EFFORTS TO SAVE FESTIVAL HALLE CONTINUE

The Reedville Community rallies once again around a beloved landmark building. For some months now, Festival Halle's doors on Main Street Reedville have been closed for public rental, due to widespread decomposition of the wood structures that support the floor. It must be brought up to ADA and local code requirements. Aquapalooza, hosted by two local sponsors, helped start the campaign to grow the first funds to support RFM's efforts to repair Festival Halle. Held off the shore banks at Omega Protein by the Stack, this event has successful launched fundraising efforts, raising over \$5,000.00 with money still coming into the Venmo account. The "Save Festival Halle Community Committee" is made up of very talented individuals who have expertise in architecture, renovation, contracting, engineering, economic development, and marketing. We have already received approximately \$4,000.00 in in-kind donations from our community committee. They have been working for about four months to come up with a viable plan of execution, we will soon be shovel ready but need to find the funding. The committee has an estimated cost of \$500,000.00 to raise, through local and personal donations and grants. We are pursuing grants to assist our fundraising efforts, but many of these are matching grants so there is much work to be done. This will require community support. ORAL HISTORY

Katy Clune, Virginia Folklife Program Director, along with two other Virginia Humanities staff members and three paid interns from University of Virginia's Public History Institute, presented Executive Director, Shauna McCranie with oral histories that they transcribed this summer for the Reedville Fishermen's Museum.

The Virginia Folklife Program was established in 1989 at Virginia Humanities, with funding support from the Virginia Commission for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. The folklife prorgram is the state center for the documentation, presentation, support, and celebration of Virginia's cultural heritage and it is part of Virginia Humanities, the state humanities council. Whether sung or told, handcrafted, or performed, Virginia's folklife refers to those "arts of everyday life" that reflect a sense of traditional knowledge and connection to community. Virginia's folkways include traditions that have been rooted in the Commonwealth for centuries, as well as those more recently have been carried here and nourished by Virginia's diverse immigrant communities.

Virginia Humanities staff converted the oral history DVDs, originally recorded in the early 2000s, into digital video files before folklife interns transcribed a total of forty-three interviews—representing hours and hours of conversation. Interviewees include Henry E. Dixon, Raymond L. Curry, Jr, Captain Charles R. Winstead, Jr., Wendell Haynie, Captain Carroll Curry, Francis Haynie and many others. With the videos digitized and transcribed, the museum will be able to share these personal histories more easily—whether in the museum itself or on YouTube.

The Virginia Folklife Program has a long-running relationship with RFM. It supported and documented the museum's founding and opening days. Since then, Virginia Folklife recorded the Northern Neck Chantey Singers, who were part of the Folklife Apprenticeship program. George Butler was also part of the Apprenticeship Program, which provides funding and a public platform to support the continuation of cultural traditions between a person who is a master of a craft with someone interested in learning.

"When the Reedville Fishermen's Museum approached us to see if we could support this project, I knew I wanted to say 'yes'! Making oral histories like these accessible, returning them to the community, is so important. I wasn't sure how exactly we would transcribe forty-three interviews when I accepted the project in November of 2022. Our three public history interns, Anderson Moss, Kaity Wasinger, and Kate Wietor, plus our staff member Jennie Taylor, spent hours of their summer carefully listening to these voices from Reedville. A huge thanks to them for making this possible!" said Katy Clune.

FISHERMEN'S FUN FACTS:

Did you know that the American industrial revolution was powered by menhaden? That's right!

During the Civil War, Confederate raiders targeted whaling ships in efforts to diminsh the supply of whale oil. This contributed to the fall of the whaling industry and menhaden took the lead spot as the principal source of industrial lubricant. Whale ships were quickly converted and the purse seine made it's debut! By the late 1800s, half a billion menhaden were being processed. A menhaden boat can produce more oil in a week than a whaling vessel could in years of voyaging, all while staying close to shore and out of harms way!
