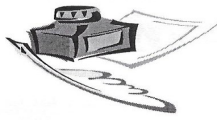

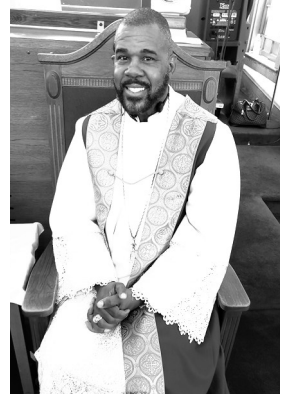

Jeryco Sheppard, son of Rika Evans, graduated from Dundalk High School on June 05, 2025.

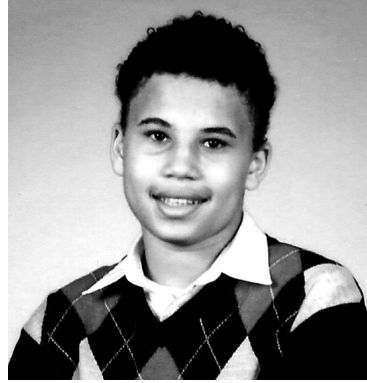
Jeryco won many medals for track and field and proudly displays them on graduation day.

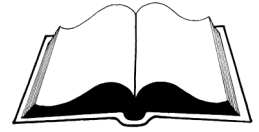
