

The stages of menopause

Menopause marks a moment in a woman's life when her reproductive years come to an end. It is a natural part of aging and represents when a person has gone 12 consecutive months without a menstrual period.

Perimenopause

Although some may think that menopause lasts several years, it actually is a single moment in time when menstruation ceases. However, perimenopause is the period of years leading up to menopause, or when women or people assigned female at birth start to transition to menopause, according to the Cleveland Clinic. Perimenopause also is called "perimenopause transition." It usually starts in one's forties and lasts until menopause. Gradual changes occur during perimenopause, including skipped periods, longer or shorter periods, hot flashes, or changes in mood. Perimenopause tends to set in anywhere from five to 10 years before a final period.

Menopause

A woman will not know she has reached menopause until it actually has happened and no subsequent periods occur. False alarms are not uncommon. During perimenopause, skipping periods is common, and menstrual cycles may shorten, causing cycles to come on more frequently and run into one another.

While menopause can occur at any time in one's forties or fifties, the average age of occurrence in the United States is 51. The Mayo Clinic says symptoms of menopause can start during perimenopause and persist a few years after a person's last menstrual cycle.

These symptoms include chills, night sweats, hot flashes, sleeping disturbances, mood changes, weight gain and slowed metabolism, vaginal dryness, thinning hair and skin, and loss of breast fullness. Many women also notice changes in the shape or performance of their bodies, such as changes in the waist and joints and muscles being stiff and achy.

There are treatments available that may help with menopausal issues that can be discussed with health providers.

Postmenopause

Postmenopause is the name given to the time after menopause. During this stage, the severity of menopause symptoms may lessen. However, some women may experience symptoms for 10 years or more. Menopause puts people at risk for several health conditions due to reduced estrogen levels, including osteoporosis and heart disease, according to the Cleveland Clinic. While menopause is a distinct moment in time when reproduction ceases, it is preceded and followed by other stages that affect women in various ways.

What men should know about prostate cancer

The digital age has dominated twenty-first century life and transformed how people live. Access to information pertaining to just about any topic is now never more than a quick smartphone search away. That's made information more readily available, but it's also led some to believe there's simply too much data to process at times.

It's undeniable that many things are now around to compete for individuals' attention, and it's no small task to determine what does and doesn't merit consideration. Health-conscious adults recognize the importance of staying on top of health-related issues, and that may involve educating oneself about certain diseases with the hope of understanding and reducing individual risk.

For men, recognition of some important facts about prostate cancer can help them better understand a disease that the World Cancer Research Fund International reports is the second most commonly occurring cancer in men.

- ~ The Prostate Cancer Foundation and the Canadian Cancer Foundation report that one in eight men in the United States and Canada will be diagnosed with prostate cancer in his lifetime.
- ~ Men are more likely to develop prostate cancer than they are melanoma and cancers of the colon, kidney and stomach combined.
- ~ The PCF estimates that more than three million men in the U.S. are currently living with prostate cancer.
- ~ The CCS estimates that 67 Canadian men will be diagnosed with prostate cancer every day.
- ~ The risk for prostate cancer increases considerably as men age. According to the PCF, roughly 60 percent of prostate cancer cases are found in men over the age of 65.
- Men who have a father, brother or son who has been diagnosed with prostate cancer could be twice as likely to develop the disease
 as those without such a connection.
- ~ The CCS reports the five-year survival rate for prostate cancer among men in Canada was 91 percent in 2022. By contrast, the five-year survival rate for all cancers in the same year was 62 percent. The American Cancer Society reports that the five-year survival rate for prostate cancer in the U.S. was 97 percent between 2012 and 2018.
- ~ The PCF notes that prostate cancer often produces no symptoms, which underscores the significance of prostate cancer examinations. The ACS reports that the prostate-specific antigen (PSA) blood test is used mainly to screen for prostate cancer in men

without symptoms. Men are urged to speak with their physicians about testing for the disease, even if they are symptom-free. The ACS indicates such a discussion for men who are at average risk for the disease should occur at age 50, while the MD Anderson Cancer recommends men open a dialogue with their physicians beginning at age 40.

Prostate cancer is a common yet treatable disease. Men are urged to educate themselves about prostate cancer and discuss prevention with their physicians.

