





Today, as I rest in my comfortably air-conditioned office, it's forecast to be 99* outside with a feels-like temperature of 110-115*. Whew, now that's hot! I am eternally grateful that I have an inside job in a lovely setting and that, as far as I know, all of my friends and family are also comfortable in the air conditioning today (and tomorrow and Thursday, when it's supposed to be even hotter!).

In the news early this morning, I watched as our brothers and sisters in the southwest waded knee deep in thick, muddy sludge and had to be rescued out of flashfloods that carried away their homes and businesses. I watched, again horrified, as reporters covered the tragedy of a fast-moving fire that decimated so many homes and people in Maui. I heard that there were still hundreds missing, presumed dead, and that identification may never be possible due to the intense heat. When I arrived at the office, I read through the latest headlines and learned the loyal Russian troops are continuing their bombing of civilians and that the ones who rebelled were banished as a group, but seemingly went "on vacation" overnight. It's unknown at this time if they ran away on their own, or if they were extinguished (I hope the former). Locally, there were the usual arrests and car accidents, some horrific in and of themselves.

I look at all of it as I hear good people, weary from all of the destruction in the world, say things like, "Where's God in all of this?" and "Why doesn't God intervene?" Fair questions. We are a people who believe that God is within us, yes?, and that we are the heart, hands, and feet of God, so another good question is, "Why are we hiding in our lovely, air-conditioned settings instead of becoming more active in the world?" It's easy to tick our tongues and shake our heads, and retreat further into our own comfortable spaces, but it's much more difficult to become actively involved in the lives of others. Sincerely involved, and without invoking a lot of judgment.

In Matthew 7: 1-5, we are told not to judge others or we ourselves will be judged with the same scales we have used and given with the same measure we have given others. Lately, I've seen and heard a whole lot of judgment of others, all the way from the way they're living their lives (and thus deserve everything they're going through) to the casual, "Well, s/he should ______," and, "It's supposed to be done this way. That's the way it's always

been done!" That last one chases a lot of new ideas and fresh perspectives away.

I recently re-connected with a decades old friend. This friend is in a very difficult situation at home. Over the course of many weeks, they've unburdened their hearts on me and shared everything they're going through. What I heard through all of it was, "but I don't want to leave." So, after being asked, I began telling them ways they could make the situation they're in better. They were shocked! They shared that everyone else they've tried to get help from has simply told them to LEAVE. (This person isn't in any danger, don't worry!) They thanked me for respecting their choices and asked why no one else had really heard them and what they wanted. I had 1 word for them: judgment. So many problems in the world are caused by that action word.

If we're asked our opinions of what they should do, we can make suggestions (and only if we're asked, but even then, expect frustrated blow-back if their method of working through something is by complaining and they don't really want our suggestions), but their choices (and consequences) are theirs. It's not our place to tell others what they should or should not do, nor tell them that they *must* do something (that worked for us). The situations of others simply aren't our situations. Their walk through life, their experiences, are different than ours were. The details and emotions, supports and pitfalls are different. Their faith-walk is on their own path through life, not ours. Finally, today- this day- is simply different than yesterday. How does that saying go- "You can't touch the same water twice in a river?" You can't, but a lot of people try really hard to hold on to the water with their fists. That leads me to a question: have we become the Inn Keepers, shaking our heads "no" when hurting people come to us requesting our help? Are our lives so full of our own messes and stresses that the thought of adding just one more issue or one more new person to get to know is almost overwhelming? I understand that heavy lift because there *IS* a lot going on in the world and so many people *HAVE* had a series of unfortunate events, but that doesn't make them any less worthy of receiving God's Love through our help in this, whatever situation that they're in. God picks us up over and over again from our many falls (praise God!) and expects us to help others through their many falls as well.

In the famous words from Rev. Fred Rogers, when tragedies of life strike, look for the helpers. Better yet, let's go beyond the comfy, antiseptic *looking* (only to return to our air-conditioned spaces) to *being*. Meaning, let's open up and share our lives again <u>without</u> judgment and <u>with</u> hearts full of God's Love. It can make all the difference in the world.

Nicaragua Report

I thought you would like to know how your generous gifts were spent in Santa Emilia this January. Our project this time was to fix up the bathrooms. We tiled the bathrooms and showers as well as the hallway in front. Well really we paid for all the tile and supplies and Eric and a helper did the tiling. There was not really enough room in the bathrooms for more than 1 person. Some of the men from the community worked on getting eaves put up on the church and tied the down spouts into the drainage pipes to help from having a muddy ditch around the church during the rainy season. The non Nicaraguans watched as they tied ladders together to make them long enough and as they spliced extension cords together so they would reach the roof. It was definitely not OSHA approved. Manuel the carpenter made 2 desks and a set of book shelves for the church and his daughter and I stained them. Those projects cost around \$2000. We took the Social Worker from the school to town and she spent \$500.00 on needed supplies for the school. I delivered 2 nebulizers and a blood pressure cuff to the clinic. They were so excited because they only had 1 nebulizer and 8 communities shared it. If you needed to use it you had to travel to the clinic and bring your medicine and use the machine there. I gave \$500 dollars to the water committee to fix some leaks and replace some pipes. Soon they will need to clean and repair the water holding tanks as 1 seems to be leaking. The children were overjoyed with Barbies, power rangers, soccer balls cars and monster trucks. One night we all wore glow bracelets and sang songs in the dark. We have a list for the next trip already and I have purchased my ticket for Jan. 28th 2024!! Thank you all so much for supporting the community of Santa Emilia. **Beth Campbell**
