WHAT YOUR F.A.K. INCLUDE

WHAT SHOULD YOUR FIRST AID KIT INCLUDE:

Depends on the activity of your dog.

- * Show, Hunting (waterfowl or upland), Agility, etc.
 - A show or companion dog kit will not include as many items as a performance or hunting kit.





FIRST ITEM

- Phone numbers for your regular vet.
- Emergency clinic
- * ASPCA's Poison Control 1-800-426-4435
- National Animal Poison Control 888-426-4435
- Pet Travel Hotline 1-800-545-USDA
- Dog's Medical Records
 - Previous Reactions
 - Medication
 - Vaccine Status
- Vet Calculation appropriate action for ingestion of chocolates
- Pet MD alerts current food recalls
- AVMA CPR Basics
- Canine First Aid Book





ALL KITS SHOULD INCLUDE

- Flexible Digital Thermometer—hypo/hyperthermia
- Gauze square and roll for bandages or a muzzle
- Non-stick bandages
- White tape or self-adhesive bandage Vet wrap or Elastican (be careful).
- Leash
- Dropper or needless syringe for oral use to administer liquids
- 3% Hydrogen Peroxide to induce vomiting; use 2oz until it works.
- Baby Aspirin 82mg Be careful of stomach bleeding.
- Benadryl 1mg/#
- [★] Eye Wash 4 oz
- Activated charcoal for injected toxins. This is used for things you don't want them to throw up; such as, petroleum so as not to aspirate to prevent from getting pneumonia.
- Saline to rinse wound not for eyes.





ADDITIONAL ITEMS FOR KIT

- Hemostats and/or tweezers
- Pedialyte for rehydration
- Natural or Simple sugars (honey or karo) hypoglycemia
- Sterile Lubricants, KY Jelly (cover skin breaks)
- Quick Stop for nail bleeding
- Nail clippers for torn nails
- Antibiotic ointment for lacerations (small)
 - Mupirocin sold under brand name Bactroban among others
- Small scissors for hair removal around laceration
- Light source flashlight
- Extra Towels very absorbent
- Eye Ointment without Steroids in it

ADDITIONAL ITEMS FOR HUNTING


- Skin Staples
- ABD pads thicker & larger than gauze
- Loperamide (Imodium) for diarrhea
 - 1mg per 20 lbs, 3 or 4 times per day
- lodine swabs for small lacerations
- **Burn Gel with lidocaine**
- Sting Relief Pads
- Thermal Foil Emergency Blanket
- Tourniquet use rubber ones
 - only use up to 30 minutes at the most
- Instant Cold Pack good for snake bites
- Splint Plastic
- Quick Stop bandage for bleeding
 - Celox Granules





FROM YOUR VET IF POSSIBLE

- Injectable Fast acting steroid
 - Use for snake bites and/or shock (usually dogs go into shock after a snake bite)
- Injectable Antibiotics
- Oral Antibiotics Cephalexin
- Injectable Epinephrine specific for dogs
- Keep products up to date!
 - Remember to check for expired & used products
 - Replenish your kit each time before trips