The health benefits of being in nature

Nature enthusiasts are known to say that spending time in the great outdoors has a positive effect on their mental and physical well-being. Such an outlook is more than mere speculation, as it turns out spending time in nature provides a host of health benefits that might surprise even the most devoted outdoors enthusiasts.

Nature and cognitive health

A 2010 study published in the American Journal of Alzheimer's Disease & Other Dementias found that engaged persons with dementia in horticultural therapy-based (HT-based) programming solicited higher rates of participation than traditional activities (TA) programming. In addition, a separate 2013 study in the journal Dementia found that exposure to a therapeutic garden had a positive impact on quality of life for people with dementia. And it's not just dementia patients who can experience the cognitive benefits of time spent in nature, as the Hagley Museum and Library reports that numerous studies have found exposure to nature improves cognitive function.

Nature and vitamin D

The potential health benefits of vitamin D are increasingly drawing the attention of medical researchers, and for good reason.
According to the Harvard Medical School, recent research has suggested that vitamin D may offer added protection against conditions such as osteoporosis, cancer, heart attack, stroke, and depression. Exposure to sunshine can help the body generate vitamin D, thus providing further reason to spend time in nature.

Nature and overall well-being

Given the aforementioned health benefits related to spending time in nature, it's easy for even non-scientists to conclude that being outdoors has a profound impact on overall well-being. But non-scientists can rest assured that recent research has confirmed

such conclusions. A 2019 study published in the journal Scientific Reports found that individuals who spent at least 120 minutes a week in nature were significantly more likely to report good health and psychological well-being than those who spent less time outdoors. Though the authors of the study cautioned that the exposure-response relationship was under-researched, and therefore likely needed to be studied more extensively, in the meantime individuals, after a consultation with their physicians and confirmation that it's safe to get out more often, can aspire to spend at least 120 minutes in nature each week. The results may speak for themselves.

Nature has a lot to offer, and the benefits of spending more time outdoors may be even more significant than people recognize.





Did you know?

Atrial fibrillation (AFib) is the most common type of treated heart arrhythmia. An arrhythmia is diagnosed when the heart beats too slowly, too quickly or irregularly. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, when an individual has AFib, the beating in the upper chambers of their heart is irregular, which compromises blood flow from the upper to lower chambers. The CDC notes that researchers estimate roughly 12 million people in the United States will have AFib in 2030. The Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada reports that one-fourth of all strokes after age 40 are caused by AFib and that people with the condition have a three to five times greater risk for ischemic stroke than those who do not have AFib. A 2019 report from the American Heart Association indicated high blood pressure accounts for roughly 20 percent of all cases of AFib. The CDC notes advancing age, obesity, diabetes, smoking, chronic kidney disease, and European ancestry are some additional risk factors for AFib.

This whimsical fall treat ideal for special gatherings

Pumpkin spice may be all the rage in October and November, but it's all about apples in the early weeks of fall. Visiting a local orchard to hand-pick apples is an entertaining way to spend an afternoon with young or old, and it's a great opportunity to gather incredients for apple pie.

For fall birthdays or other special occasions, skip the celebratory cake for something even more eye-catching: an elaborately decorated pie! Not too many people can resist the tart flavor of fresh apples and the buttery, flaky appeal of a delicious pie crust. Turn a store-bought or homemade pie into an artistic masterpiece with these directions for "Flying Unicorn Pie" from 'Pies are Awesome: The Definitive Pie Art Book" (Quarto) by Jessica Leigh Clark-Bojin.

Flying Unicorn Pie-Makes 1 pie

Ingredients:

Egg wash (or almond milk if making a vegan pie)

Brown gel food color

Vanilla extract

Assortment of sanding sugar, sprinkles, and small Sixlets or drag'es Gold and pearl luster dust

Vodka or any clear alcohol or extract to mix with the luster dust

Supplies:

The pie pan of your choice

Baking sheet

Parchment paper


Food-safe precision knife

Pastry brush

Food-safe artist brushes

Ramekins or small containers to mix color and hold egg wash

Fondant sculpting tool (or toothpick)



