# SAFETY

## **Protecting Vulnerable Groups from Extreme Heat including Staff & Youth**

Keep kids cool and hydrated

•Never leave infants or children in a parked car, even if the windows are open.

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•Dress infants and children in loose, lightweight, light-colored clothing.

•Make sure they're drinking plenty of fluids. Stay away from really cold drinks or drinks with too much sugar.

Never leave kids in a parked car

- Even when it feels cool outside, cars can heat up to dangerous temperatures very quickly.
- Leaving a window open is not enough temperatures inside the car can rise almost 20 degrees Fahrenheit within the first 10 minutes, even with a window cracked open.
- Children who are left unattended in parked cars are at greatest risk for heat stroke, and possibly death.

Tips for traveling with children

- Never leave infants or children in a parked car, even if the windows are cracked open.
- To remind yourself that a child is in the car, keep a stuffed animal in the car seat. When the child is buckled in, place the stuffed animal in the front with the driver.
- When leaving your car, check to be sure everyone is out of the car. Do not overlook any children who have fallen asleep in the car.

Learn how to spot heat-related illness

• Seek medical care immediately if your child has symptoms of heat-related illness.

They became affiliated with Kern Bridges when we completed the home study for their adoptions in 2010 and 2016. The Drummer's still had a lot of love to give and became Certified with KBYH in 2017. They have since taken care of children from newborn to 15 years old. They have performed all of their resource parent duties and responsibilities in an outstanding manner. They are very loving, dedicated resource parents who have provided a wonderful home for the children who have been placed in their care. They treat every child as if they were their own and incorporate the child in every facet of their lives. They coach and train every child to behave appropriately at home and in public. They involve the children in numerous activities and family outings. They have received many accolades from the Department of Human often inquire if there are openings in their home. They provide each child with a very loving, structured and stable environment. It is apparent that each child receives the unconditional love, nurturing and parenting they need to become happy, well adjusted children.

On 5-30-19, the Drummers started on a long and difficult journey when they took placement of a sibling set of two. The 3-year-old girl had poor boundaries and had severe temper tantrums. The 2-month-old boy was diagnosed with Shaken Baby Syndrome and required numerous trips to VCH in Madera and numerous other specialized appointments and assessments. This child could not have had better advocates. The Drummer's did their due diligence in making sure that he received all necessary services. In the event that he was reunified with his mother, they wanted to make sure that all services were in place. I am happy to report that this child has made outstanding progress with his numerous developmental delays. With positive discipline and consistency, his sister's behavior has improved greatly since placement as well. On 1-13-20, 8 months later, the Drummer's took placement of their newborn male sibling.

I am happy to report that the Drummer's are in the process of giving this sibling set of 3 a forever home. These children have been given a wonderful foundation and their future is limitless. Michael and Sheila Drummer have gone beyond the call of duty as resource parents.
