During these early days of the 2024 I have been reflecting on some words from a much-loved hymn. It's a favourite of mine which we sing regularly—as often at weddings as we do at funerals.

Lord of all hopefulness, Lord of all joy, whose trust, ever childlike, no cares could destroy, be there at our waking, and give us, we pray, your bliss in our hearts, Lord, at the break of the day.

## **Ash Wednesday**



The season of **Lent** begins on **Ash Wednesday**, **14**<sup>th</sup> **February 2024**. Lent is an important time which prepares us for the great celebration of Easter. It is a season in which Christians should take seriously our duty repent of the sins which separate us from God, to receive the assurance of God's forgiveness, and to grow in faith and devotion to the Lord.

## **Lent Bible Study : Acts of the Apostles**



The Acts of the Apostles is a fascinating book. The longest of the New Testament, it tells the story of what God did to take the message of the Risen Jesus into all the then-known world. It begins where St Luke's Gospel ends with the Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus. From there it records the growth of the church as it expands geographically from Jerusalem to Rome, and both culturally and ethnically as the Good News of Jesus spreads from Jews to Gentiles.

Over five weeks we will spend time studying the early chapters of Acts in detail (probably Chapters 1–3) finding much to inspire and challenge us as the same Church of God in our time and place.

#### **Our Precious Gift**

As Christians, while we may look to reduce our own carbon footprint, we are called to be stewards and witnesses of a much more radical resource. The clue is in the word 'ecology'.

'Eco' comes from the Greek word oikos, meaning house, or dwelling place. Ecology is partly about our responsibility to recognise the precious gift of the Earth, as our dwelling place: to be thankful, and play our part. God made humankind to care for the earthly world: Jesus amplifies the call, as He uses 'nature' as the sign of how we can live in order to flourish and to fulfil God's will.

'Logy' comes from a Greek word logos interpreted as reason, the ordering of knowledge, logic. In John's Gospel, logos is a word to describe Jesus – through whom all things are made and from whom all true knowledge comes. Logos is the word, the source of all goodness and grace, for every human life, and for all of creation.

It is the 'logos', the word, who inhabits our lives, our creation – inviting us to recognise His light, and allow it to overcome the darkness of our own limited concerns and agendas. We meet the logos in scripture, in worship, in prayer, and deeper reflection.

In Jesus, as logos, we can find the wisdom, the resources and the commitment to play our part in caring for creation. We are able to invite others to recognise the deeper truths about Eco, our common dwelling place, and to see more clearly how we join with others to work out what to do, how to live, and honour the gift of life that we receive through Him. The Logos is the possibility of good news for humankind and for the Earth.

What a responsibility each Christian disciple is called to bear! And what grace can be ours to enable us to fulfil our calling, and help all of God's children become caught up in the praise and prayer that gives true life to our dwelling place, and to exercise our stewardship appropriately.

Read John 1v1-14. Become an ECO-warrior – committed to our common dwelling place – through celebrating the power and presence of the LOGOS.

#### Winford Community Shop News February 2024

The committee thanks everybody that completed the questionnaire before Christmas. We had an amazing 327 responses with 98.2% saying that having a Shop and Post Office in the village was important to them, and almost 50% saying the shop was important for socialising and a sense of the community.

When asked what people most valued about having the shop in the village the following comments were typical-

- "The village shop is the heart of Winford and is absolutely essential. It provides an invaluable service both in terms of the items it offers and the community connection it provides".
- "Winford is effectively an island. No pavements, safe cycle routes or reliable public transport out of
  the village. Having the shop is a great asset and adds to the community. We're very grateful to all for
  continuing to keep it in operation".

The committee is currently investigating a range of options to ensure the ongoing viability of the shop at the end of the current lease in May 2024, with some things not necessarily under our control. But it is likely an application to the Community Ownership Fund for some level of funding will be made in the future. It is also important to note that 47.1% of respondents said they would, or might be, interested in becoming a shareholder or buying additional shares as further funding from the community may also be required at some time.

This whole process is complex and may take some time to resolve, however the committee is committed to its success and a priority is trying to keep everybody informed and involved.

#### The Chew Magna Village Pound

Village pounds were essential before fields, and therefore livestock, were restricted. Pounds housed stray animals until collected by their owners – for a fee. Pounds now provide a strategic, historic base of a village – even origins – of many. As in the case of Chew Magna, the history includes the period when much of the village was influenced by the Lord of the Manor, who included such as the Bishop of Bath and Wells.

With more recent changes to villages, pounds lost their traditional value and Robin would like to hear about pounds throughout the Valley, so they can be recorded.