- 1. Roll out the dough of your choice onto parchment and cut out all the Flying Unicorn template pieces with a sharp knife. Cut out as many "rays" as you like. Don't worry if they look long; they'll shrink in the oven! (Purchase the cookbook for the template or use clip art to create your own template.)
- 2. Coat all the pieces in the egg wash using a pastry brush.
- 3. Paste the pieces together using the egg wash as "glue." Smooth out the joints with the back of your fingernail or a fondant sculpting tool. If you have any trouble lifting the pieces, just pop your work in the freezer for 2 minutes, then use a spatula to lift the bits. Score some feather lines in the wings with a fondant sculpting tool.
- 4. You can either paint the unicorn now with gel colors, or just give it a quick vanilla wash. Make sure you choose colors that will stand out from your background. Bake the pieces at 400 F (200 C) for about 8 minutes, or until golden brown. Every oven is slightly different so keep an eye on it. Set the baked pieces aside to cool while you make the base pie. If you are making your base pie, add a decorative crimped edge of some sort to fancy it up.
- 5. Once the base pie has baked, place your cooled 'ray" pieces evenly around the top of the base pie with a spatula. Let the pie fully cool and then add the edible bling of your choice (this is the fun part!).
- 6. For the final step, place a dab of jam, chocolate, sugar glue, or leftover filling in the center as glue, and place your unicorn with a spatula. You can add some luster dust mixed with a bit of vodka now if you feel like it needs a bit more fabulousness.

Tip: Since you are going to be coating the top of this pie in sanding sugars, select a filling that is not overly sweet; maybe even something tart, and don't put any sugar in the crust. You can use any flavor of filling you like and the dough of your choice. You can also use a store-bought pie.



Meet Mary Lu Scholl a local novelist!



I have lived in Citrus County twice! I moved here from Arizona with the Postal Service in the early 80s, and then spent twenty years in Colorado. I moved back in 2018. It has grown, but most of what I loved is here, family. I love gardening, writing and public speaking. I no longer even pretend to fish. I have a pedal boat, but it's in dry dock...

My favorite destination is a Home Depot and I eat at Cody's or the Loft regularly. Citrus County Parks and Rec puts up with me as a casual laborer -- great people there.

l define myself now as a novelist. I have two cozy mystery series (short, fun, no profanity or gore) and love to help, and learn from, other authors of Citrus Writers of Florida.

More Rowing than Fishing

First let me explain, I was a city kid.

I moved to the Nature Coast in the 80's and wanted a boat. Not like my husband's boat -- intimidating and efficient. I only wanted a small boat, one with oars because I don't do well with motors. I suggested a canoe and my husband laughed at me. Finally he found me a little Jon Boat with an anchor on a six foot rope (that's important later). His only admonition was "Stay out of the Gulf."

My daughter wanted to go fishing. She was in grade school, and less squeamish than I. She, for example would pluck oysters right off a rock and eat them (her dad's influence). My husband was busy that day, so we loaded up and took off for the nearest river. Neither of us were accomplished fisherman, had any idea what we were fishing for, and only a vague idea what to do with one if we caught it. The trip was the principle of the thing. Nevertheless, after seeing all the wildlife in our immediate area, and catching nothing, we were bored -- and determined to prove to my husband we could do this.

I rowed, and rowed. Soon the water around us opened up into a wider expanse. I suspected we were at the mouth of the river. We dutifully stopped -- ever obedient -- and cast our lines again. There was a little island just a little further out just begging us to try our luck out there. Just past it was another one; fish follow channels between islands, right? What was the difference if we iust went a little further?

The river was a distant memory. Sharon was looking over her end of the boat into the water and said, "Uh-oh."

You've undoubtedly heard the expression 'hook, line and sinker.' I looked into the water on my side and whatever it was, was longer than our boat. It grabbed Sharon's line and suddenly it was dangling with that stressed little crookedness that indicates the complete disdain the creature had of our efforts. I calmly told her I thought we had fished enough for the day and looked around to get our bearings. I had rowed that far out, rowing that far in shouldn't be a problem. The tide was going out. I hadn't factored in the disparity of my efforts to that of the tide. I rowed. I rowed. We went nowhere. When I quit rowing we went the wrong direction.

Not a problem! I threw out my anchor. Apparently, the water was deeper than six feet. THAT was a problem.

I rowed harder.

"What's wrong, Mom?"

"Nothing, Honey. Everything's fine. See that pier over there? Wave at the people on it."

She waved, they waved back -- sitting in their lawn chairs and enjoying the afternoon safely on a wooden deck with less than six feet of water under it. I decide maybe I should head obliquely and try to get to shallower water even if it was farther from my target. A desperate effort got us a little closer to shore where it wasn't quite as deep. I was exhausted. I tossed the anchor over and breathed heavily for a minute. Sharon looked at me with concern. "Where are we?"

