






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Meet Chelsea and Brayden!

They made Westra light up with hope and smiles. Exactly fourteen months later, on February 8, 2023, Brayden was officially reunified with Chelsea. We are all very happy to see Brayden go home, but we will truly miss seeing them each week.

Chelsea said "The best part about the whole

process was visitation at Kern Bridges. The ladies at the Westra location made everything possible for me because I felt so comfortable there. I felt like as I got to know my son and they got to know us. Instead of feeling like I had to go to an awkward place to visit my child, I felt like Kern Bridges was a second family to me."

KBYH appreciates that Chelsea was willing to share her story and we encourage other families to continue working the hard work towards reunification so that one day they too can share their success story.

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Child Safety

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The job of protecting kids most often falls to parents and caregivers, and it is up to them to familiarize themselves with safety risks in and around their homes and communities. Once you know the risks, you can take steps to plan for safety.

Teen Driving

A teen's biggest safety threat is sitting in the driveway. Half of all teens will be in a car crash before graduating from high school. Teen drivers who continue to practice with their parents increase their chances of avoiding a crash.

Child Passenger Safety

Car crashes are the <u>leading cause of death</u> for kids and young adults from ages 1-24. Properly securing kids in car seats, booster seats and seat belts can protect them in the event of a crash. NSC offers tools and tips on <u>keeping your children safe on the road</u>.

Water Safety

Many are aware of the importance of safety around pools and at the beach. Parents also need to supervise their children near bathtubs. Most drowning or near-drowning incidents happen when a child falls into a pool or is left alone in the bathtub. Distractions make for tragedies, and <u>the younger the child, the greater the risk</u>.

Childproofing

<u>Learn the highest risk areas</u> for unintentional injury and death in and around your home. Take steps to "childproof" your home and be sure to extend your efforts beyond toddlers. Develop a home safety plan, and practice different ways to get out of your home. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Lead Poisoning

Millions of kids are exposed to high levels of lead every day. Children under the age of 6 are especially vulnerable because their growing bodies absorb more lead than adults and their brains and nervous systems are more sensitive to the damaging effects of lead. Learn what you can do to prevent lead poisoning.
