## Reedville Fisherman's Museum

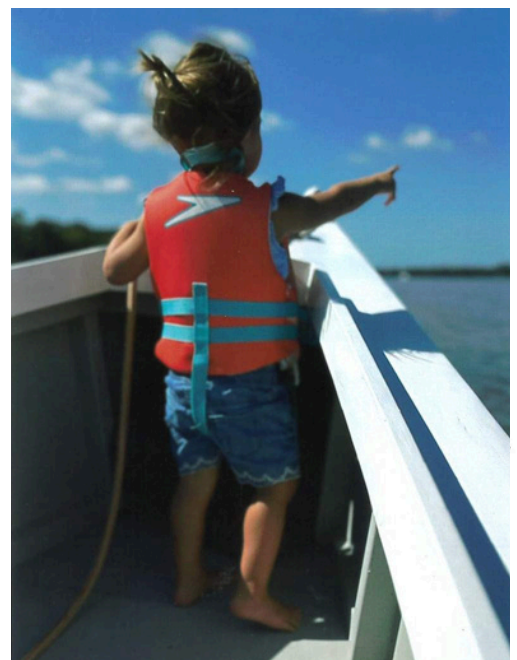
I just wanted to reach out to you and the guys in the shop who built our skiff we purchased back in August of this year. Even though we picked up our skiff later in the season we were still able to get it outfitted and get some time on the Chester River.

I wanted to share some photos of why I purchased this skiff. Simply just to introduce my granddaughter "Layla Rose" to boating. I thought this would be the best and safest way to accomplish that. Well it certainly was. She loves the boat which just makes me very happy. I started with a wooden skiff when I was young. # THE CLAUD REFIT

In the first step toward a total refit of the historic skipjack Claud W. Somers, volunteer crew members removed the mainsail and jib Saturday, Nov. 8. The vessel, built in 1911, has been owned by the Reedville Fishermen's Museum for 25 years.

Sails are a skipjack's only means of self-propulsion. In early December the skipjack's push boat, which has an engine, will guide the Somers to Jennings Boatyard in Fairport. The skipjack will be put "on the hard" until the spring for examination and refitting from stem to stern.

New Dacron sails will be made by Evolution Sails by Latell and Ailsworth in Deltaville. The museum was awarded two grants totaling \$100,000 (\$75,000 from the Va. Department of Historic Resources and National Park Service and \$25,000 from the Colonial Market Colonial Farm) for the refit.





# CAPTAINS CORNER

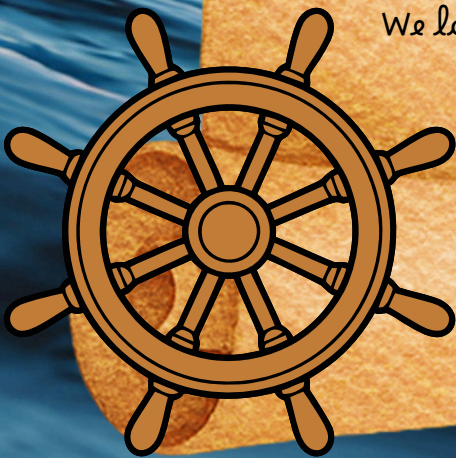
The Claud W. Somers finished her season this year on a high note having sailed for crew training and with passengers at least twice per month from March through October of this year. In February, the crew had decided they were going to get her back on the water as a USCG passenger vessel and they accomplished that and more! Over one hundred and fifty passengers sailed on the Somers this year, visitors that came to Reedville and the Museum to experience something special. Additionally, fourteen crew managed to rack up fifteen hundred volunteer hours for the year.

As the season comes to an end, the crew has begun down-rigging to prepare the boat for the move to Jennings Boatyard for work related to our heritage grant and for our next USCG inspection. You'll notice that she looks a little forlorn with her sails off, but it's only temporary. The heritage grant is paying for new sails, running rigging, centerboard and rudder among other things. The crew will be working on her over the winter and she'll be back sailing again next year!

We look forward to seeing you all out on the water.

## P is for Pea Crab.

"You may find a small crab inside of an oyster. They are called pea crabs, which may live inside an oyster for their whole life. A pea crab gets food from the oyster and can be eaten with the oyster. It is considered good luck to find and eat a pea crab!"

That is one of 26 fascinating factoids that readers of the new book "ABCs of Oystering on the Chesapeake Bay" will learn. The book by two local educators is set for publication Dec. 9. The book's author, Susan Swift, said that the letter P is her favorite description.

The book's artist, Heather Cockrell, said her favorite illustration is for "O is for Oystermen." Her artwork shows a waterman and their basset hound, Fred. Her husband, Nick, is an engineer on one of Ocean Harvester's fish boats.

