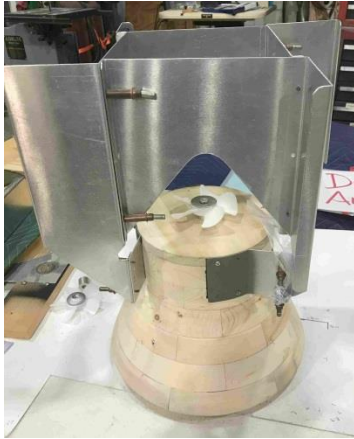

One new offering at each open house is for the donation of a mere \$5.00 you can sit inside the Yale. Stop by to take your picture in the cockpit!

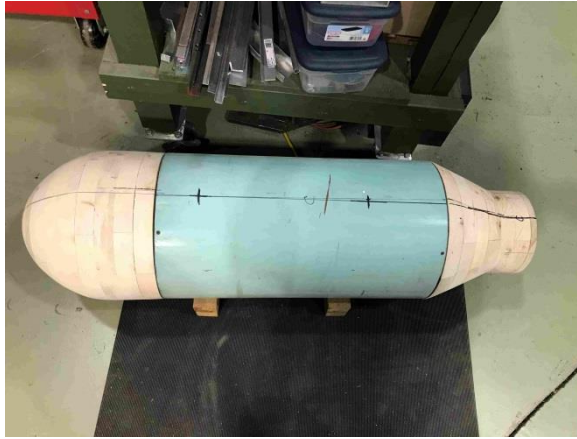


## Restoration Progress

Work is progressing on the 500 pound bomb replica. The tail is almost complete. Still have lots of sanding and assembly and sanding and bondo and sanding....Did I say there would be a lot of sanding? The marks on the bomb show where the hooks will be placed that are used to attach the "bomb" in the bomb bay area. Hopefully soon this will be mounted in GF2.

Lanny graciously took the airplane fuselage home for the winter. He spent hours and hours banging out dents, stripping paint and cleaning the fuselage. For those who have not heard, this fuselage will be used for our flight simulator. Visitors will be able to sit in a real cockpit while using the simulator. It now looks shiny and new!

Several people are working in the area around the lower turret. Within the turret location, there are four large metal attach points for bolting in the turret. Lanny has been furiously drilling and banging in that area to remove the broken, rusted bolts holding in these four brackets. He is cleaning the metal then reattaching the brackets with new, strong bolts. David, Ken, and Dennis have been working on the floor ribs and the front wall of the lower turret. We have been studying manuals to determine exactly how the floor of the radio operator's area should be fabricated. We are extremely fortunate to have some pictures from a B-25C being restored in Australia. Their B-25 has more of the original parts in this area than GF2. The warbird restoration community is a close-knit group who helps each other out with restoration information. We have pictures of this area from Carl Scholl in California and a group from Australia. B-25s are being restored world-wide!

The upper floor shown in these two pictures is still in GF2. In the picture on the left, the area we are currently rebuilding is the lower floor and lower walls. In the picture on the right, you can see the round circle where the lower turret would be located. This round circle is still in GF2 but the wall located on the front and rear just below this circle is what is being fabricated as shown in the picture above on the left. Come to our open house in April to see this area in person. Hopefully this description helps explain what is currently being restored but nothing is better than seeing it in person.

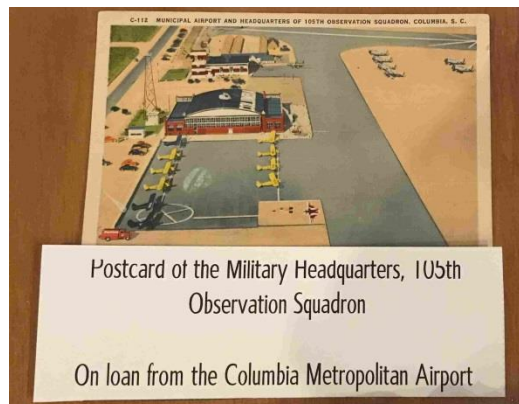


## Cayce Historical Museum
