Our Inspiring Journeys:

Weyessa "Ace" McAlister, founder of Bridge H2OPE, grew up in southern Ethiopia, witnessing the profound impact of water scarcity. At 13, he moved to the United States, carrying with him the memories of his community's struggles and the tragic loss of his brother and father to waterborne diseases. These losses fueled his passion for providing clean, safe water to his homeland.

What started as H2OPE TC at Trinity College has evolved into Bridge H2OPE, a national movement that empowers U.S. students to champion clean water advocacy. Ace's vision is to build a bridge of hope, connecting communities and transforming lives through each water project. His commitment and leadership have been recognized with multiple honors, including the Hartford HealthCare Courage Award, the Samuel S. Similarly, Lamah Bility, Founder and CEO, and Michael Negussie

President, are both immigrants with stories rooted in the harsh realities of the global water crisis. Lamah, an immigrant from Liberia, knows all too well the daily struggle of fetching water. As a child, he walked nearly three miles twice a day just to gather enough water for his family. This experience shaped his commitment to creating change. After moving to the United States in 2008, Lamah's passion for helping others only grew. Today, he channels that passion through Didomi, a social enterprise dedicated to combating the water crisis through the sale of eco-friendly water bottles.

Michael Negussie, an immigrant from Ethiopia, grew up in the United States hearing stories from his parents about the devastating impact of the water crisis in their homeland. Shaped by these stories of struggle and resilience, he works to ensure that communities around the world are no longer burdened by a lack of basic resources, such as clean, reliable water.
