Restoration Progress

In January 2024, we looked back at 2023 to see all that we accomplished in a year's time. It was inspiring to all of you as well as to those of us doing the restoration. Visitors who have not been to the hangar in a long time always comment as to the progress being made on GF2. When you look at the plane every week, it is hard to see just how far we have come. We thought we would do another recap of the year-long progress.

The biggest completion in 2024 was the bomb bay doors. After a year of hard work, what started out as flat pieces of aluminum is now operating bomb bay doors. As you may notice in the pictures, these are a little over 1/3 size doors. This is so visitors can stand inside the bomb bay to watch how the controls open and close the doors. If you follow SCHAF on Facebook or Instagram, have you seen the video of the bomb bay doors opening and closing?? So exciting! If you have not seen it or even if you have, come to the next open house to see it in person! The restoration crew did an amazing job with these doors.












The bombardier's tunnel was cleaned and painted. The hand rails were installed as well. The before and after pictures really show the progress made in this area



Future Restoration Projects for 2025

It was exciting removing another lower panel located directly behind the lower turret. Repair work has begun on the area around the lower turret. The bottom of the plane in this area needs to be rebuilt from scratch. The back wall of the bomb bay that was completed a couple of years ago is back in place and ready for riveting.

Work has begun on the forward hatch. The top part of the door has been temporarily placed in GF2 to ensure the door will open and close. The step that opens downward when the hatch is opened is operated by pulleys and cables. These are currently being researched and fabricated.

This year Panic Motorsports even brought a Mazda racecar painted to look like the Tuskegee Red Tails. Donations

SCHAF was fortunate to receive several donations in 2024. These donations help with both the restoration work on GF2 and with teaching the history of aviation in SC. Tools such as this drill press and scissors lift (under the tarp) are valuable tools for restoration work. The donated cars are on sale to raise money for restoration work.









Ed Sylvester's family donated two parachute packs, parachute canopies, a beautiful gas powered model biplane on permanent loan and a heavy duty sewing machine (shown above). The sewing machine is already being used to make insulation to go along the walls of the navigator's area and tunnel to the bombardier's area





At the April Open House, a never-before-seen canvas picture of GF2 was donated by Dwight Bundrick who was one of the National Guardsmen who drove GF2 from Greenwood to Columbia. At another open house, Dwight brought SCHAF an original video showing GF2 being loaded on the trailer then driven thru the streets of Greenwood on her way here.
