truly missed.


Services will be on Friday, February 22, 2019 10:45am at the Bakersfield National Cemetery, 30338 E Bear Mountain Blvd.

Poisoning Prevention

Key Prevention Tips

Lock them up and away.

Keep medicines and toxic products, such cleaning solutions and detergent pods, in their original packaging where children can't see or get them.

Know the number.

Put the nationwide poison control center phone number, 1-800-222-1222, on or near every telephone in your home and program it into your cell phone. Call the poison control center if you think a child has been poisoned but they are awake and alert; they can be reached 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Call 911 if you have a poison emergency and your child has collapsed or is not breathing.

· Read the label.

Follow label directions carefully and read all warnings when giving medicines to children.

Don't keep it if you don't need it.

Safely dispose of unused, unneeded, or expired prescription drugs and over the counter drugs, vitamins, and supplements. To dispose of medicines, mix them with coffee grounds or kitty litter and throw them away. You can also turn them in at a local take-back program or during National Drug Take-Back events.

ISFC

Intensive Services Foster Care

Intensive Services Foster Care is a state licensed Foster Family Agency model for eligible foster children whose needs for safety, permanency, and well-being require specially trained resource parents and intensive professional and paraprofessional services and support in order to remain in a home-based setting, or to avoid or exit congregate care in a short-term residential therapeutic program, group home, or out-of-state residential center.

"Children who need love the most will always ask for it in the most unloving of ways"

ISFC Resource parents are required to complete 40 hours of preplacement training. Those who have completed 12 hours of preapproval caregiver training (already have been approved as resource parents) only need an additional 28 hours to complete the required 40 hours of pre-placement training. 24 hours of on-going training is required within 12 months of placement and 12 hours per year for each year thereafter. ISFC Resource parents will receive a higher rate of pay.

Eligible youth

KBYH's ISFC program will serve foster children, youth and NMDs who manifest a variety of behavioral characteristics requiring intervention services. These include, but are not limited to:

- · Anger, hostility and/or aggression
- Poor boundaries and impulse control
- · Oppositional Defiant Disorder
- · Sexual acting out or compulsivity
- Juvenile Justice involvement, history of criminal misconduct, truancy, and/or runaway
- Manifest mental illness, i.e., depression, anxiety disorder, AD/HD. Schizophrenia, et cetera
- Suicidal ideations and/or gestures, including self-harm
- · Substance use/abuse
