From the Rector

Dear Friends,

I often hear people commenting on how **early** the Christmas season seems to begin each year. As soon as the long nights close in, decorations and illuminations appear in our homes, in streets and in shops to lend some cheer to those gloomy evenings. I am sure many of you will remember when Christmas festivities began on Christmas Eve—only then was a tree decorated and carols sung for the first time!

It is less often that we hear people commenting on how soon Christmas seems to **end**. The famous carol reminds us that there are Twelve Days of Christmas, beginning on Christmas Day and ending on 'Twelfth Night', 5th January, when decorations are packed away for another year. While many of us keep this tradition, the commercial world around us seems keen to move us on the next 'festival' as soon as Boxing Day arrives. They want our attention to turn to booking summer holidays and buying Valentines gifts and Easter chocolate as soon as possible.

The Christian Year does things very differently. In fact, 'Christmastide' is a period of 40 days which extends from Christmas Day to the feast of Candlemas on 2nd February. This long period of celebration reminds us that Christ's coming into the world at Christmas was not a one-off event, but rather the beginning of a new way of life. It was the first breaking of a light shining in the dark ness of this world—not a momentary flash of light, but a light that shines still today. Christmas was the

beginning of a season of joy and wonder, which even today invites us into the story, to discover more about the life of the child in the manger.

Amid this long season of Christmas, we think of those who were among the first to discover the joy and wonder of Jesus in the manger. On the Epiphany, 6th January, we remember the Magi—mysterious kings, or Wisemen, who travelled to Bethlehem from Persia. Tradition (and another famous carol!) tells us that there were three kings. There were certainly three gifts—gold, frankincense and myrrh—but we don't know how many kings came to visit Jesus and the Holy Family in Bethlehem.

What we do know is their visit was full of rich significance. Their gift of gold honoured a King who was unlike any earthly king. Frankincense was a symbol of his deity. Myrrh was an ominous symbol of Christ's death.

Epiphany is a time when we should ask ourselves: what we can bring to Christ to honour him? In her famous poem, 'In the bleak midwinter' Christina Rossetti poem asks:

What can I give him? Poor as I am.
If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb.
If I were a wise man I would do my part.
Yet what can I give him?
Give my heart.

May these words inspire you to honour Jesus with your hearts in the darkness of this midwinter, and may the joy and wonder of the birth of Jesus remain with you through this season of Christmastide.

I wish you God's richest blessing for a Happy and Peaceful New Year.

Police Advice for anyone who purchased or received an Scooter for Christmas

Motorised scooters fall within the definition of a motor vehicle and are covered by the same laws and regulations covering all motor vehicles.

EScooters can only be used under private ownership use on private land only, to which the public does not have access without legal restriction, (the permission of the landowner must be gained).

Hired E scooters have a government exemption, on a trial basis. A provisional license is required and insurance provided by the hire company. They are permitted on cycle lanes and the highway, but **not** the motorway network. Scooters are provided and meet the required specification.

Warning: the use of S59 of the Police Reform Act 2002 will be considered and also seizure of the scooter where its antisocial use continues following a warning. Remember, merely using a machine on a footpath could reasonably be construed as 'annoyance', so could easily fall within the act. Prosecution with use of the road traffic act can be used, such as failing to provide a certificate of insurance and even drink/drive laws can be enforced.

Winter Security Advice

Camera Doorbell – Cheaper alternative to CCTV. App can link to your mobile phone for easy access.

Security Lighting – Usually best used alongside CCTV or Ring Doorbells. It has been believed that those wanting to break into dwellings or non-dwellings prefer to do so in the dark.

CCTV – Can be slightly more expensive but can greatly deter suspects from even attempting properties with clear CCTV running.

Alarm – Home alarms can be a great benefit to deter and scare off possible burglars and also alert the occupants of a disturbance.

Garage Defender - The padlock is enclosed inside the body of the unit making it less accessible for would be thieves to damage. The T-bar unit locks onto a solid steel base with the supplied padlock to secure your garage and provide a highly visible deterrent to intruders. Within the Garage – Use heavy duty locks. If your garage has windows move valuable products out of direct view, don't advertise your items.

Bike Security – Bicycles are commonly the item of choice taken, locking your bicycle to a wall mounted bike rack can drastically decrease the likelihood of that bike being taken. Your local Beat team can offer Bike Marking. Get in touch with your local officer or look out for the next Bike Marketing Event in your area.

