



VALLEY OF NEW BERN

50 YEARS IN THE SCOTTISH RITE

Ifeel very fortunate to have had a present-day, 50 year Scottish Rite Mason, Rhyne Garris, as my friend and mentor for about as long as I have been in the fraternity. He will soon reach the age of 95, and he has lived a good life, in my view. Enlisting at the age of 16



in 1946, he was eager to serve his country. His starting pay was \$50 per month but soon went up with "overseas" pay. His underage enlistment was eventually discovered, but by then, he was stationed in North China with the 1st Marine Regiment. He had reached the required age by that time, and his sergeant just made him sign form to continue. There is no way he would ever approve of me writing about him, so any questions I needed to ask were on the sly. He has lived

like he knows that life is not about looking good, feeling good, and gathering the goods but about doing good and helping others to do the same. A mutual friend of ours has said that when he moved to the area from Ohio many years ago, "Rhyne was one of the first people I met...he shook my hand and he hasn't yet let go." He and two other men, one who is also currently a 50 year SRM, and the other a deceased brother, were some of the first workers at the Onslow County Ministry Soup Kitchen about forty years ago. At the time, it was in a small building about the size of an average

living room behind one of the downtown churches, and soup and sandwiches were the fare for everyone. The Masons would sit in the back of a camper as it went down the road, making the PB and I sandwiches as fast as they could to hand out at designated spots in the county that were inhabited by less fortunate individuals. Soup was ladled out into cups and containers brought by the patrons to the camper. The soup kitchen now operates out of a refurbished grocery store and serves several hundred meals daily while also distributing thousands of pounds of surplus, donated food every week. Rhyne was always recruiting volunteers, and when one brother tried to escape because he was busy being a passionate barbershop singer, Rhyne just went to the brother's wife who gladly signed him up. While the trappings of wealth have never been associated with him, he has always given away what he had to whoever he thought needed help. No fanfare, but as his friend, I have seen his abundant generosity, often to strangers, over and over with my own eyes. As the founder and operator of his church's food pantry, he annually delivered gift baskets to needy families for Christmas. Once, he had collected turkeys for the baskets, but he needed someone to cook them. He took ten of them to the local Piggly Wiggly, and asked how much it would cost to have them cooked there. The lady told him it would be \$10 per bird, and he agreed. When he went back to get them, the lady who had done the cooking asked about why he needed so much turkey. When he told her, she began yelling at him that he should have told her that before, and she made the new price of \$1 per turkey. Goodness begets goodness, and Rhyne Garris has spent his life sowing seeds of goodness wherever he went, and he had great fun all the while.


