BEACH TRIP!



Students Plan Ahead



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There are about 2 months before the end of the school year. For high school seniors, this means activities like prom, amusement trips, and GRADUATION. It is important to plan ahead for ordering caps, gowns, dresses/tuxedos, year books senior pictures, invitations, etc. Also, do not forget hairdressing, fingernails and make-up for girls and corsages and haircuts for boys. Plan dinners early.

Junior high school students will need to plan also, especially for graduation. For those high school students who are in Independent Living Program (ILP) take advantage of Incentives/ Reimbursements. ILP will cover expenses or incentive/graduation expenses for opening savings accounts, grades, diploma, program participation, cap and gown, prom, Grade Night Trip, Year book and senior pictures. Maintain original receipts.

Plan carefully for an enjoyable transition to your future.





Miscellaneous

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The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has advised the public about the dangers of brightly-colored fentanyl, also referred to as <u>rainbow fentanyl</u>. According to CDPH and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), rainbow fentanyl comes in a variety of bright colors, shapes, sizes, and forms, including pills, powder, and blocks that resemble sidewalk chalk. Rainbow fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine. Fentanyl is also made in a rainbow of colors so it looks like candy.

Below is an image of what rainbow fentanyl may look like:

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According to the DEA, fentanyl is the deadliest drug threat facing the country; only two milligrams of fentanyl, which is equal to 10-15 grains of table salt, is considered a lethal dose. The increased danger of fentanyl and overdoses in California's youth, ages 10 to 19 years old, is shown in the below <u>CDPH statistics</u>:

- Emergency department visits related to non-fatal opioid overdoses more than tripled from <u>379 overdoses in 2018</u> to <u>1,222 overdoses in 2020</u>.
- Opioid-related overdose deaths increased from <u>54 deaths in 2018</u> to <u>274 deaths in 2020</u>, which was a 407 percent increase, largely driven by fentanyl.
- Fentanyl-related overdose deaths increased from <u>36 deaths in 2018</u> to <u>261 deaths</u> in <u>2020</u>, a 625 percent increase.

As child care providers, it is important to remember infants and young children are at higher risk of *accidental* exposure to fentanyl, as they often explore their environment and items within their reach through their senses of touch and taste. Accidental exposure to medication is a leading cause of poisoning in children. Please help spread awareness about the dangers of rainbow fentanyl by reviewing and sharing the resources identified in this PIN.

Key Reminders:

- Keep all prescription medications out of reach to children.
- Keep parents and families informed, as they are their child's first teachers.
- Inspect children's play spaces daily, including outdoor area and including parks and public spaces before children have access to the spaces.

If you encounter fentanyl in any form, do not handle it and call 911 immediately.

A happy Almklov house enjoyed all the rain because of the back porch repair that was completed now slopes water away from the house. Also, the front screen door secures perfectly now, thanks to our friend Javier's repair work.

At our Stine Road location we are updating fire alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. Also, all the cabinets and files over 4' are now "Rumbler Ready" and anchored with earthquake qualified straps.
