

GF2 Progress

The restoration team has been working hard on several projects. In a past newsletter, we mentioned replica 100 pound bombs made out of PVC pipe and wood that were made by Sam Bowers. John has been steadily working on completing these bombs for placing in GF2. This involved sanding, bondo, painting, making fins, attaching the hooks, and all sorts of small details. In the picture below, you may notice that one is painted yellow and one is painted blue. The blue bombs were the practice bombs and the yellow bombs were the explosive ones. Eventually examples of both will be place in the bomb bay area.



In the last newsletter, we showed pictures of the skin under the front with lots and lots of clecos. After days of riveting, the clecos are gone and the skin looks nice. Just a little bit more work to do then the skin can be painted. After an evening of riveting, I have a renewed appreciation for the Rosie the Riveters who did this all day every day. The picture on the left is the new skin in place. The picture on the right if looking at the floor inside the navigator's compartment. This is the opposite side of the picture on the left. If you notice, there is sand on the new skin. Even after years of vacuuming SCHAF, the dirt still falls from all sorts of crevices. This sand was falling all around as we were riveting the floor in place.
