Pastor Elliott’s sermons lately have helped explore Psalms 23. This is a passage very familiar to most of us. We have seen the many layers of meaning that can be found in just a few verses. When we explore other translations of the Bible, there is even more.

Writings about the Hebrew translation open up some interesting things found in this passage. Many cultures explore numerology more than ours. According to Chad Bird, a scholar of Hebrew, when looking at Psalm 23 in Hebrew, there are 55 Hebrew words. It is relatively brief, though the shortest Psalm has 17 Hebrew words. The longest has 1065 Hebrew words.

In the middle of Psalm 23 are the words “For Thou art with me.” There are exactly 26 Hebrew words before that phrase and exactly 26 after. In the verses before that phrase, the writer speaks of God in the third person: “he” does this or “he” does that. After the numerical center, the author speaks to God directly in the second person: for “Thou” art with me, “Thy” rod and staff, “Thou” dost prepare. In Hebrew, the message is that the abiding presence of the Shepherd is the heart of this poem.

In verse 6, we read, “Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life.” The verb for “follow” is *radaph*. A more accurate translation, according to one author,

would be “chase after or pursue.” He says that goodness and mercy of God do not follow us like a good little puppy. Rather they “gallop after us like a celestial stallion.” As in the famous poem by Francis Thompson, the Lord’s goodness and mercy chase us down labyrinthine paths like the Hound of Heaven. They stay on our heels. The divine grace and love *radaph* us all the way to heaven’s gate and into the arms of our waiting Father.

We are pursued by mercy. We are chased by grace. We are not merely followed.

Indoor Service

Inside services will resume November 8th. This is a 4-week trial. We will then assess whether or not to continue. If you prefer to listen on your radio in the parking lot, please do so. The FM headsets we use transmit from the sanctuary. *Worship in the way that you are most comfortable.* We hope to have the option of an online service ready sometime in November. We will keep you updated!

Here are the guidelines we will follow for inside worship:

Disinfecting will be done before each gathering.

(A specific list will be provided to those doing the disinfecting.)

In the sanctuary, immediate family units may sit together. Seating for each family unit should be 6 feet apart, spread throughout the sanctuary. Areas for seating & not seating will be marked.

Everyone is required to wear a mask, except the one speaking from the pulpit or Lord's Table.

No singing.

Hymn books, Bibles and attendance pads will be removed from the pews.

No handshakes, embracing, or hugging.

Offering plates will be in the back of the church.

Communion- the bread and juice will be in individual plastic cups on the communion table. There will be baskets on the front pews for disposal of the cups.

Greeters will wear disposable gloves to open the doors for people.

People will be dismissed by rows after the service.

Hand sanitizer will be on the tables in the gathering area.