Chew pound has been robbed of many stones and used as a rubbish dump. We have approached the Parish Council, representatives of which have been very encouraging. Work will be in stages and has already started. It will include stabilisation of the remaining stones, clearance of debris, branches and so on. We hope to supply and erect Identification and Explanation board/s - by the artist who did the English Heritage boards at The Stones complex, Stanton Drew.

We would very much appreciate your support in preserving the pound and ideas you have, and any help you can offer, will be sincerely valued. #### Two Hundred Years of Saving Lives at Sea

In 2024 the RNLI will celebrate 200 years of service dedicated to the preservation of those who work or play at sea or on our inland waters. The RNLI was founded by Sir William Hillary on the Isle of Man, where he observed at first hand the perils of seafaring. He personally took part in many incidents to help save lives and as a result, resolved to set up a rescue service which subsequently became the RNLI in Great Britain and Ireland.

Since its establishment, the RNLI has saved more than 144,000 lives but this has come at the high cost of losing 600 volunteer crew members in the process. The work continues today with a wider remit, as our beaches swell with holiday makers in the summer. In 2022 there were 9312 lifeboat launches with 389 lives saved and beach lifeguards saving 117 lives.

Here in the Chew Valley we try and do our bit to raise funds to keep this crucial service going and it is thanks to our loyal supporters that we are able to do this. We recently held our Curry Lunch which raised £2,300 and thanks go to all who contributed. In fact, 94% of RNLI income is derived solely from public donations.

We are a small, inland branch of the RNLI, but we do as much as we can to help our charity achieve its objective of 'Saving Lives at Sea' - which we intend, with the help of our loyal supporters and the general public, to continue for the next 200years!

In May 2024 we are planning to celebrate our bicentenary with an outdoor event at Lady Farm, Chelwood to which all family members will be welcome. Make a note of the timing and keep an eye open for further information. We also hope to repeat our Curry Lunch in the Autumn.

Our small committee is now in desperate need of new members to help plan our fund raising activities. We only meet on two or three occasions a year, so please consider helping us by dropping a note to: rnlichewvalley@gmail.com

#### Winford Parish Council Meeting - Monday 20 November 2023

Open Forum: Four members of the public attended to complain about the increased traffic on the local roads, the speeds vehicles were doing, illegal off-site carparks and the effect on traffic. They also raised parking on red lines and the pavements. A resident also attended to explain that they had made a retrospective planning application because, to make it sufficiently profitable to meet planning requirements, they needed to be resident on their farm. A resident spoke in support of planning application 23/P/2310/FUH: The Old Chapel, The Street, Regil. They explained that, in response to concerns raised, they would be amending the plans to ensure that the extension did not exceed 49% of the original area of the building.

Highways and footpaths: Issues with speed and volume of traffic using the rural lanes were discussed at length. It was agreed that, given the expected increase in volume of traffic as a consequence of airport expansion, and in the shorter term due to the A38 improvement plans, the Parish Council would ask for a meeting with a senior Highways Engineer at North Somerset Council (NSC) to discuss schemes to "future

proof" the local road network as far as possible. This might include, for example, speed restrictions and/or traffic calming measures. It was agreed to find out whether the potential co-ordinator of a local Community Speedwatch was still interested in taking on the role. If not, the Parish Council would seek an alternative volunteer. An email from a resident regarding the build up of traffic on Winford High Street at busy times was also considered, but it was considered that presently no action could be taken to alleviate this. Following the retirement of the school crossing patrol, discussions were on-going regarding the development of road safety measures in the centre of Winford. It had been decided to set up a Safer Winford working group, including representatives of the Parish Council, school and NSC. The Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs) had agreed to attend occasionally at school pick up/drop times to warn people who were parking inappropriately, and to issue tickets for any dangerous/illegal parking. The Clerk would ask again that NSC consider extending the 20mph zone, to cover the full extent of the main road through Winford, Church Road and Chapel Lane, and the residential part of Dundry Lane.

The Clerk would report potholes on Kingdown Road, Old Hill, Hen Lane, Lower Strode and Dial Lane. She would also report the destroyed verges on Kingdown and Old Hill and request repainting of the give way white lining at the junctions of Stanshalls Lane and Currells Lane with Dial Lane/Upper Town Lane.

**Felton Common:** The state of repair of the track running from West Lane to the top end of the car parking area was discussed. There was uncertainty about whether the Parish Council was responsible for maintaining the track, which was a bridleway, and who would be liable in the event of an accident. It was agreed to seek legal advice on this, including whether the Parish Council was the owner or just the trustee of the Common. A Commoner had taken issue with the airport's view that he was not allowed to exercise his right to graze cattle on the Common. It was agreed to ask for legal opinion about who held the higher authority, the landowner/trustee or the Commoners.