"The good news is we are getting closer to the river."

"Where were we?"

"Kind of in the Gulf." My daughter -- much better behaved than I am -- was horrified.

l ignored her and looked around. I couldn't row with the anchor down because it wasn't long enough to let me get anywhere. When I picked it up, I went the wrong direction. Did I mention the tide? I pulled the anchor in. It didn't take long. Did I mention six feet? I tossed it toward a nearby rock under the water. It caught and I pulled us up to the rock. My next target was a stand of some kind of water vegetation. It caught and I repeated the maneuver. In this manner, we continued moving incrementally closer to the mouth of the river. We had attracted attention from the pier. They were now standing and leaning on the railing. I'm not sure if they were catcalling or offering encouragement -- I was too tired to care. Sharon waved and they waved back.

Moving closer to the shore, I kept it up. It was getting late. There was a spectacular sunset. The people on the pier ignored it. We were far more interesting. It requires different muscles to throw an anchor and pull the boat along the rope than it does to row. I

finally switched back and found the pull (shove) of the tide had lessened. As we reentered the relative safety of the river, a cheer broke out from our audience. "Yay! Good job!"

Sharon jumped out when we were close to shore where we put in. One more thrust of the oars beached us and I crawled out. 

Labor Day weekend travel tips

Labor Day is celebrated on the same day in the United States and Canada each year. An annual holiday to celebrate the achievements of workers, Labor Day (known as Labour Day in Canada), occurs on the first Monday of September each year.

Though its status as the end of summer is not technically accurate, Labor Day marks the unofficial end to the season of fun in the sun for millions of people across both the U.S. and Canada. That makes the weekend preceding Labor Day one of the most popular times to travel. Indeed, data from the Transportation Security Administration indicates that the Friday before Labor Day 2022 was the second busiest travel day at U.S. airports that summer. Travel was equally popular on Labour Day weekend 2022 in Canada, where the online booking platform Kayak reports searches for international flights had increased by 104 percent compared to the year prior.

Labor Day weekend travel figures to be just as popular this year, so travelers can keep these tips in mind as they plan one last summer getaway.

- ~ Book as early as possible. With so many people interested in traveling on Labor Day weekend, it behooves all travelers to plan ahead. Competition for hotel rooms and other lodging might be steep, and individuals who plan to fly might have trouble finding seats on flights that leave during peak travel hours the longer they delay.
- ~ Consider traveling by car. Air travel afficionados had some good news and bad news as the summer travel season began in 2023.

 Data from FlightAware indicated that flight cancellations were down in 2023 compared to 2022. However, FlightAware data also indicated there were an average of 7,000 to 9,000 flight delays per day in the U.S. in the first half of 2023. No one wants to send off the last weekend of summer with a lengthy flight delay, so travelers who want to spend as much time as possible celebrating may want to drive rather than fly to their destinations.
- ~ Drive during off-peak hours. Air travelers must cede some control over when to depart, but drivers can pick their own time to hit the road. Starting a trip during off-peak hours, such as early in the morning or even after rush hour on Thursday night, may enable drivers to avoid traffic.

~ Travel light. Warm weather tends to linger into Labor Day weekend, so there's no need to pack heavy. That's especially noteworthy for air travelers. The lighter travelers can pack for a flight, the less likely they will need to check a bag. That decreases the likelihood bags will be lost if a flight is delayed or canceled, and it also allows travelers to deplane and leave the airport without having to wait around to claim their bags.

~ Extend the trip. An extra day at the end of the trip can help travelers avoid the crowds on the way home. Parents may need to travel on Labor Day if school is already in session or starting on Tuesday. But travelers who have no reason to rush home can get an extra day of fun in the sun and travel home on a day that tends to be less hectic. Labor Day weekend marks the unofficial end of summer. Travelers can keep various strategies in mind to get the most out of summer's swan song.



Rice is the star of this Korean comfort food

Rice is a staple food in many different cultures. Rice often is a popular side dish or even featured prominently as part of an entre. Tteok is found in sweet and savory Korean dishes. Tteok are rice cakes made from rice that is steamed and pounded to form a product that is distinctively chewy. Most tteok are rolled into cylinders and cut into pieces, or sliced thinly on a diagonal. The rice cakes are available at retailers both fresh and frozen, and can be eaten out of hand or added to stir-frys or even fried to a crispy texture. This recipe for 'Royal Tteokbokki" from "Judy Joo's Korean Soul Food" (White Lion) is a stir-fry comfort food that hails from the

royal court of the Chosun dynasty.

