craig Inn on Wednesday and Friday mornings at 10.30am. # ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR GROUP

The Blackridge Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) group meets every 4 weeks and has formulated an action plan that the group will work through. This action plan looks at the following, with all partner agencies working together with the community:

- · Improve partnership working to address ASB in the area
- Improve communication with the community through specific campaigns/awareness-raising sessions.
- Increase the number of reported incidents.
- Community engagement sessions
- Possible projects to be identified with groups in the community.

Engagement will be carried out using a range of tools, including face-to-face chats with local residents of all ages and an online survey. The findings from the engagement will be used to evidence the need or lack of need for additional activities for young people; this, in turn, can be used to apply for funding for specific projects in the village, including a potential arts project with the primary school.