North Somerset Recycling Collections during Severe Weather

- Collections may be delayed during severe weather but you should still put out your refuse and recycling on your collection day if it is safe to do so.
- You do not need to report a missed collection unless it is only your property that has been missed.

- If your food waste and recycling has not been collected by 7pm, take them back in and put them back out again on your next scheduled collection day.
- If your refuse collection is missed you can leave your black wheelie bin out in a safe place and the crews will come to collect it as soon as they can.
- During severe weather we will collect extra bags of refuse that you have due to missed collections.
- We'll post updates about how our services, including recycling and waste collections, are affected on our emergency closures and information pages.

Garden Waste over the Christmas period

The garden waste collection service does not operate for a four-week period around Christmas. This happens every year to account for the extra Christmas waste. This year there are no garden waste collections between 18 December - 16 January. **Garden waste collections will resume on Monday 17 January 2022.**

Crews are doing their best to get to all properties on their scheduled collection days. However, they are still under pressure and may need to catch up on subsequent days.

If your garden waste is not collected on your scheduled day, please take the following steps: Check the missed collection report as the crew may already be aware that you have been missed. If your road is listed, you don't need to take any action and a crew will be back to collect your bin. You can see the revised collection date on the report. If your road is not listed, log a missed collection within 24 hours of your scheduled collection day.

Christmas trees can be recycled at your nearest recycling centre.

Winford Parish Council Meeting - Monday 15 November 2021

Open Forum: A planning agent spoke for application 21/P/2481/OUT: Birds Farm, Kingdown Road Winford: the application was discussed at agenda item 5. A resident raised his concerns regarding the impact of the proposed Bristol Clean Air Zone on North Somerset residents; it was agreed to discuss this at the December meeting.

Highways and footpaths: It was agreed to complain to the Highways Officer that some of the stones on the verge of Kingdown Road had now rolled into the carriageway. North Somerset Council (NSC) had replied to the Parish Council's request to reopen the right of way LA7/3/10, raising a number of issues. It was agreed to respond that the Parish Council were strongly desirous to see this footpath reopened, that the issues could have been addressed earlier during the planning process, and asking to be kept fully informed regarding any action the landowner wished to take regarding a formal Public Path Diversion Order.

A plan of the low fence it was proposed to install on the boundary of the public open space adjacent to the compost site, showing the line of the proposed footpath diversion, would be sent to the householder and property owner. It was agreed to respond to the householder's

alternative suggestion for the footpath diversion, pointing out that this would not prevent the depositing of green waste outside opening hours.

Enforcements: It was agreed that the excessive overnight lighting at the Cattle Market Business Park would be raised with the enforcements team again.

Felton Common: It was agreed to look at ways to prevent illegal driving across the Common. The bin emptying schedule would be revisited at the December meeting and in the meantime Councillors would monitor whether the bins were filling up between the current twice weekly visits.

Play Areas: Touchwood had repaired the zipwire and replaced the seat. They had also replaced some of the deck and cladding boards free of charge whilst at the site. It was agreed to check that the seat now had sufficient clearance from the ground/platform.

Compost site: NSC had said that the outstanding claim would be paid early that week, and that the rate of payment for future claims would soon be established. A good amount of green waste had been removed over the past few weeks, giving a sound basis for the calculation of cost per tonne. There was still no clarity on how the Parish Council would be reimbursed for interim activity whilst a new methodology was established. The future of the compost site was dependant on a satisfactory outcome regarding back, interim and future payments.

Airport parking/airport: Airport parking had started to become a problem again, particularly on Felton Common. It was agreed to arrange another meeting with the Airport and NSC to discuss possible solutions. This would include the need for better signage to the free Waiting Zone at the Airport. It was suggested that the Bristol Airport Transport Forum on 22 November would be a good opportunity to discuss the impact of the proposed Bristol Clean Air Zone.

Any other urgent business: It was noted that the Parish Council would not be responsible for the “Winford history” signs that Councillor Hugh Gregor was proposing to erect at the Old Militia Barracks in Church Road, and the Old Forge in the High Street. The rough sleeper still appeared to be using the bus shelter on Felton Street, and it was agreed to ask NSC for an update.
