

Dear Beloved John Wesley Family and Friends,

As we transition from spring into summer, I would like you to ponder a few things. There is more to summer than relaxing on the beach. While there is plenty of value in rest, you will also want to take advantage of the many restoratives and personally fulfilling opportunities that this unique season provides. Below, Lady Tonica and I offer a few ideas for living out your faith this summer:



Strengthen Your Relationships

Christ instructs us to love one another and yet, mired down in our usual to-do lists, we fail to follow this basic command. We are built by the master Creator to have fulfilling relationships, and for a Christian, there are few worthier pursuits than to spend time with loved ones. If you have spent months away from them, summer may grant you the time you need to maintain or even strengthen these bonds. From pool parties to backyard barbecues, you will enjoy catching up in person, rather than over the phone or social media. It is not all about lighthearted conversation. As a Christian, you are called upon to care for others. Keep an eye open to suffering around you. Be prepared to provide emotional and spiritual support where it is needed. Your friends and family members should know that they can unburden themselves of their worries and fears in your presence, and that you are always happy to help.

Get Reacquainted with Your Bible

If you are like many students, you find yourself thoroughly consumed by textbooks throughout the school year. Now that you finally have a little spare time, dedicate some of your reading efforts to your Bible. Consider joining a summer Bible study if any are available in your area. Otherwise, feel free to peruse your Bible at your own pace.

Keep a journal as you explore new Bible passages or revisit favorites. Recording your thoughts and reactions may help you to better conceptualize the concepts you come across. Explore the applications of these passages. This is a fantastic way to grow stronger in faith and to understand how this beautiful, God-breathed book is still so important 2,000 years after it was written. You will be amazed by the many ways in which Biblical concepts are at play in your home and community.

Expand Your Reading List

The Bible can form the basis of an excellent summer of reading. Beyond this essential, however, you will find plenty of literary options for both insight and entertainment. Set aside a few minutes at the end of each day and curl up with a faith-based book.

Relearn to Pray

If you have fallen into a habit of only praying on Sundays or when you are worried about an upcoming exam, it is time to break out of the trap and establish a more routine prayer life. Summer provides you with more time to relearn how to pray, and the impact prayer has in our lives as believers. Daily devotionals may also prove helpful; many are designed explicitly for college students and young adults.

Embrace a Spirit of Service

Opportunities for volunteerism abound during the summer months. Whether you feel called to a local animal shelter, food shelf, or Habitat for Humanity, you will love the spirit of service at local charities and service organizations. Many churches have ways to serve in a small way on Sundays and beyond. Dedicate yourself to a worthy cause and determine where your talents can best be utilized. Whether you commit to a few hours here and there or go all out with an in-depth volunteer project, you will gain a greater sense of confidence as you see how your efforts benefit others in your community. If you make a regular income, try tithing ten percent of your pay. You are never too young to put aside a portion of what you make to be a resource for God's work, because it is a great blessing to understand everything you have belongs to God. When you serve with all your resources, monetary or otherwise, the Bible says, "You shall be blessed."

Ignite Youth Conference



On March 15, in celebration of Black History, we viewed "The Decision", the second in a series of films produced by First Class Productions. We had viewed the first film in the series, "The Remarkable Story of James Apostle Fields" on January 11. Fields was a member of the first graduating class of Hampton University.



"The Decision" is a fictional story of a phenomenal, young man and his conscientious decision to attend a Historically Black College/University (HBCU) instead of staying at a

prestigious, prejudiced, predominantly white one in pursuit of an extremely lucrative sports career.

Mr. Anthony Bynum hosted the event and facilitated the question and answer session with Morgan Avery McCoy (seen on screen) of First Class Productions. Ms. McCoy says that her progress toward developing and enhancing projects depends on 5 Fs: followers, free marketing, fans, funds, and

Let us dispel some myths.

future stories.

1. Myth: HBCUs are no longer needed.

Fact: HBCUs continue to serve a higher proportion of low-income, Black students than other colleges and universities.

2. Myth: HBCUs discriminate against white students.

Fact: HBCUs are open to students of all creeds, colors, and conditions. In 2022, non-Black students made up 24 percent of enrollment at HBCUs.

3. Myth: HBCUs provide an inferior education.

Fact: HBCUs provide an efficient education for students in a self-affirming environment conducive to learning. There are 104 HBCUs, all of which are accredited by nationally recognized accrediting agencies. Accreditation is crucial for acquiring and maintaining federal funding and ensuring the quality of education.

4. Myth: HBCUs receive sufficient funding.

Fact: Since their inception, HBCUs have been shortchanged public funding owed to them by law.

5. Myth: HBCUs are fiscally mismanaged.

Fact: HBCUs have managed with tighter budgets. They are a "best buy," costing 28 percent less, on average, than other colleges and universities.

6. Myth: HBCU students receive enough student aid due to Pell Grants.

Fact: Pell Grants pay for less than a third of college costs, leaving HBCU students to make up the difference.

