Foundation Happenings

SCHAF was recently contacted by Jason Ewart who was in town on business. His great-uncle flew B-25s in WWII so Jason was interested in seeing GF2. While Lt Hankins' pilot log does not list the exact B-25 he was flying during training, he was stationed at GAAB at the time GF2 was flying. It is possible the Lt flew our plane during training! The following write-up about his uncle was sent to us by Jason.



2nd Lt. Lawrence Ray Hankins

My great-uncle was 2nd Lt. Lawrence Ray Hankins from Moxahala, Ohio. Enlisted in 1942 at the age of 21. Graduated flight school from Ellington Field in Texas. Then came to Columbia AAB and Grenville AAB in April-Jun 1944, before heading overseas. He was a co-pilot in the 405th Squadron, 38th Bomb Group. He was first stationed in Nadzab, New Guinea, then to Morotai Island for combat ops in October '44. On December 27, 1944, he and the other 4 crew were killed when their B-25J crashed on Tarakan Island during a mission. Reports claim it was due to enemy ground fire. But the information I have does not provide further details. They were declared MIA for nearly a year before officially declared KIA. The crew's remains were not recovered until 1950. They were buried together in Little Rock national Cemetery.

In one of his letters from Columbia, AAB, he tells his mother, "If it wasn't for these darn shacks we live in, I would like this place a lot...." "These pine trees are nice and the weather is fine."

In a letter from Greenville AAB, he writes about going to dances in the evenings at the American Legion Hall nicknamed "The Hut" with the Ladies Auxiliary.

Another thing that may interest you...writing about the 405th Squadron he says, "We are known as the buzz boys of the Pacific. We fly right on the tree tops and when there are no trees, we clip the grass. Their anti-aircraft batteries can't hit us that way."

History of GF2

We are very excited and appreciative to the Index-Journal newspaper in Greenwood, SC. Adam Benson, a staff writer at the newspaper, wrote a wonderful article about our work being done on GF2. Matthew Hensley, editor at the newspaper, took the time to look up and send us copies of previous Index-Journal articles featuring GF2. The following is the article originally featured in the Index-Journal issue from 7 June 1944. Since this was the day after D-Day, GF2 was relegated to a small article on page 5 under the "Brief City News" headline:

Bomber Lands in Lake Greenwood

A B-25 bomber from the Greenville Air Base made a forced landing in Lake Greenwood, about a mile above the Buzzard Roost Dam, yesterday afternoon, with no loss of life, Col. Oliver H Stout, commanding officer of the base, announced last night.

No other information was released from the base, but it was learned here that three of the men were unhurt and two were only slightly injured.
