
# Sobriety Alive

12 responses






#### 2. What more can our group do to carry the message?

3. Our group attracts alcoholics from different backgrounds. We are seeing a good cross-section of our community.






## 3b. Comments regarding question 3a (backgrounds)

4a. Do new members stick with us, or does the turnover seems excessive?



- I feel we have a good group and a lot of people seem to join the home group after a couple of visits.


5a. We effectively emphasize the importance of sponsorship.

- We should add what a sponsor is.


6a. We are careful to preserve the anonymity of our group members and other AAs outside the meeting rooms. We treat what they say with confidentiality.

  something concerning there that we should all be aware of




8a. All members are given the opportunity to speak at meetings and to participate in other group activities.

9a. Our group is mindful that holding office is a great responsibility, not to be viewed as the outcome of a popularity contest. We choose our officers with care.






## 9b. Comments regarding question number 9a (officers):

 We will typically fill positions with whomever steps up to do them as opposed to selecting them. Generally, people do a good job.


10a. We do all we can to provide an attractive meeting place.

I love our meeting space! Set-up team is great!


11a. Our group does its fair share towards participating in the purpose of AA as it relates to our Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service.

- More service


12a. Our group brings the AA message to the attention of professionals in the community -physicians, clergy, court officials, educators, and o...re often the first to see alcoholics in need of help?