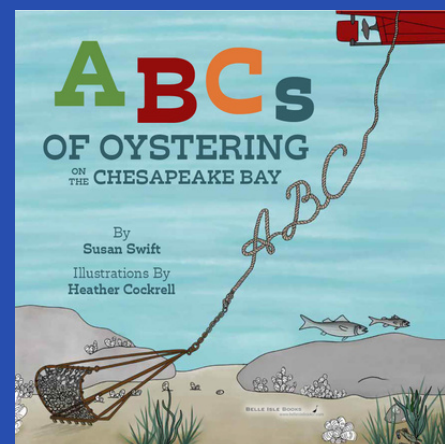
This is the second book in a series by the two friends and educators. The first was "ABCs of Crabbing on the Chesapeake Bay," published in July 2024. A third book, "ABCs of Menhaden Fishing on the Chesapeake Bay," is planned. Swift is librarian at Northumberland Elementary School. Cockrell is art teacher at Northumberland Middle School. The two are active in Alpha Delta Kappa, an altruistic sorority for women in education. They also are members of the Reedville Fishermen's Museum. Shauna McCranie, the museum's executive director, wrote as part of an intro to the new book: "As a board member of the Virginia Oyster Trail, I am certainly an advocate for oysters ... I know children and parents alike will learn something new about everyone's favorite mollusk." Swift said, "It started as a children's book but became a book for anybody. We market it for any age." Cockrell and Swift have a deep appreciation for the heritage of watermen on the bay. Swift has lived on the Northern Neck for 36 years. Her husband, Keith, is a fourth-generation waterman. In season he works for Reedville Bait Co., catching menhaden fish used for bait. He crabs in the spring and oysters in the winter. Their son, Zach, worked the water in summers and college breaks. Cockrell's husband, Nick, is engineer on an Omega fish boat. Both she and her husband were born and raised on the Northern Neck. "It feels really good to publish something that represents our community that hopefully will be around for along time," said Cockrell.

The women fronted the investment for their first book. This one is sponsored by W.E. Kellum Seafood in Weems, a family-owned business since 1948, which has local seafood outlets and ships seafood across the United States. Both books are published by Belle Isle Books, an imprint of Brandylane Publishers Inc. Cover price is \$26.95 for hardback and \$15.95 for soft cover. Among the local outlets are: the Reedville Fishermen's Museum gift shop and Fawn's in Reedville; Lilian's She Shed in Burgess; Pink Lemon and Miss Mary's Seafood in White Stone; Tides Inn and Kellum's in Irvington; River Birch in Middlesex; and The Bookshelf on Church in Kilmarnock. It will be on amazon.com and barnesandnoble.com. Their book is one of two featured at a book talk and signing held by the museum at 6:30 p.m. Feb. 2 at the Fairfield's Volunteer Fire Department. # Community Outreach

Proceeds of \$6,220 will be donated to a Gloucester waterman's family after a raffle sponsored by the Reedville Fishermen's Museum came to a close. Mike Fontaine donated a large framed copy of his oyster-dredging photograph, "Pot Of Gold," to get the raffle under way about a month ago. He was moved by the story of Taylor Mason. After her husband Peyton's passing in June, she took on all aspects of running the couple's young business, the Virginia Oyster Company. She has been working on their oyster boat as well as overseeing the land-side processing facility, all while raising their two young daughters. Mason spoke from the heart to the hundreds of people at the museum's annual Oyster Roast Saturday, where the winning tickets were drawn. "My husband loved the waterman community," said Mason, adding he was always available to help others in the trade. She thanked everyone for their support and asked them to continue to appreciate the sound of a workboat leaving a creek in the early morning. "He lives on through the beauty of working the water," she said. "If you're a waterman, keep doing it. If not, keep supporting all of us," she said. First place won the photograph and \$500, which was donated back to the family. Second place won a smaller version of the print and \$200, donated back to the family. Third place won \$100 and a smaller version of the photograph. Tickets were sold by the museum, the photographer and Miss Mary's Seafood in White Stone and at the Oyster Roast. "The watermen's community is a tight knit group of people," Shauna McCranie, executive director of the museum, said after the event. "Supporting each other is extremely important to them. I am so proud of this community and how they rallied to raise this money for Taylor, her young daughters and her business. "Taylor is a humble and brave young woman, and the next hard-working generation keeping the watermen's and women's dreams alive. They are doing a hard occupation because they love the water, and as a watermen's museum we are here to support them." McCranie, who introduced Mason to the crowd, thanked the 143 adult volunteers and the student volunteers, the Northumberland County Sheriff's Office, the Virginia Waterman's Association and Oyster Roast chairwoman Kim Hampton for helping make the 36th annual Oyster Roast a success. As usual, all 1,000 tickets were sold out several weeks before the event. Oyster Roast proceeds go toward the insurance on the museum's on-land and in-water classic boats.

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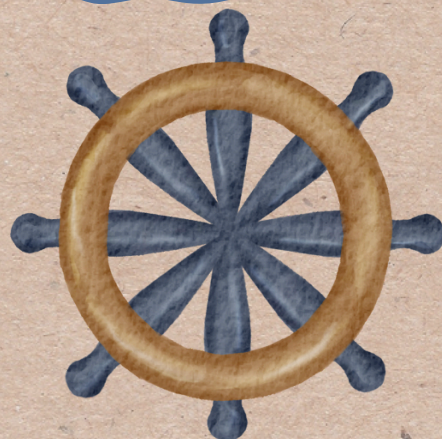
