## A Memorial Day Message 2024

My greatest fear is that we will not use the freedom these men and women died for on the battlefield, street corners, or schoolhouses to promote the unity and harmony our country requires to remain strong and vital in the world. The selfless acts of those who serve our nation and lost their lives in the process must be remembered with reverence and respect, and the best way to hold them in the high honor they deserve is not to make America great because they have already done that. Our duty is to keep America great by working together to preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States with God's help in every way we can as long ever as we can!

Let us in the Scottish Rite of Freemasonry unite in the cause of human progress, taking this special holiday as the opportunity to rekindle the spirit of unity and harmony our nation so desperately needs, not from forms of religious or political fanaticism but from friendship, morality, brotherly love, and recognition of duty and sacrifice by those who gave it.