Royal Tteokbokki (Serves 4)

pound beef rib eye, trimmed and thinly sliced

1 3 2 1 5 2 1/4 small firm but ripe pear, grated

tablespoons brown sugar

tablespoons soy sauce

tablespoons roasted sesame oil

tablespoon vegetable oil, plus a drizzle for the stir-fry

garlic cloves, grated

tablespoons roasted sesame seeds, crushed

teaspoon ginger, peeled and grated

1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Stir fry

10 ounces tteok (thin rice cake batons) 2 ounces baby onions, peeled and quartered

33/4 ounces mixed wild mushrooms

rainbow carrot, peeled and julienned

3 1/2 ounces baby leeks, trimmed and cut lengthways into quarters 3

ounces baby corn, cut length-wise into quarters

To serve

sprig onion

quail egg, soft boiled

Pinch of black sesame seeds

In a shallow dish, combine the beef, pear and brown sugar and massage with your hands to thoroughly combine. Leave to marinate for about 30 minutes at room temperature. Meanwhile, in a large bowl, stir together the soy sauce, sesame oil, vegetable oil, garlic, crushed sesame seeds, ginger, and black pepper. Set aside.

When the beef is ready, use your hands to shake off and squeeze out any excess sugary liquid, then add the beef to the soy sauce marinade. Toss to coat, cover and marinate for about 30 minutes at room temperature, or overnight in the fridge.

Meanwhile, cut the spring onion length-wise into thin strips and soak in iced water until curled, then drain.

About 30 minutes before cooking, place the tteok in a large bowl with enough water to cover them. Leave them to rehydrate. Once the tteok are rehydrated, remove from the water, retaining 4 tablespoons of liquid. Heat a drizzle of vegetable oil in a large frying pan over medium heat. Add the baby onions and cook for 6 to 8 minutes until softened. Add the mushrooms, carrot, baby leeks and baby corn, and cook for a further 5 minutes until slightly softened.

Increase the heat to medium-high, add the beef, marinade rehydrated tteok, and the retained water. Cook for 2 to 3 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the meat is medium rare, and slightly pink in the center. Transfer to a serving plate, and arrange the spring onion and quail egg on top. Finish with a sprinkle of black sesame seeds.

Did you know?

No one wants to receive a cancer diagnosis, and learning that a child has cancer can be especially challenging for kids, their parents and extended families. The American Childhood Cancer Organization estimates that 15.780 children between the ages of birth and 19 years of age are diagnosed with cancer each year in the United States. That amounts to roughly 1 in 285 children being diagnosed before age 20. The Government of Canada reports that each year roughly 880 children under the age of 15 are diagnosed with cancer in Canada. Among Canadian and American children, leukemia is the most commonly diagnosed cancer, followed by brain and nervous system cancers. The good news is 85 percent of children with cancer now survive five years or more, according to the American Cancer Society. That marks a significant increase from the five-year survival rate of 58 percent in the mid-1970s.







7 signs a pet could be in pain

Pets and even wild animals can convey sentiments in various ways. It's human nature to want to assume that the passing glances of a puppy are looks of deep love; and they very well may be. - 2. Excessive behaviors: A pet in pain may lick or scratch a specific area. Cats may howl or meow frequently.
- 3. Accidents: Pets who are in pain could forget some of their hovertraining. Cats may urinate outside of the litter box, while dogs may have accidents indoors.
- 4. Reduced appetite: Being in pain or ill may reduce the desire to eat or drink in some pets. Pets who have dental issues may be even more reluctant to eat because chewing triggers the pain.
- 5. Difficulties lying down or standing up: Pain that originates from injuries or arthritis can make it challenging for pets to sit, stand or lie down easily. Limping or having trouble walking are some additional indicators of injury or arthritis.
- 6. Changes in body posture: Most pet owners have a good idea of what their animals look like when they are relaxed and in good health. A pet who is hunched or especially rigid, or one hanging his or her head, could be masking pain.
- 7. Agitation or restlessness: Some pets cannot get settled when they're in pain. They may pace the house or not lie down long enough to get adequate rest.