**Airport:** The Chair reported on a meeting that had been held with PCSOs, who were keen for better liaison with the Parish Councils in future. The main point of discussion had been cars continuing to stop on the red lining at the entrance road to Felton Allotments. It was agreed to consider installing signs warning that it was a tow-away area and indicating that cameras were in operation. A resident had complained about the withdrawal of the reduced fare on the airport flyer for travellers from the stop by the Airport Tavern. It was agreed to raise this at the next meeting with the airport.

**Play Areas:** The bike track at Vee Lane had been cleared, and the Working Party had received good feedback from parents. An application had been made to the airport for funding towards new picnic tables. **Parish Property:** Winford Cricket Club had given notice that they would be closing and would relinquish the lease of the sports pavilion and cricket ground at the December 2024 break-point. An alternative cricket club had expressed a strong interest in taking over the lease and discussions were on-going.

A resident had requested work to trees on Kingston Lane, because they were concerned that they had grown too large. It was agreed to commission a professional survey of all the Parish Council owned trees at High Winford, with a view to identifying any work required. It was likely that the trees were all covered by a Tree Protection Order, so approval for any work would be required. Following a complaint about vegetation outside the boundary of the Walton Crescent play area, it was agreed to remind the resident that they had previously been advised that this was not the responsibility of the Parish Council.

**Winford Community Shop:** The lease for the shop was due to expire in 2024. Following discussions over the summer, the owner was minded to put it on the open market in order to reach the best price. It was agreed that an application should be made to NSC to register the shop as an asset of community value.

#### Winford Parish Council Meeting – Monday 18 December 2023

**Open Forum:** Two members of the public attended to raise the problems horse riders were experiencing when using legitimate bridleways across the Common. They reported that in recent years there had been many instances of aggressive behaviour towards riders, especially from dog walkers. They recognised that everyone had a right to use the Common, and suggested that better signage would let people know that the

bridleways existed. It was also suggested that dog walkers could be advised to keep their dogs on a lead whilst on a bridlepath. It was agreed to publish a map of the Common bridleways on social media, and to post something on the Parish Council's website.

**Highways and footpaths:** The Clerk would request repainting of various give way white lining; on Upper Town Lane, Featherbed Lane, Broadmead Lane, Lower Strode and Hen Lane. Nothing had been heard to date about the diversion of the footpath running across the compost site.

Planning Enforcements: A possible breach of planning at a property on Currells Lane would be reported.

**Felton Common:** A resident had raised the problem of people parking on the Common and blocking the access track for residents. It was agreed to reply explaining that the Parish Council was currently seeking legal advice on the ownership and responsibility for the tracks on the Common. It was also agreed to remind the church authorities that on busy occasions, such as weddings etc, people were welcome to use the carpark by the village hall.

**Airport:** North Somerset Council (NSC) had circulated the terms of reference for the new Airport Environmental and Amenity Improvement Fund (AEAIF). This would replace the Environmental Improvement Fund on 1 January 2024. The Chair had complained about the lack of consultation and it was agreed that, given the short notice and in consultation with the Clerk, he would submit detailed comments on behalf of the Parish Council.

It was noted that several Parish Councils had submitted objections to the release of additional land from the greenbelt at Bristol Airport, as outlined in the North Somerset Local Plan 2039 Pre-submission Plan. It was agreed that Winford Parish Council would rely on the Parish Councils' Airport Association to make comments on their behalf.

**Compost site & allotments:** It had been suggested by a plotholder that the problem of under-occupancy of Felton Allotments could be resolved by inviting those on the waiting list for Bristol allotments to apply for a plot. After discussion, it was recognised that this would help reduce the costs of paying contractors to clear weeds etc, and could restore the vibrant allotments community that had been lost over recent years. However, it was agreed that local people should be given another chance to take on plots before they were offered further afield. The Clerk would advertise the vacancies again on social media and the village magazine.

**Parish Property:** Shaftesbury Road Cricket Club was very keen to take over the lease for the sports pavilion and cricket field, and it was agreed that the Chair and Responsible Finance Officer should agree heads of terms with the Club and could incur legal fees to draw up a new lease.

There was various work needed on parish property, including repairs to the zipwire, assembling new benches at Vee Lane play area and treating the Angel for rot. It was agreed to seek a general contractor who would be willing to take on these jobs.

Another complaint had been received about the condition of the hedges and trees at Walton Crescent play area. The contractor would be trimming the hedges shortly. Some of the self-seeded trees would also be trimmed back when he was available to undertake this.

**Any other business:** Chew Valley Nature Forum had approached the Parish Council for a grant towards their new website. It was agreed that, whilst this was not something that the Parish Council was able to support from their limited funds, they would be advised to approach the airport for support.