7. Myth: HBCU Alumni giving is low.

Fact: Alumni giving at some HBCUs is relatively high, despite the racial wealth gap, but it's not nearly enough to fill funding gaps.

8. Myth: Private HBCUs only enroll well-off black students

Fact: Nearly half of the students enrolled at the top private HBCUs, Spelman College and Howard University, come from low-income families.

9. Myth: Many HBCUs have significant endowments due to private philanthropy.

Fact: HBCU endowments are typically much lower than those of non-HBCU institutions.

10. Myth: HBCUs are not different from other Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs).

Fact: Not all Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs) are created equal. HBCUs have a historic designation for Blacks because of segregation.

Despite His horrific death, Jesus arose victorious, and in Christ, so are we. Victory is mine. Victory today is mine!







The Nickel Boys by Colson Whitehead

In this book based on a true story, boys deemed criminals are sentenced to a Jim Crow-era reform school. However, there is no reforming, only racism, abuse, corruption, and even murder.

The main character, Elwood, a boy of good character, is falsely convicted of car theft and is sent to Nickel Academy where he witnesses and endures intense verbal, mental, and physical abuse, especially of black boys. Corruption, to the disadvantage of the boys, exists between the headmaster and the townspeople. Horrific murders, not discovered for fifty years, occur.

How are desperate boys to survive? How do the survivors recover? This book may leave you with thoughts from which you may need to recover.

Buried Too Deep



A 175th Anniversary Special: Back in the Day at John Wesley UMC-GB



I would like to share a few reflections about John Wesley United Methodist Church - Glen Burnie during my youth and young adulthood. Reverend Solden Nicholson, my grandfather, "Pop Solden", joined JWUMC-GB in his early adulthood. He was a member of the church for more than a half century. He served as Superintendent of Sunday School for 42 years (1913-1955) while also serving as local pastor of the church and the community until his declining years. He passed on November 12, 1966, when I was in my senior year of high school. In remembrance of my grandfather, on Sunday, July 20, 1980, our family sponsored a "Reverend Solden Nicholson Day" church service under the Pastor, Reverend J. C. Belu-John. Grandfather's entire family including his sister, Carrie (Nicholson) Matthews, his son, daughters, nieces, nephews, and grandchildren participated in the service. They served as organist, worship leaders, hostesses, singers and ushers. I gladly served as an usher.


After some years of administering the birth-baptism for my older siblings, Pop Solden administered my birth-baptism on July 11, 1948, and thus began my JWUMC-GB connection. My earliest memory of JWUMC-GB was my walking to church. My family lived within walking distance. I remember my first Sunday school teacher, the lovely Mrs. Sarah Crawford. Her husband, George Crawford, also taught. I remember Mrs. Rosy Williams and Mrs. Mazie Brooks who played the piano for us. I vividly remember my grandfather, distinctively dressed in his suit. He had the best broad smile. I also remember him praying and speaking in the church pulpit.

The church had a strong Christian youth education program. In addition to Sunday School classes, I participated in "Children's Day". Each child in the church was given a speaking part to practice and recite. I fervently practiced my lines. In the summer time, children participated in Vacation Bible School (VBS). Classes and activities were often held outdoors. The Methodist Youth Fellowship (MYF), open to youth in grades 6-12, had an active participation. The program focused on worship, service, recreation and fellowship. The Boy Scout and Girl Scout units also met at the church.



Every June, a Bible was presented to each high school graduate who attended the church. In June 1966, I received one with my name engraved on the cover. Mrs. Helen Taylor, President, and Mrs. Lola Hines, Secretary, of the Women's Society of Christian Service of JWUMC-GB presented it to me. I still have it.

The young adult confirmation classes, usually led by the pastor or his designee, were held in the basement of the parsonage. After completion of our confirmation classes, we were confirmed in the faith, read in as church members, and presented a church membership certificate.



I remember the stylish hats and the various outfits that the ladies of the church wore. Back then, the women parishioners were beautiful head coverings with matching attire, dresses, suits, skirts and blouses; they didn't wear pants in church.

The Sunday worship service experience was enriched by the church choirs. Mr. Hamilton Hines, Organist, accompanied the Senior Choir, Male Chorus, and Mass Choir. Janet Donald was the pianist for the Gospel Choir. It was newly formed back in the day. Her gift of singing was amazing and soul-stirring! I have always loved Gospel music, so I would often go to choir practice with my cousin, Sylvia Queen, a choir member, just to hear the Gospel Choir sing. I was eager to join that choir, and after I did, I sang alto and enjoyed every minute of my time on that wonderful choir.

I believe God is the giver of all life. My family thanks God for our grandfather's beautiful life and the wonderful love and special moments my family and I shared with him. We also thank God for the lives of the pastors, parishioners and friends of JWUMC-GB. Your love has graciously touched us, and you will forever be in our hearts.
