

Placements

In recent months we have seen a decline in the number of foster kids being referred for placement. Reasons for this seem to primarily include a decline in the overall number of kids in foster care in Kern County as well as an increase in the number of kids being placed with relatives or non-related "relatives". KBYH resource parents sometimes question why they aren't getting called about kids needing to be placed and we wanted to reassure you that we are paying close attention to the needs and opportunities of our community. One avenue we have pursued is placement of foster children from other counties. KBYH is excited to announce that we have finalized a contract with Tulare County, who is anxious to partner with Kern Bridges to help meet their placement needs. This will be particularly meaningful for our families who live in the north end of our county (Delano, Shafter, Wasco, etc.). Also, KBYH is nearly approved to begin providing Intensive Services Foster Care (ISFC). The ISFC program is intended to serve children/youth who require intensive treatment and behavioral supports. The goal is to ensure that youth in foster care receive the services they need in a homebased family care setting or to avoid or exit a short-term residential therapeutic program or group home. The program requires specially trained resource parents and professional and paraprofessional support. ISFC comes with very aggressive compensation for the resource family as well as support to assist the family in providing this high-level service. Resource parents who are interested in providing this service should contact Jim for further information.

Fall Prevention

We all want to keep our children safe and secure and help them live to their full potential. Knowing how to prevent leading causes of child injury, like falls, is a step toward this goal. Falls are the leading cause of non-fatal injuries for all children ages 0 to 19. Every day, approximately 8,000 children are treated in U.S. emergency rooms for fall-related injuries. This adds up to almost 2.8 million children each year. Thankfully, many falls can be prevented, and parents and caregivers can play a key role in protecting children.

Key Prevention Tips

• Play safely.

Falls on the playground are a common cause of injury. Check to make sure that the surfaces under playground equipment are safe, soft, and consist of appropriate materials (such as wood chips or sand, not dirt or grass). The surface materials should be an appropriate depth and well-maintained.

Make your home safer.

Use home safety devices, such as guards on windows that are above ground level, stair gates, and guard rails. These devices can help keep a busy, active child from taking a dangerous tumble.

Keep sports safe.

Make sure your child wears protective gear during sports and recreation. For example, when in-line skating, use wrist guards, knee and elbow pads, and a helmet.

Supervision is key.

Supervise young children at all times around fall hazards, such as stairs and playground equipment, whether you're at home or out to play.
