#### **Historical Notes-**

This month marks the 76<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Doolittle Raiders historic mission to bomb Japan and strike a blow against Japan following Pearl Harbor. For the raid, the B-25 planes were made as light as possible to facilitate taking off from an aircraft carrier. Knowing planes would be lost, the US did not want the Norden bombsight to get into the hands of the Japanese. Since the Norden bombsight worked best above 4000 feet and the Raiders would be flying at 1500 feet, the Norden would essentially be ineffective. Lt C Ross Greening designed a makeshift bombsight he called the "Mark Twain". At the time, the cost of the Norden was \$10,000 while the cost of the "Mark Twain" was 20 cents. Pictured below is a replica of the "Mark Twain".



#### **Good Reads-**

April 18<sup>th</sup> is the 76<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Doolittle Raiders. Over the years, many books have been written about the Raiders. How many of these books have you read?

Target Tokyo: Jimmy Doolittle and the Raid that Avenged Pearl Harbor by James M Scott – This is an in-depth book about the planning and mission of the Doolittle Raiders. The research that went into the writing of this book can easily be seen when reading this book. (Thanks to Deborah Bailey for recommending this book)

I Could Never be so Lucky Again: An Autobiography of James H "Jimmy" Doolittle – While this book has been around for a long time, it is still a must read if you are interested at all in the history of the Raiders.

Lt Bill Farrow Doolittle Raider by John Chandler Griffin - Born in Darlington SC. He was the pilot of the 16<sup>th</sup> plane, "Bat Out of Hell" on the raid. Bill was captured and subsequently executed by the Japanese.

Thirty Seconds Over Tokyo by Capt. Ted Lawson – Almost everyone has seen the movie, but have you read the book? The books always go into much more detail.
