We Enjoyed the Ride! 62nd International Rally Doswell, VA

Randy and I didn't know what to expect from our first International Rally. My parents, Bill and Meredith Fitzgerald attended every International Rally throughout their Airstream years alongside their good friends, the DeCuirs and so many others. I knew from their descriptions that there were many meetings and much travel to local sites around the rally and meeting up with friends from across the country that they had met in all the previous years. But I probably wasn't listening. Until you attend, you really don't get it. Why in the world would over 700 trailers gather on the grounds of a horse farm and why would over 1,000 gather nightly in an arena for

entertainment, meetings, and rituals. I guess I just nailed why people do it. It is a ritual that has been evolving for 62 years. You begin to understand the power of buying an Airstream and becoming a part of a lifestyle and community when you are surrounded by it at a rally of this enormity. You sit and look around the audience and fill with pride that all this comes from a place that begins with the simple pronouncement, "Let's go camping." You don't have to have an Airstream to love camping, but you have to have an Airstream to participate in the sacredness that arises from this lifestyle choice. Growing up, I learned to love camping from within the walls of a rotting green army tent. I loved my dad's charred pancakes and my mom's tomato chili. I loved the security of my surrounded family and the stories that my dad grew us up on. The places that we visited were exotic and nothing like the Beaumont Texas I inhabited all the other days of my life. I chose the lifestyle long before I bought into the Airstream cult. But being at International awakened those almost religious experi-



ences we have all felt while in the company of our closest friends. For example. . . when caravanning to Montana to honor the death of a long-time TGCU member only to find no place to camp except in the cemetery. Or boondocking in Colorado for a month with nothing but car and trailer problems but friends never leave you and in fact turn the woes into laughter. And how about an unraveling awning on a trailer barreling down the road into the winds of Big Bend and a friend rescues you with a simple tie strap. The Airstream stories archive become our



communal story that doesn't die when we die or stop when we get too weary to travel on. The stories live on in us and we pass them on and hand them down to other friends and our family. We live on because we are a part of something large and good and true. And as I sat in the arena with 1,000 stranger-friends, I felt my story rooting there in the fertile earth of this historic horse farm in Doswell, Virginia. Even though the actual purpose of an International Rally is to conduct the business of the Wally Byam Airstream Club and to vote on issues before the delegates, that is not at all the reason so many attend. As my husband Randy says over and over again when we are enjoying a quiet moment while camping, "We are so fortunate." I hope you will join Randy and me next year in Loveland, Colorado for the 63rd International Rally so we can build more Airstream stories. I like what Mona Heath, our International President for 2020-21, said in her acceptance speech at Doswell. " ...the most Magical Thing would be to see our large and continuously growing Airstream family continue to do what we do best - envelop new members with kindness, support and surround them with the possibility of WHAT IF?" Sounds like the beginning of a good story. Let's go camping - 2020 Loveland Colorado, June 20-27.

A Cool August In Colorado





A steep drive up to Lobo Lookout

















Bobbye O'Quinn's Suggested Best Reads


from 1952-1969. The second timeline follows a murder investigation of a local celebrity in a coastal North Carolina town.


Four days of touring led us to Taylor Lake, Mirror Lake, more Fishing, Crested Butte, Kebler Pass, and Hotchkiss.


Some exciting ideas and opportunities are being discussed for future projects to enhance the Park as well as income possibilities which will be brought before the membership in due time.
