Dirty Windows and Clean Hearts (A Lenten meditation based on Psalm 51) By Glenda Hughes, Board Chair

Several years ago, two of my friends and I wrote a Lenten Devotional to share with our church. The other day, I decided to dig through my files and find a copy of it, and I was excited to find that it followed the same sequence as this year, Year B in the Lectionary. I opened it up to this year's Ash Wednesday text and was astonished at what I had written, not because it was exceptionally good or horribly bad, but because in the 15 years since I had written it, my faith journey has brought me to a completely different understanding of the Scripture and the ways in which we journey to the cross with Jesus during the season of Lent. Let me explain....

The previous Ash Wednesday meditation begins by me telling the following story:

"Last summer, with a little help from a friend, I washed the windows at my house. We cleaned the windows and vacuumed and hosed down the dusty dirty screens. After a while, it was easy to see which windows were washed and which ones were still waiting in line. When compared side by side, the clean windows glinted in the sun while the dirty ones looked dull and dingy."

The text that inspired this little remembrance of washing windows was from Psalm 51:1-17-our Ash Wednesday passage for this year. It begins, "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love, according to your abundant mercy to blot out my transgressions."

My meditation went on to say that compared to the Goodness of God, we look like neglected smudgy, dusty windows. Not a pleasant picture, nor is it consistent with the Gospel where we see Jesus preaching, healing, and feeding the hungry. Jesus did not spray down his followers with Windex. He didn't hose down the woman at the well, but gave her Living Water, instead. Jesus brought healing and salvation, restored dignity to the poor and modeled love and compassion to his disciples.

Windows, dirty or clean, allow us to look outside, away from ourselves. Scripture can do the same. And sometimes Scripture asks us to think deeply.

Psalm 139 teaches us that we are wonderfully and fearfully made." Scripture also tells us we are created in the image of God. While Paul tells us "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."


So how do we reconcile these two notions? We are made in the image of God AND we are sinners. I propose that if we think about sin as NOT a thing that makes us dirty and

unworthy, but something that destroys relationships, breaks down communication and hurts the ones we love. Sin gets in the way of us drawing near to God and to each other.

In this case, God's remedy to the problem of sin is not to condemn, but to lift us up with compassion and love. That is why we pray during the season of Lent, "God have mercy on us." Not because we are like unwashed windows, but because God sees who we really are. We are children of God, loved by God and called to love one another.

Psalm 51 is an invitation to receive God's healing mercy and love, so that broken relationships might be restored, so that we might live in peace with one another. It's certainly a high ideal, but with God, all things are possible.

As I conclude, I'd like to say there is so much more packed into Ash Wednesday's passage, Psalm 51. It is a great passage to meditate on as we enter into the Lenten season. It is a reminder that we are in need of God's grace. It is within this passage we find the well known verse: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." This Lenten season, I urge you to seek God's cleansing mercy, let go of our transgressions and grasp the new life that Jesus offers again and again and again. His Love Endures Forever. Amen.




Fasting
